All that pompous Bibica. rhetoric squandered upon incitement when, with true and perceptive purpose, it might have been devoted to a fruitful Inspiration! Whatever he and his disciples have accomplished with their "non-violent" marches it is nothing more than a resentful reemphasis of what everybody already knew and most people deplored. In the deficit column must be placed a serious impairment of the common bond of true brotherhood and the mutual effort in which alone resides the hope of improvement. He suggested nothing of value to remedy what he fought. And what he could have accomplished!

Over against the phoniness of Martin Luther King I place the noble figure of another of his race, a man whom I consider one of the greatest Americans this country has produced. No other figure in American history has better exemplified the real American tradition.

George Washington Carver rose from a humble background of slavehood to become one of the outstanding scientists of his day. He did it in defiance of poverty, and what is more impressive, in spite of a handicap than which there can be little worseracial prejudice.

It may be difficult for many of us here in this sandy, mid-central portion of Texas, to realize that our prosperity is due in largest measure to the work of a Negro man. But it is true. The peanut industry owes more to Dr. Carver than it owes to any other single individual, white or black.

As a member of the faculty of Tuskogee Institute in Alabama, he was moved by the economic plight of the Negro tenant farmer and the "pore white trash" of the South and set himself toward improving their lot, not by inciting his people to stone and missle and torch, but by giving them the means of self-help and peaceful revolution.



Funeral services were held at the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel at 3 p. m., Wednesday, April 24. Burial was in May cemetery under Higginbotham direction.

The importance of this project estimated to cost 2 million dollars cannot be overemphasized to Eastland and Comanche counties. Enginers studying the watershed last October suggested a total of some 33 structures along the route of the stream, 13 of which would be classed as major sites and 20 as small structures. Area farmers and ranchers have long endured the damaging effects of flooding along the Sabanna. At the same time they have lost the use of the valuable volume of water moving downstream during heavy rainfall periods. Both situations can be alleviated to a large degree through completion of this project. However, it should be quickly pointed out that the success of this project is equally important to all residents and businesses in the Watershed Communities because of the potential eral economy.
