Sabanno Valley Ass'n To Seek Flood Control

The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, at its regular meeting Tuesday noon at the Elite Cafe, unanimously approved the formation of an all-watershed association for the development of the Sabanno watershed to control flooding and effect better water conservation, which took place at a meeting in Gorman Monday night.

The Gorman group of about 40 representatives of Rising Star, Gorman and De Leon voted on a motion by Cecil Shults of Rising Star, to merge three separate community organizations into one Sabanno Watershed Association and to submit an application for a survey of the watershed for a flood control project.

Attending from Rising Star also was John Lee, in charge of the Rising Star Soil Conservation office.

Ross Wilson of Gorman was chosen president of the enlarged association and Billy Carruth of De Leon was named secretary.

Funds for the association already been contributed by the communities involved.

The Rising Star CofC also heard a report on negotiations under way to secure a doctor for Rising Star so that the local hospital can be reopened on a clinic basis with the prospect of re-opening the entire hospital later. The group was told that Hospital Association officials had been in conference with an interested doctor and were endeavoring to contact another prospect.

The CofC voted to furnish the barbecue for a luncheon at Nimrod Monday, Oct. 3, when an election to choose a supervisor for sub-division 4 of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District will be held.

Sec'y of Agriculture Freeman Speaking at McKinney

Conservation Revolution Importance Cited By Sec'y

The conservation revolution, now just beginning to flower, may be the most important and least understood revolution of all," Sec'y of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said at McKinney Thursday, September 6, as he dedicated the 1,000th flood prevention dam in Texas.

Freeman said conservation meant stopping floods and soil erosion which would result in unpolluted streams and lakes. He also said it meant the development, protection, use and management of all our resources for the need and enjoyment of people.

Site 16, Sister Grove watershed, a tributary of the Trinity, was the dam dedicated. Freeman pointed out that the Sister Grove project would return \$2.35 in benefits for each \$1.00 of

total cost. Freeman also paid tribute to the leadership of soil and water conservation districts, the Soil Conservation Service, County and other local groups for progress made in Texas watershed projects.

H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, SCS, officially turned Site 16 over to John Wells, chairman, Collin County Soil and Water Conservation district for operation and maintenance. Wells promised that with the help of the Collin County commissioners court, the dam would be well maintained.

Cats to Face Fired-up May Eleven in Homecoming Tilt

The Rising Star Wildcats will meet their old and almost hometown rivals, the May Tigers, in the football feature of the annual Homecoming program here Saturday. The game will start at 8 p. m. at Wildcat stadium.

The Tigers, with a record of one win and two losses in early season play, will be fired up for revenge for the 29-6 defeat the Wildcats administered last year on the May gridiron.

The Cats have a two-win-one-loss record for the season so far, with victories over Wylie and Blanket and an 8-0 loss to Gorman.

The Tigers defeated Evant 30 to 0 and lost to Trent and Richland Springs.

The game will not be a conference battle, since the Cats were advanced to Class A this year, but the rivalry will be no less intense.

The Wildcats had to come from behind to win their game with the Blanket Tigers at Blanket Friday night of last week after a listless first half in which the Tigers led 6 to 0.

Coach Frank Gray pulled his entire first string in the second period and substituted his B team. The strategy improved the play of the regulars in the second half and they were able to erase the deficit and go ahead for a 14-6 win.

The 4-H program has been marked by change since its inception more than 60 years ago. Greater variety of educational projects, more emphasis on the improvement of the boy and girl and a program with appeal for young people everywhere, are some of the changes.

A more recent but no less important change is the demand for 4-H in towns and cities across the country. Still an important educational force in rural America, more than 77 per

cent of its members reside in rural areas nearly a half million 4-H members now live in towns and cities of 2,500 or more. A decade, 86.5 per cent lived on farms and in rural areas and 13.5 per cent in urban areas. 4-H has truly become an organization for all the youth of America.

Many of the older youth have developed the idea that 4-H is "kid stuff". If this is so, then explain why more than half of the 2,221,119 members are age 13 and above. 4-H is an organization oriented toward informal education in many subject matter fields and in character development, leadership, and citizenship. This program is designed

to involve young people 9-19 years of age.

Eastland County has 200 4-H Club members enrolled in nine clubs. These young people are not roaming around trying to find something to occupy themselves. They are working collectively through their respective 4-H Clubs for the good of the United States of America.
