

A 35 cent charge will be levied on all stationto-station credit card calls, to which the perminute distance rate is then added. A personto-person credit card call which requires an operator will be treated differently, and at a higher cost. Continental Telephone customers who must place their credit card calls with an operator through a toll center, however, will be charged the basic 35-cent rate up front.

An operator-assisted station-to-station call will now carry a published service charge of \$1.10 plus the per-minute rate. The cost of having an operator place a person-to-person call is now \$2.65 before the conversation or "message unit'' begins.



Memorandum states jurisdiction over oil & gas waste

The Railroad Commission approved Tuesday a memorandum of understanding with the department of Water Resources and Department of Health describing the jurisdiction of each agency over waste relating to the oil and gas industry.

The existing authority of the agencies is not changed by the memorandum, just clarified. House Bill 1047, passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature, required the agencies to issue the memorandum before January 1, 1982. Generally, the Railroad

Commission has jurisdiction over waste materials resulting from the exploration, development or production of oil and gas. The Commission agreed in the memorandum to execute their responsibility in agreewaters in the state not related to oil, gas or geothermal resources falls under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Resources.

The Department of Health has jurisdiction over the management of municipal solid waste. When both municipal and industrial solid waste is involved, the Department of Health assumes jurisdiction.

Waste under Railroad Commission authority may be disposed of at facilities permitted by the other two agencies when the facility owner and the agency with jurisdiction over the facility agrees.

Specifically, waste generated from refinery storage tanks is subject to the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Resources, while solid waste resulting from the marketing of refined prosion. Human Resources to provide medically related services to D.H.R. clients. One of the programs delivered through contract agencies is Primary Home Care. These contracts are funded through Title XIX. Services are provided to the client by an attendant who may be either a part-time employee of a Class A Home Health Agency. These agencies are reimbursed on a statewide unit rate basis as established by the Department of Human Resources Board. The attendant cannot be an individual who is a legal or foster parent to a minor child or spouse of the recipient. Services are provided for aged or disabled adults who functionally are limited in the performance of daily activities. The range of


services include: Per-Care, sonal Housekeeping, Meal Preparation, and Escort Service. Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human

Resources field representative. The D.H.R. worker for Shackleford County is Eva Latham. Clients must be S.S.I. recipients and reside in their own homes. The service must be ordered by a physician and must be provided under the supervision of a registered nurse.

The objective of the Primary Home Care Program is to provide non-technical, medically prescribed and supervised inhome personal and housekeeping services

for eligible Medicaid recipients whose chronic health problems cause them to be functionally limited in the performance of daily living activities.





# Doctor Talk

By Dr. Harold B. Ligon

In the past we've talked about some aspects of the endocrine system. Our topics recently have been discussions of the menstrual system, under the endocrinological influence of the brain and pituitary gland (located just under the brain) on the ovary--one of the so-called "endocrine target organs" The ovary is a hormone secreting endocrine gland. There are a few others; notably, the adrenal gland, the testes, the breast, and the thyroid gland. Also, a "growth hormone" circulates through the bloodstream for bone structure development.

We'd like to talk about another of the endocrine glands today. It's the thyroid gland, and it's very important, it's very well known (disorders of which are widespread), and very poorly understood. However, a little general explanation can help a layman become familiar with some thyroid disorders. Bearing in mind that the

thyroid gland is an endocrine secreting gland--and that it's governed by the pituitary gland--one could logically understand that the function of the thyroid gland is to secrete its hormone (thyroxine) for distribution throughout the endocrinological system, helping in normal growth, development, and function, in general.




