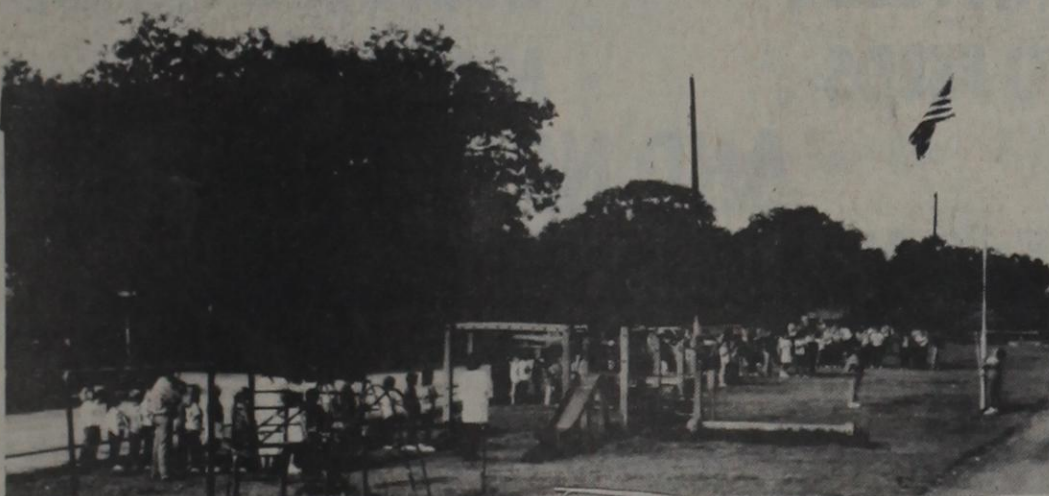

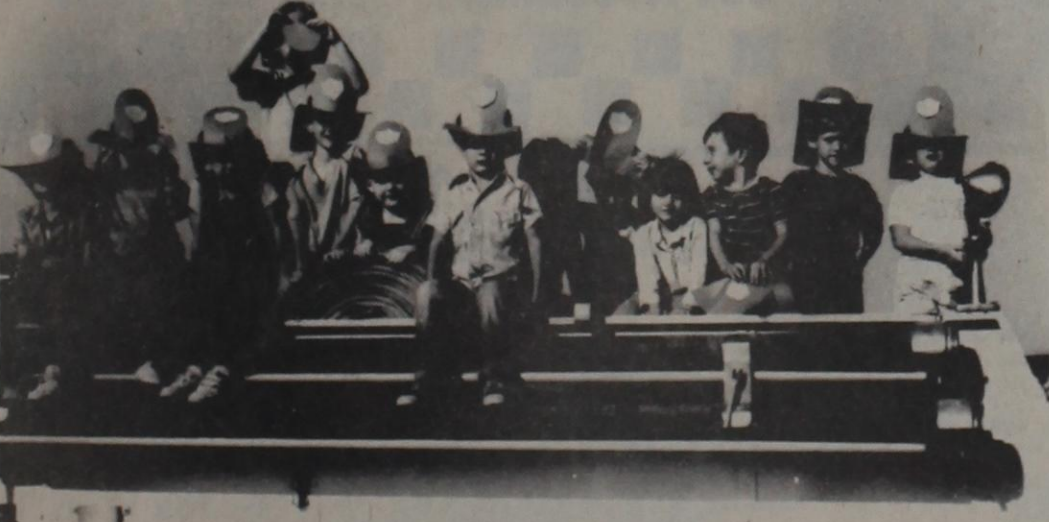


AWARD WINNERS Rising Star 4-Hers receiving awards

Judge Bailey Volunteer Proposition 1 Chairman

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey has been named as a Volunteer Campaign Chairman for Proposition 1 (The Good Roads Amendment) which will appear on the Nov. 8 General Election Ballot. He will serve in District 23/Brownwood, which covers Eastland and a number of other counties.

The November election is a vital one in many ways. Not only will citizens elect people to the highest national offices, but important state issues will also be decided.

Proposition 1 will be the first of three Constitutional amendments at the end of the ballot. In past elections, hundreds of thousands of voters have failed to mark their ballots on Constitutional Amendments.

Most did so because they didn't understand the importance of the proposed amendments, says the Texas Good Roads/Transportation Association. This is the challenge faced by a public education campaign on behalf of Proposition 1.

The amendment will read: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reim-

bursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways."

"This Proposition would clarify how the Texas money collected in excise taxes and other ways can be used when it comes back from Washington," Judge Bailey says. "A vote FOR will mean that the \$800 million a year which Texas receives back from the Federal Highway Trust Fund will continue to be used exclusively to improve our highways. It now covers 50-60 percent of highway construction.

"This Proposition could be very vital to Eastland County," the Judge adds. "Miles and miles of roads here need to be upgraded. Improvement of the road from Eastland to Stephenville could hinge on what happens to that amendment."

The Judge says that he is available to speak on the subject of Proposition 1, if desired. He also has more information for anyone who would like to look into the matter.

Harlan is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, Texas State Teachers Association, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Mu Alpha, and the Texas Association of Teacher Educators. He has been in public and higher education for more than 23 years.

Wildcats Win District Opener



Wildcats fans went wild, Friday, October 7, when the Cats defeated Gorman 30-0 in a key district opener. The first quarter started out a defensive battle with both teams being forced to punt. It was on the first play of Gorman's third offensive series when Wildcat Donny Alcorn caused a Panther fumble. Alan Havens came up with the loose pigskin and the Wildcat offense took over on Gorman's 45. The Panthers pushed the Cats back to the 48 and it was 2nd & 13 when Stacy Green broke into the open and ran 43 yards before being knocked out of bounds at the Panther 5 yd. line. Two plays later, quarterback Jimmy Evans followed Toby Long's block 5 yds. for the touchdown. Green's kick split the uprights and the Cats took the lead 7-0 with 1:40 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the Wildcat defense once again caused a Panther fumble. Larry Hollis received credit for the hit and the Cats recovered the bouncing football. Their drive was kept alive when Evans hit Derrick White for a 21 yd. pass play on 3rd & 11. The Wildcats looked to have another big play when Evans hit Reil Barron, but the referees threw the yellow flag. A controversial offensive pass interference call brought up 2nd & 25. The Cats failed to pick up the necessary yardage and had to punt. A fired up defense refused to allow the Panthers to move the ball. Stacy Green made the tackle and it was 2nd & 10. Larry Hollis followed with a backfield tackle and it was 3rd & 17 on the Panther 28 yd. line. Gorman tried to catch the Wildcats off guard with a quick kick on 3rd down, but the Wildcat defense swarmed the punter who took his eye off the football. Green recovered the dropped football and it was RS's ball on the Gorman 19 yd. line. The Cats picked up a first down and it was first and goal on the 8. Two penalties later, the Cats faced 1st & 20 when Gorman picked off Evan's pass to Barron. Gorman had the ball on their own one yd. line. The Wildcat defense rose to the challenge and it was 2nd & 9. Toby Long made the next tackle bringing up 3rd & 8. Long teamed up with Alan Haven on the next stop and it was 4th & 6 on the Panther 5 yd. line. Gorman's snap went over the punter's head giving the Wildcats a safety and a 9-0 lead with 2:05 left in the second quarter.

On Gorman's opening drive of the third quarter, the Wildcats received another controversial call which cancelled Reil Barron's interception and gave Gorman a 1st down on the Wildcats 10 yd. line. Once again the Wildcats showed excellent maturity when they failed to let the penalty

get them down. Stacy Green made the tackle and it was 2nd & 11. Alan Havens stopped the next Panther bringing up 3rd & 9. Lee DeLong and Reil Barron teamed up on the next tackle and it was 4th & 3. Brian Bailey made the next tackle deep in the Panther backfield and the Wildcats took over on their own 16. Despite a 17 yd. run by White, during this offensive series, the Cats were forced to punt. The Wildcat defense continued to dominate and the Panthers had to punt on 4th & 25 just as the third quarter buzzer sounded. The score read Home 9 Visitors 0.

Probably the key series of the 4th quarter came next. A tackle by DeLong brought up 2nd & 9, White sacked the quarterback and it was 3rd & 17, and Green, Long and Shawn Morrow stopped the Panthers bringing up 4th & 13 forcing the Panthers to punt. The Wildcat defense had harassed the punter all night and this was no exception. He had to hurry his punt and it was very short. The Wildcats had the ball on Gorman's 25 yd. line and the offensive line took over. Center Toby Long, guards Roanen Barron and Larry Hollis, tackles Bobby Flores and Alan Havens and end Donnie Alcorn simply dominated the defensive line of Gorman. Five plays later, White scored from the 1 yd. line and Stacy Green's PAT split the uprights. With 6:21 left in the game, the Wildcats led 16-0. On Gorman's next series, Johnny House made the backfield tackle forcing Gorman to go to the air on 2nd & 15. Reil Barron's interception on the next play gave the Wildcats the ball on Gorman's 34 yd. line. Exactly 1:09 after the last TD, Derrick White sprinted around Green's block and eluded tacklers 34 yds. to the end zone. Once again, Green's PAT was good and the scoreboard read Home 23 Visitors 0. Was that a smile we fans saw on Coach Allen's face? Surely not!

Toby Long had a fine defensive play when he blocked the Gorman punt and recovered the pigskin on the Panther 8 yd. line which set up the last score of the night. White scampered into the end zone for the 8 yd. TD.

Lee DeLong (who incidentally played with a broken hand!) held the snap for Green's PAT and for the 4th time, the kick was successful.

The Wildcats refused to give the Panthers an inch and Reil Barron came up with another interception giving the Cats the ball on their own 34 with :32 left in the game. This game was history as the Rising Star Wildcats defeated the Gorman Panthers 30-0 bringing their season record to 5 & 1.

Coach Allen felt the Wildcats had a very good game. He was extremely pleased with the offensive line. He was afraid the Wildcats would be down because starter Kevin Bond was sidelined with an injured knee and starter Lee DeLong had just found out he had broken his hand. But the Wildcats made the necessary mental adjustments and came out to play like champions. Next week, a young man who has patiently practiced and supported the Cats will finally get to see action as a fighting Wildcat. Damon Anderson will be able to suit out and Coach Allen feels he will be a great help to the Wildcats.

The heavily favored Wildcats travel to Lometa to play the Hornets next Friday, October 14. Remember, game time is 7:30, so try to be there on time to support the Cats in their quest for district Champions. Love that Blue.

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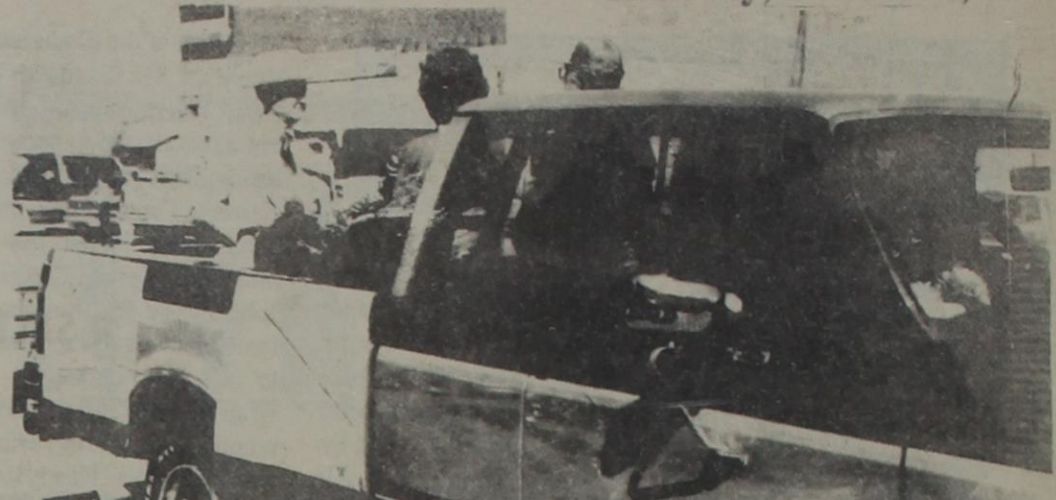

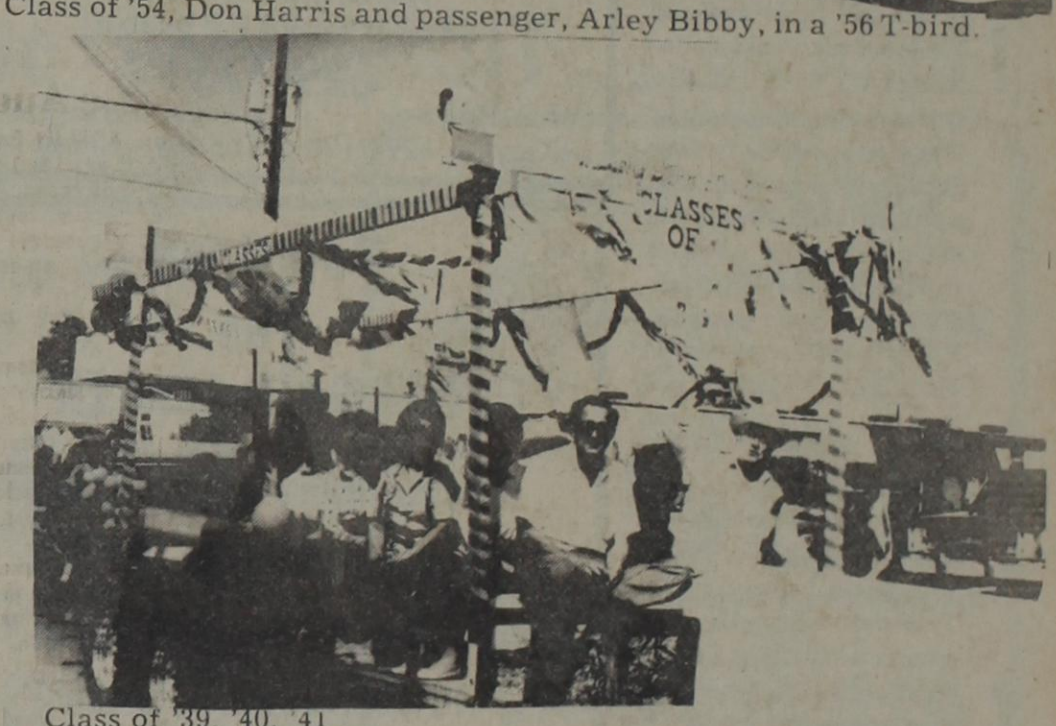

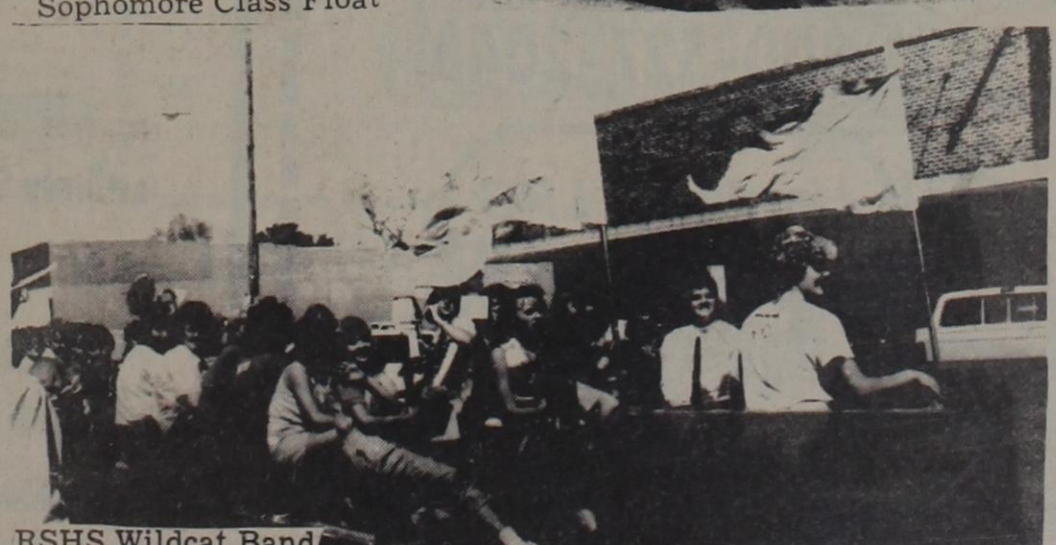
Dear Editor:
