The Texas goal is to make these purchases available to 274,000 students this year. During the 1952-53 school year, Defense Stamp purchases were made available to 249,907 Texas students.

Through the courtesy of Mayor Walter Smith, we find that the total rainfall for October of this year was 6.10 inches. Last year it was zero. Total rainfall to date for the ten month period is 26.64. In 1952 it was 13.20, Over twice as much. Average annual rainfall for this area is 27.51 inches.

The recent rains have hurt some. Especially those who had peauts dug and on top of the ground. Of course there will be some loss. 
