Tax Rebate

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, 'and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April

Rising Star received a payment this period of \$2,513.42 as compared to a payment of \$2,596.12 received for this period in 1987 making a percent change of -3.19%. The 1988 payments to date for Rising Star total \$8,055.47 as compared to \$8,746.69 received to this date in 1987 making the change to date -7.90%.

David White, a senior in Rising Star High School, won the Class A pole vault in state track meet at Austin last Friday.

The win came after a jumpoff between David and Janson Corcoran of Follett. Both had cleared 14-0 then missed all three attempts at 14-6, resulting in a tie for first place. Neither had missed at lower heights and a jumpoff was the next tiebreaker.

With one jump at each height, both missed 14-6, 14-3 and 14-0. David's clearing 13-9 while Corcoran missed gave the Rising Star Wildcat his gold medal.

David had worked hard to improve his pole vaulting this season. He was third place in state last year and is very happy with the state championship.

Understanding Your State Government/The Sunset

Process Texas has a law which forces State government to systematically evaluate its activities and provides a means by which inefficient and ineffective State agencies may be abolished, unless re-created by the Texas Legislature. This program was established by the Texas Sunset Act, which went into effect in August, 1977. Since the inception of this Act, the Texas Legislature has continued 104 agencies, abolished 20 agencies, abolished an additional 5 agencies and transferred their functions. combined 6 agencies, and

legislation was the formation of the Sunset Advisory Commisssion, consisting of 10 members: 4 Senators and 1 public member appointed by the Lt. Governor and 4 Representatives and 1 public member appointed by the Speaker of the House. The Commission members serve four year terms.

It is the responsibility of the Sunset Advisory Commission to review State agencies, including evaluations of all agency programs, and present a final report of its findings and recommendations to the Texas Legislature for its consideration and action.

In 1985, the Legislature established an additional process to review proposed regulatory agencies and advisory committees. This is known as Sunrise. This program requires the Commission to review legislation proposing a new State agency and commission and to send a written response to the author of a bill and the

made through Sunset legislation in 1987 is \$62.4 million over the next five years. The most recent Commission meeting was held on separated 2 agencies. March 24th. Staff reports One provision of this and public testimony were given on five agencies; alternatives were suggested regarding allocation of research funds directly to

USDA Issues Peanut Poundage Interim Rule On Quotas For 1988-89 Agricultural Stabilization WASHINGTON -- The and Conservation Commit-

U.S. Department of Agriculture today requested public comment on an interim rule on poundage quotas for the 1988 to 1990 crops of peanuts.

The following are the most signigicant changes made by the interim rule:

-In a state where large quantities of quota pounds are in reserve, the State tee may allocate excess reserve quantities to quote farms after obtaining approval from the ASCS deputy administrator for state and county operatins.

-A peanut farmer who failed to plant the farm's full quota because notice of the final quota was not received by the end of the planting season, may make a fall quota transfer to another farm if ASCS determine that the farmer made a good faith effort to plant the full quota.

-Fall quota transfer rules have been relaxed for determining the number of pounds a farmer may receive under a fall transfer. The maximum number of pounds eligible to be receiv-

ed will equal the differences between the sum of the farm's ungraded and unmarketed pounds of peanuts of all segregation plus the pounds of unmarketed but segregation one peanuts. and the quota pounds remaining on the farmer's marketing card.

Directors of foundation seed organizations will be permitted to certify that breeder and foundation seeds have been grown for experimental purposes and will not be used for domestic edible use.



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






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

Gordon Spot

Fruit growers who were lucky enough to escape all frosts and freezes with no damage to the fruit, need to evaluate their crop at this time. Some trees do have an over abundance of fruit and they need to be thinned. Fruit such as peaches and plums should be evenly spaced on the tree with some 6 to 8 inches between fruit. Best results from thinning are obtained when fruit are thinned prior to pit hardening. Thinning after this point increases fruit size but the effect is not as dramatic. Prior to pit hardening, the fruit can easily be sliced into. Growers should check their crop and stage of fruit development and make thinning decisions accordingly. The earliest ripening varieties should be thinned

I know it is tough to take fruit off the trees when we have experienced freeze problems the past three years, but people still like large, pretty fruit and this can be accomplished by thinning the fruit.

Pecan casebearer spray time is fast approaching. Growers should start checking their trees for casebearer eggs on the tips



ONCE UPON A TIME IN TEXAS, there lived a newspaper that reported all kinds of things, from weddings to recipes to obituaries to local needs and deeds, to club and church news, to water and power rates, to local elections. 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
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

Dispatch Board Discusses 911 System

A discussion of the 911 Emergency System for Eastland County occupied most of a lengthy County Dispatch Board meeting in the Courthouse last Wednesday, May 11.

Mike Moore, President of the Board, led out in the meeting. Moore is City Manager at Cisco.

Two representatives of Southwestern Telephone Co, explained about the Emergency System. An official of the West Central Texas Council of Governments also attended. Representatives from all cities in the County were present - Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger and Rising

Among other matters, the Dispatch Board talked about the additional costs to the cities of setting up the Emergency Service.

"It appears that those present were supportive of getting the 911 System," Mike Moore said. "I thing we are looking at taking votes in respective cities within 60 days through required Resolutions.'

Implementation of the Emergency System, however, is a lengthy process, Moore explained. He said he expected it would take at least two years before 911 could be opera-

Under this System, the County Dispatch would handle all calls for fire, police and ambulance services. The surcharge on telephone service would not exceed 50 cents monthly per access

There would be county equipment used in the installation and maintenance, Moore said. There might also be the cost of additional personnell at the County Dispatch.


"It would be much easier to set up this System in Eastland County than some other places," Moore said. "Here we already have a unified, centralized Dispatch System. So members of the Board are optomistic about the acceptance of 911."

He went on to say that while the 911 Emergency Number System would benefit everyone in the County, two groups who would benefit most would be the elderly and the children.



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
