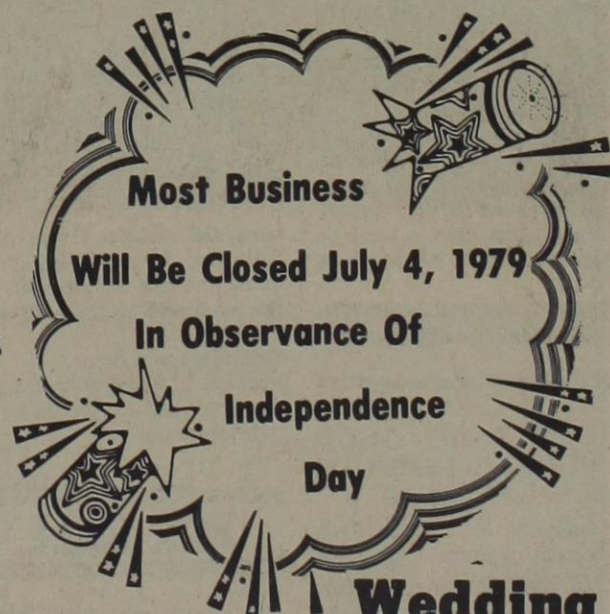

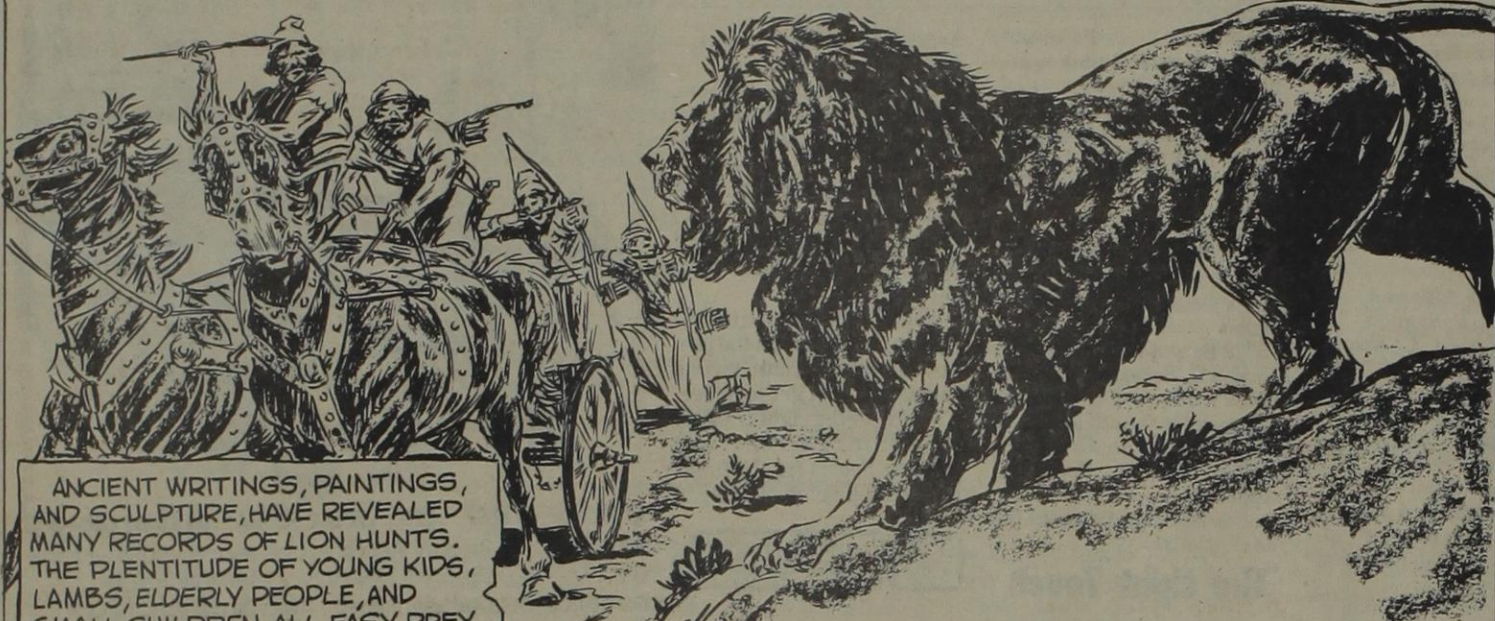

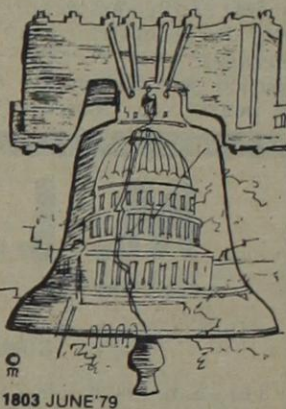

# GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

It's a bumper crop of wheat being harvested in Eastland County this year. Yields of 35 to 40 bushels per acre are being reported, and the price has improved too.

The wheat growers are long over due for a good year. Both yields and prices have been low for several years. For example in 1978 there were 8,000 acres of wheat planted in Eastland County, but only 600 acres harvested. The average yield was 13.3 bushels per acre.

This could be a great year for all agricultural products in Eastland County. Prices for cattle and hogs have been tops. Grass has been abundant throughout the spring. Good hay crops are being made now.

The fruit trees have large crops and the pecan trees could produce a record crop this year. I don't think we have ever seen as many pecans on the trees this time of year as we are seeing now.

It's much too early to know what the peanut crop will do. Planting was delayed because of wet weather, but most of the peanuts are planted now.

Now for the bad news - production cost continues to increase at a rapid rate, especially fuel and energy costs.

Eastland County producers and commercial pesticide applicators are reminded that certain pesticide products now on the market are restricted

and available for use only by or under the supervision of certified applicators.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act requires certification of commercial pesticide applicators but not of private applicators. However, the act authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators on a voluntary basis who wish to use or supervise the use of restricted-use pesticides in compliance with federal law (FIFRA).

The term "private applicator" means a person who uses or supervises the use of any restricted-use pesticide or state-limited-use pesticide for purposes of producing any agriculture commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal service between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person. The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) enables a private applicator to become eligible for certification by completing an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group or by home study including submitting a completed questionnaire to TDA following review of self-study material.

Private applicators may qualify through home study using self-study materials

available at the County Extension office.

Commercial-noncommercial applicator requirements for certification include written examinations administered by the appropriate certifying agency. The term "commercial applicator"

means a person who owns or manages a pesticide applicator business engaged in applying restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides to another's land. The term "noncommercial applicator" means a person or government agency or department which wants to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides and does not qualify as a private applicator and is not required to have a commercial applicator's license. Commercial-noncommercial applicator training is provided by District Pesticide Applicator Training Committees located at Texas A&M University Research and Extension Centers. Training is provided through workshops and by previous appointment through an autotutorial system available at each location.

Persons anticipating the need to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide products are encouraged to take advantage of these Extension training programs. Information regarding the private applicator program is available through the County Extension Office. Persons interested in commercial-noncommercial applicator training may ob-

## Supplementary Insurance Policies

Persons eligible for medicare health insurance benefits who seek to supplement their coverage by purchasing additional private insurance should be sure that they are not buying coverage already provided by medicare, warns Glyn Hammons, manager of the Abilene Social Security Office.

Hammons says that Dallas Regional Officials of HEW's Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), the Federal Agency that administers the medicare and medicaid programs, are concerned that many elderly medicare beneficiaries are being sold duplicative or overpriced supplementary insurance policies.

According to Jerry Sconce, HCFA's Regional Administrator, some medicare beneficiaries are being taken advantage of by a few scrupulous insurance agents, often posing as representatives of medicare or the Social Security Administration. Sconce has recently contacted

McRae, Sealy, Laughlin and Browder.

State Insurance Commissioners asking their cooperation in identifying and controlling such sales practices.

The problem is a costly one, said Sconce, citing a recent report by the U.S. House select committee on aging which estimated that senior citizens are "being taken" \$1-billion a year by a few insurance companies and their agents. The Committee report also noted that some companies which specialize in selling this type of insurance return an average of 50 cents on the premium dollar while others return as much as 90 cents for similar coverage.

Sconce urges senior citizens considering buying a supplemental plan to be sure that they are not duplicating existing medicare coverage and to seek out policies that pay a high return in benefits.

He further warned that any insurance salesman representing himself as connected with medicare or Social Security should be viewed with suspicion since no federal employee is authorized to engage in this activity. Sconce urged the public to report any such misrepresentation to the local Social Security Office and to the State Insurance Commissioner.
