Through 'lhe Editor's Specs

Ralph Kizer of the Kizer Telephone Company has just done some statistisc on his product and has come up with the interesting result that every telephone in the Rising Star and Cross Plans plants of the system is used an average of five times during a 24-hour period.

When you consider that the number of telephones in the two districts is about 1,500, you get a striking idea of the degree to which the use of the telephone here has increased over the past decade, or since the company replaced the old-fashioned ringer system of less than 300 stations (a telephone in the parlance of the ndustry is a station, with modern dial-

The statistics are real, too - not the product of guess work or involved and suspect formulae. Every time a call is made on a Kizer telephone a meter registers it. Not the conversation, of course - simply the contact. At the end of each 24-hour period the meter count is re-

corded. To get the number of calls during a particular 24hour period you simply subtract the earlier total from the later.

Any way you take it, that is a powerful lot of talking for two small communitiesa lot of business calls, a lot of social calls, teenager conversations, and a lot of neighborly visiting transfered from the backyard fence to the electronic highways which carry voices with a speed that rivals light. Now and then, perhaps, a mite of guarded gossip.

It just goes to show that if you serve a need the very provision stimulates greater and greater demand.





The new insecticide was quick to make history. Its effect on lice was particularly striking. It deloused heads in a few hours and they stayed deloused for several weeks.

Dr. J. S. Wiseman, a State Health Department entomologist, tells the story to illustrate the point.

During World War II, an American service officer visited a North African jail to delouse prisoners. The men assembled and the officer used a small hand sprayer to puff a small amount of DDT powder between the prisoners' skin and clothing,

As expected, there was a great deal of chaffing and hilarity in the face of what seemed to be such a childish procedure - compared with showers, shaving of heads, "stoving" of garments, and application of

When he had finished, the American, who had carried out his task with great thoroughness, said to the men:

"Tomorrow morning I will come back to check on the action of the powder. If any of you can present me with a live louse I'll reward him with a

easily qualify for them. They spent the whole night eagerly hunting for lice.

Next morning, when the ofofficer returned, the men assembled and brought out their catches. There were only 10 lice in all. Not a single man had been able to catch more than a single louse.

There was not a question about the success of the experiment, and the men began listening to their visitor with more respect. He made a fur-

ther offer. "Tomorrow," he told them, "I will come back and there will be \$10 and a whole carton of cigarettes for every live

louse." All the prisoners crowded around that day's winners to learn of their technique. The night was again spent in a frantic louse hunt. A whole box of cigarets! What luck!

But the next morning not a single prisoner could produce a live louse. The DDT had wiped them out



a newspaper and magazine schedule approved by the new Texas Tourist Development Agency for the balance of the fiscal year which ends August 31. Funds for the advertising, first ever made available by the state, were appropriated last year by the 58th Legislature..

It gave the TTDA a budget of \$292,292 for the biennium beginning last September 1. Of the amount, \$200,000 was earmarked for travel advertising, promotion and public relations, \$80,000 of which was spent during the current fiscal year beginning this September 1.

The first 11½ by 12 inch ads came at a time when most Americans are first beginning to think about where they will spend their vacations this year.

Texas will be presented to winter - weary northeasterners and midwesterners as a spot already offering summertime pleasures — at a time when much of the nation is still locked in ice and snow.

"Flowering cactus paint the desert while bluebonnets carpet the rolling plains. Green fairways roll to the shores of lakes where record bass lie waiting. And sure - footed quarterhorses follow the sunlit trails.

"Meet summer halfway in the big Fun-tier. — in Texas!" In an upper corner of the ad is a coupon which the reader is invited to clip and send to the TTDA for more expansive Texas travel literature.

"All we can hope for the ad itself to do is create suffident interest in the reader that he will want to know more about Texas." said Frank Hildebrand, TTDA executive director. " We will rely upon the material that we send in response to his coupon to further persuade him to plan a Texas vacation this year — to clinch

The "Fun-tier Folio" which will be mailed will contain copies of the colorful 32-page bro-chure, Texas — America's Funtier, and the 1964 Texas highway map as well as a phamplet, Texas Facts.

Publisher of the Fun-tier Folio, the Texas Highway Department, is cooperative with the TTDA in distributing the mat-

erial. The April ads in The New York Times and The Chicago Tribune will be followed by he same size ads in the newspap-
