### Temperature Drops To 64 Wednesday

Fall-like weather settled over the Rising Star area early Wednesday morning, brief in duration but a pleasant respite from the succession of 100-degree days which have scorched this section during July and early August.

Temperatures fell to a low of 64 degrees Wednesday morning after a cool night and a series of cloudy days. But later in the day the temperature started its climb back into the levels which have brought a series of 14 100-degree days in July and four such days in August.

The Wednesday morning low was 44 degrees less than the 108-degree maximum which was registered here for Tuesday, July 30.

The methods of Communism are succinctly described by a top authority, Mao Tse-tung, Chief of the Communist Chinese State: "We in China . . . have used force to deal with enemies of the people. The total number of those who were liquidated by our security forces numbers 800,000. This is a figure up to 1954." Since then, he added, "persuasion and education" have been substituted for terror.

The hot debate over recent Supreme Court decisions led U.S. News & World Report to state: "What the country is seeing is a great and growing struggle between the three subordinate branches of the Federal Government. A comparable struggle has not been seen in this century."

According to Senator Byrd, this country's total debt-of the federal government, the states and local government, corporations and individuals—is \$525 billion. That represents an increase of \$200 billion—one third—in four years.



## Farm Prices Still Lag Behind Rest Of U. S. Economy

COLLEGE STATION.—Agric ltural prices and income have n a enjoyed the rises that some s ments of our economy have in recent years because of sur-

uses or lack of larger markets. Prices received by farmers have increased only 1.3 percent over those of May 1956. But prices paid by farmers have increased 3.5 percent and parity ratio in May stood at 82 compared to 84 in May 1956, says John McHaney, extension econornist Consumer disposable insome in the first quarter of 1957 was more than 5 percent above a year ago; due mainly to increases in wages and salaries. Too, the cost of living stood a ffew percentage points higher Ahan a year ago, says McHaney.

General business activity looks good for the rest of 1957. Busimess outlays for new plants and equipment during the first 9 months of 1957 will be about 9 percent larger than those for the same period in 1956. Apparentby, businessmen are generally optimistic about their future sales

But the economist says that re should not overlook the fact that consumer credit outstandin May was 7.3 percent greater than in May 1956; in some industries, inventories remain large relative to sales; output of durable goods and autos dropmed 4 to 14 percent respectively from December 1956 to May 1957; and steel mill activity has declimed from around 100 percent . at rated capacity in the fourth quarter of 1956 to a low of 84 in mid-May. There was a pick up to 38 percent of capacity in mid-June but the usual decline as expected in July and August, points out McHaney.

Agricultural exports through April of the 1956-57 fiscal year were estimated at \$4 billionan increase of 43 percent over year ago. Cotton exports were about 7.5 million bales, compared to 2.2 million in 1955-56.
