

Rising Star Independent School District's Board of Trustees has set a budget hearing for August 22 at 8 p.m. at the board room in the school office on North Main Street. The board will consider the proposed 1988-89 budget, vote on adoption of the budget and set a tax rate.

The school administration has recommended the board adopt the proposed budget and lower the tax rate from \$1.38 to \$1.36 per \$100 valuation, announced Dr. Donald E. Bryan, superintendent. The proposed lower tax rate is expected to generate \$302,748 in local revenues.

Total revenues and expenditures are expected to be \$969,438 for the coming year. Revenue from the general operating fund is proposed to be \$783,871; this covers expenditues for general operations, \$654,386; band, \$6,790; transportation, \$19,517; lun-\$42,941; chroom, cheerleaders, \$1,105; and athletics, \$32,632.

Other proposed revenues and expenditures include Chapter I, \$34,617; vocational, \$5,550; Chapter II, \$2,020; compensatory (SCE) \$37,974; and special education \$105,406. The amount for the mandantory sinking fund which services the school's debt is set at \$26,500.

Fire Destroys Garage and Pickup, Damages House



FIRE DESTROYED the garage and damaged the home of J.R. and Edythe Morrow August 7.

Fire completely destroyed the garage and damaged the home of J.R. and Edythe Morrow August 7. Their car and pickup suffered some damage and a pickup belonging to their son, Bob Morrow, was burned in the blaze.

The Morrows had delayed leaving for a family reunion until J.R. could get some hay out of a field and discovered the blaze about 11 a.m. when they were ready to go. J.R. had moved the family car out of the detached garage earlier to check the water in it and after seeing the smoke coming from the garage, he also moved his pickup out. The flames and heat scorched and melted places on the two vehicles and destroyed Bob's pickup which the men did not have a chance

The apparent cause of the blaze was the deep freeze, located near to the house in the garage. The freezer was filled with a summer's worth of shelled blackeyed peas, snapped beans and other garden and orchard produce by Edythe. She added that she had recently taken advantage of sales and added meat and ice cream to the freezer.

Other items lost to the fire include yard and garden equipment, many antiques and farm equipment and seed. Several tall trees and some shrubs were burned or damaged.

The Morrows nevertheless state how lucky they were that the fire was contained before more damage was done to their home. The wall and roof near the garage were burned and debris was beginning to fall through the ceiling of the bathroom damaged by the fire.

The smell of smoke had been noticeable but they had trouble locating the source, the Morrows said. They had searched throughout the house, not realizing the cause was in the garage where they could not see it.

Just as they located the fire, Mike Nall had spotted the smoke from Highway 36 and rode his motorcycle through the Morrow driveway to ascertain whether help was needed. He drove right on out and to the fire station where he sounded the alarm and waited several minutes for other firefighters to respond. When no one showed up immediately, he drove a fire truck to the scene. Later, Fred Rabe drove another truck and the Cross Plains Fire Department also responded.

When Buddy Cook saw the Morrow home threatened by fire, he helped J.R. find the city water line and hook up water hoses to spray the house to keep it from burning. The electricity to the Morrows' water well was cut off soon after

the blaze was discovred. Edythe Morrow raises miniature poodles and she was very grateful to those who helped move the dogs to safety. The heat from the burning garage could very well have killed the small dogs which were housed just several feet away.

The Morrows said how much they appreciated the help of everyone in putting out the fire and saving their home. Just a little while longer and the house would have been involved beyond the ability of the fire trucks to put it out. To them, the losses they sustained paled in comparison to what they could have lost and, even though they mourned the loss of family antiques and the hard work lost in the once full freezer, the Morrows repeated, 'We're so thankful it wasn't worse."



Drought Extends Signup for CRP

Texas producers will have more time to consider effects of the drought because of extension of the current signup period for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) through August 31.

This move by the U.S. Department of Agriculture should be a "plus" for producers who need more time to analyze the drought's impact, said Dr. B.L. Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The present signup period origionally was to have ended August 5.

Harris said cropland which has been haved in counties approved for drought relief is eligible during this signup for entry into CRP for the 1988 crop year, provided the land meets other program requirements," Harris said.

He said acreage designated as Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) and Conservation Use (CU) for the 1988 program year is not eligible for rntry into the

CRP for 1988. Under this conservation program, producers receive annual payments to keep highly erodible land out of production and planted with a protective cover which can include trees. Resides the

He said filter strips, or cropland areas 66 to 99 feet wide with a permanent cover and located next to streams, lakes and estuaries, will be eligible for CRP in this extended signup even if the cropland does not meet the soil erosion criteria.

"This provision was introduced in the sixth signup period last February to permit farmers to use CRP enrollment as a costeffective option to control nonpoint source pollution,"

If trees are to be planted, the land needs only one-third of its total area designated as "predominantly highly erodible" to be eligible for CRP, Harris said. He encouraged producers to plant additional cover to protect wildlife and serve as windbreaks.

Producers should contact their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) county offices for specific CRP program details.







bulge. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop's report, released July 27th calls on Americans to drastically reduce the amount of fat in their diets, citing its link to heart disease, stroke, cancer and diabetes.

The report supported recommendations already contained in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Dietary Guidelines and those given by the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society.

The major health organizations now advise Americans to reduce their fat consumption from about 37 percent of their total calories to 30 percent of their total calories.

. The problem for most people is not know that they should cut back on fat, but actually doing it. Cutting down or eliminating fried foods from your diet will significantly reduce intake of vegetable fats, but not remove them completely.

Vegetable fats are also found in commercial baked goods, boxed and frozen prepared foods, salad dressings, chips and snacks. Some of these vegetable fats, like coconut and palm kernel oil are also highly saturated fats.

The easiest way to reduce intake of animal fats is to always select lean meat, trim the visible fat from meat, remove the fat and skin from poultry and eat only low-fat dairy products.

It's also important that the fat be trimmed before the meat is cooked, since research has shown that some of the fat will migrate into the lean during the cooking process.

USDA research indicates that while Americans have reduced their intake of animal fats in the last several years, consumption of vegetable fats has increased.

A 1987 USDA study of middle-to upper-income women found they had cut back on eating red meat, for example, but were eating more croissants, ice cream and other high fat-foods. While the fat intake stayed about the same, the women were getting less iron, zinc and other minerals because they ate less meat.

Cutting back on red meat or any other food may not significantly reduce fat intake, unless you're careful about what foods are substituted.

With both more low-fat products and premium, high-fat foods available it's easy to fall into contradictory eating habits. RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Tomatoes are plentiful. This is a new recipe I have for Blender Ketchup. This recipe is from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist.

BLENDER KETCHUP 24 lb. ripe tomatoes

2 lb. onions 1 lb. sweet red peppers 1 lb. sweet green peppers 9 cups vinegar (5%) 9 cups sugar

½ cup canning or pickling 3 tbsp. dry mustard

11/2 tbsp. ground red pepper 11/2 tsp. whole allspice 11/2 tbsp. whole cloves 3 sticks cinnamon Yield: About 9 pints

Wash tomatoes and dip in boiling water for 30-60 seconds or until skins split. Then dip in cold water, slip off skins, core, and quarter. Remove seeds from peppers and slice into strips. Peel and quarter onions. Blend tomatoes, peppers and onions at high speed for 5 seconds in electric blender. Pour into a 3 to 4 gallon stockpot or large kettle and heat. Boil gently 60 minutes, stirring frequently. Add vinegar, sugar, salt, and a spice bag containing dry mustard, red pepper, and other spices. Continue boiling and stirring until volume is reduced one-half and ketchup rounds up on a spoon with no separation of liquid and solids. Remove. Process in boiling water bath for 20 minutes.



Sipe Springs Homecoming

JULY 31, 1988 Somebody had been praying for cooler weather Satur-

day and the prayer was answered! thunderheads popped up all around and a spattering of raindrops dropped the temperature, I wondered if an umbrella was needed as I headed toward Sipe Springs around 6 p.m.

You could bale hay with the tall Johnson grass growing along the right of way on Farm Road 1477. It was still green too.

The Nowlins had their place all spruced up for the homecoming with a fresh hair-cut on the grass, on up the roadside from the yard.

No traffic. I passed the Bo-K Ranch and only one pickup truck behind me as I neared Sipe Springs. A bale of hay was in the ditch where a load got out of balance on the

Signs and the Historical Marker pointed to the dusty lane toward the gathering place at the top of the hill.

Plenty of cars at the Ted Bartons! I later learned they had combined a family reunion with the annual homecoming.

The Saturday hours were from 7 until 10 p.m., with a musical and visiting on the agenda.

If you think you are going to be the first one under the tabernacle you had better camp up there! Cars, vans and pickup trucks lined the road adjacent to the tabernacle and cemetery grounds as the day waned.

The old mesquite trees guarded the water tanks in the usual place and cartons of paper cups were handy for the ice water. A dozen or so men were at the old wooden benches nearby, chatting and remembering when....

If a cemetery were chosen over the State of Texas the Sipe Springs grounds would rank number one. Members of the grounds committee are Duby Jones, James Wyatt, Neoma and Shelton Braeutigam, Jack Millwee, John McKeehan and Dick Wyatt. Citizens of the community take care of the their work, but the money is used on the restoration of the old wooden Masonic building which is now a community center. The money stays at home!




