Rising Star Emergency Ambulance Service

30 Meet To Organize

Rudiments of a community voluntary ambulance service were developed by more than 30 Rising Star citizens Friday night in a meeting at the Public Library. The meeting, called by a number of concerned residents, was attended by representatives of the City government, the fire department, the React Club and other organizations.

Three main issues were considered:

- (1) Purchase of a suitable ambulance;
- (2) Training of sufficient emergency medical technician personnel to operate the service on a voluntary basis under a rotation system that would not be burdensome to a few, and
- (3) Formation of a local association sustained by memberships and directed by elected officers.

The group voted to name the organization the "Rising Star Emergency Ambulance Service." It would cover the entire Rising Star area.

Mrs. LaJuan Killion, wife of Mayor Lavelle Killion and an emergency medical technician trainee, was named interim chairman to work out details of a program to be presented to a subsequent public meeting to be held at a place and time to be announced as soon as possible. The program as discussed Friday night would be broadly similar to one now in successful operation at Cross Plains.

With respect to the purchase of a suitable ambulance, a problem developed when it was reported to the city council at its meeting Monday night that a vehicle thought to be available at DeLeon at a reasonable price had been sold. Councilman Bill Reed who, with Mayor Killion, represented the City at the meeting Friday night, said he went to DeLeon at the request of the City to investigate the availability of the vehicle with the result reported.

A special called meeting will be held August 23rd for an initiation ceremony. Reed told the council

that a Gorman organization which purchased an ambulance with locally raised funds matched by government aid, had offered to serve Rising Star in extreme situations.

It was suggested that the Rising Star people investigate the Gorman plan with the view that some program might be worked out whereby government funds to assist in the purchase of a local ambulance might be obtained. At any rate it is necessary that the Rising Star group develop revised plans to meet its goal so far as the availability of emergency transportation is concerned.

A campaign for memberships in the association, on a free-will fee basis, by which to sustain the permanent operation of the program be made. Membership would be evidenced by an appropriate card.

What is considered the heart of the program is a program of locally held classes in emergency medical technician training hopefully to be conducted by Ranger Junior College which offers the course at Cross Plains. Several classes have been conducted there and one is currently under way, Mrs. Killion said.

At least 15 students at an individual fee of \$30 are required to be established a class. The training is designed to qualify a student to give effective first aid in emergency situations, including the administration of oxygen and heart attack treatment. The training is just below paramedic standards.

While the primary purpose is to develop a pool of appropriately trained personnel to insure patient care during ambulance transportation, the instruction could prove an invaluable personal asset, it was suggested. It would enable a person to deal effectively with health or accident emergencies in which he might otherwise prove helpless.

It could save lives at home, it was pointed out.

Mrs. Killion also said that qualified speakers, including State Health Department experts, would be solicited to discuss various aspects of emergency care, state regulations and other topics related to the ambulance program at the organizational meeting. The meeting would firm up the organization, elect officers and decide other

questions that may arise or be found necessary.

Hope was expressed that many of the younger citizens of the community would interest themselves in

the program. Their help is needed especially in the operation of the ambulance and handling of patients, it was explained.

SEGREGATION PEANUTS

The 1979 regulations provide that if the Federal-State Inspector finds on the first inspection that a lot of peanuts grades Segregation 3, the producer shall:

1. Deliver the peanuts to:
 - a. The area producer association for loan at the additional loan rate.
 - b. The handler as provided under a contract (CCC1005) if applicable, or
 - c. A handler who is a signer of the peanut marketing agreement. Such peanuts shall be considered as quota peanuts.

2. Retain the lot of peanuts for use as seed. If the peanuts are retained:

- a. The peanuts shall be considered as quota peanuts.
- b. The gross weight of the lot of peanuts shall be determined and entered on the MQ94 by the handler. The producer shall furnish an estimated net weight to the county ASCS office when reporting the amount of peanuts retained for seed. The estimated weight shall be deducted from the quota balance on the producer's marketing card.

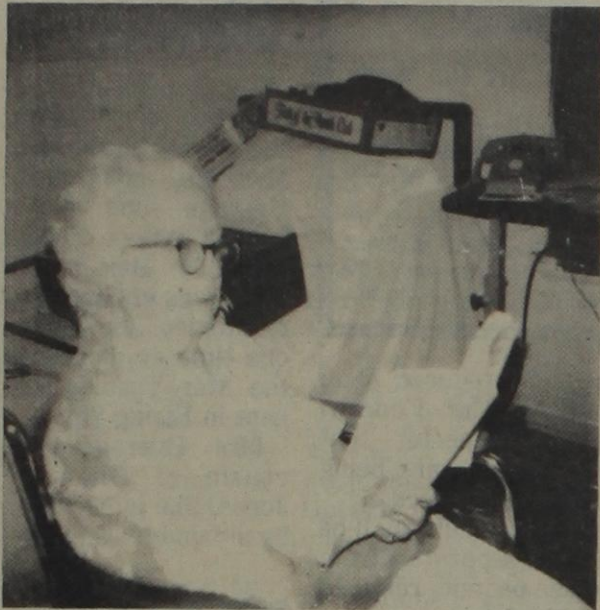

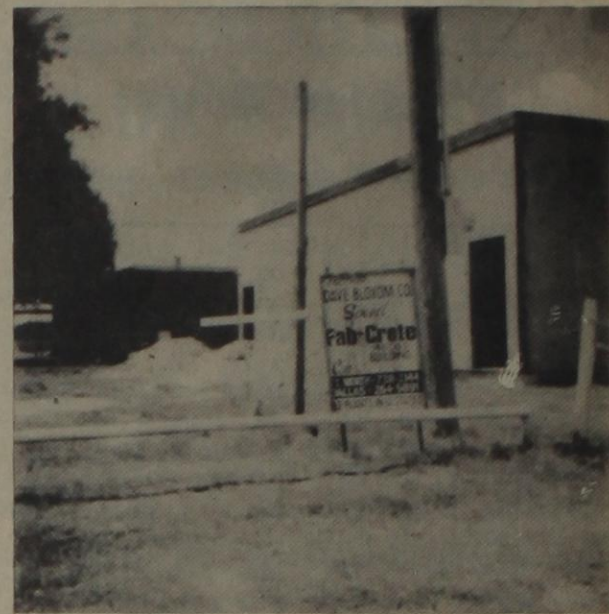
4-H Rally Day To Be Cross Plains Baptist Holds Rallies

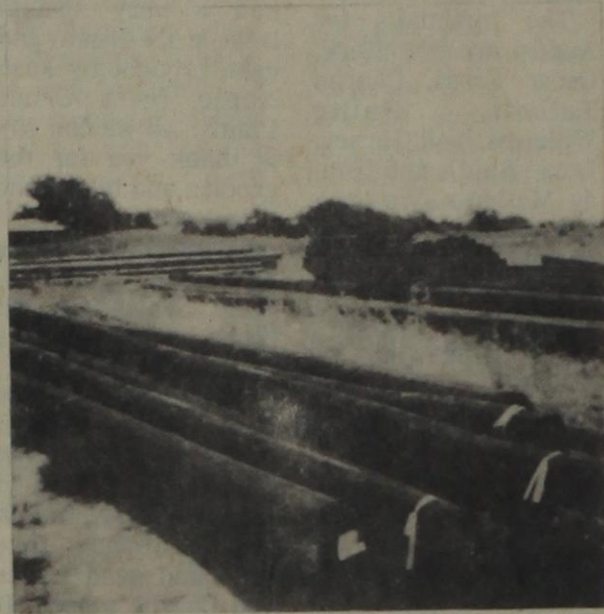
