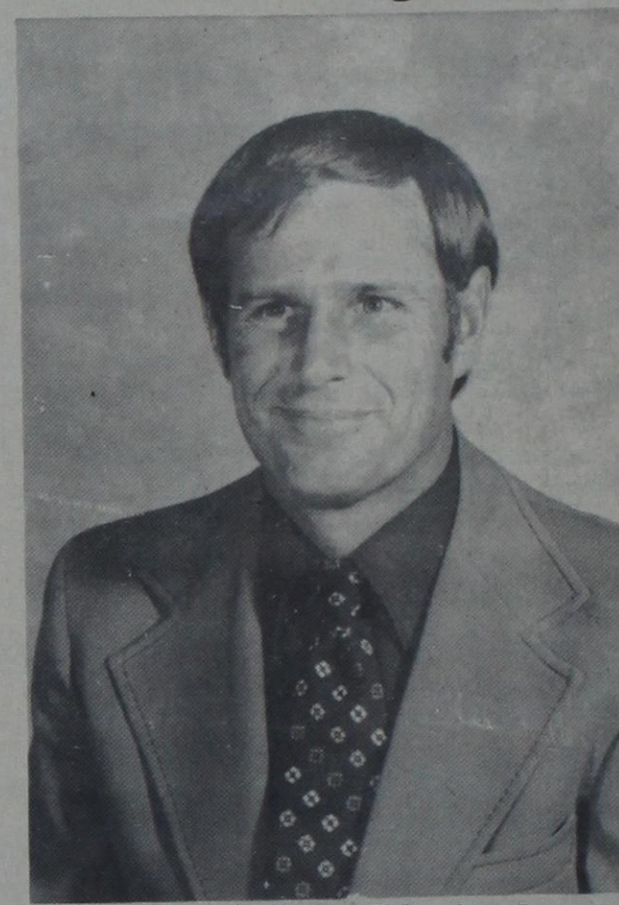
## NARFE Meets Tues.

"Our office has a special unit set up to take all types of applications," he noted.

"By using the telephone, you will not only save time and energy, you'll save the frayed nerves caused by a wait in the office," he explained. "Besides that, you'll be where the documents and information are and not have to run home to get them," he added.

"This procedure is simple," Hammons explained. "You call 698-2815 to apply for benefits and a special teleclaims expert asks you the necessary questions, records your answers on the forms, and mails it to you for your signature and return with any necessary documents in the self-addressed envelope provided. Your documents are returned after being photocopied."

Since most applications by telephone are accomplished so quick-

ly, many employers are allowing their retiring workers to call from work to apply.

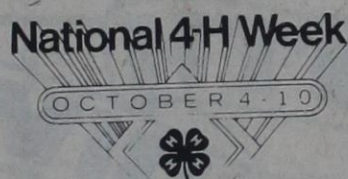

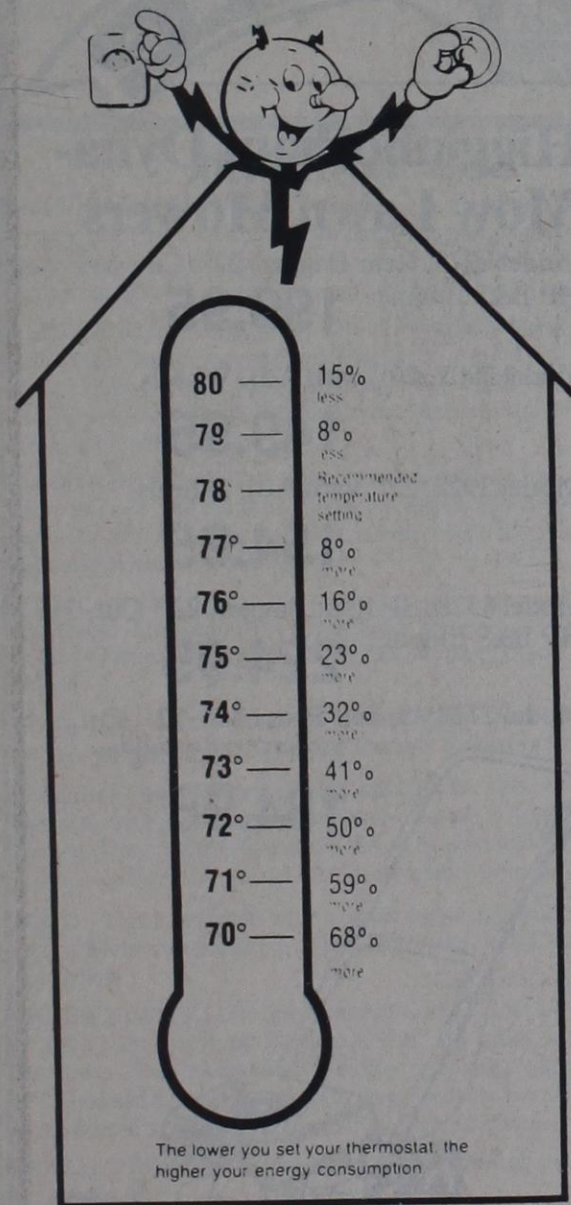

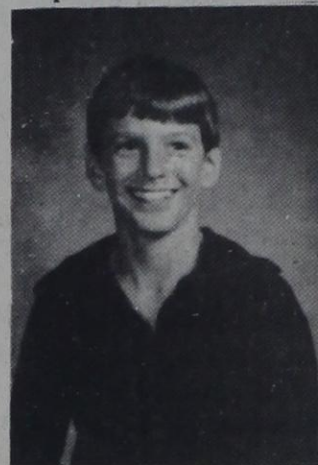
This year I went to 4-H camp which was a lot of fun. We had dif

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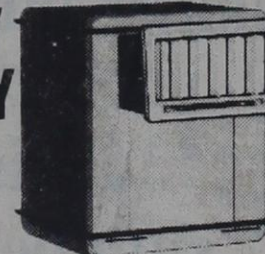

Stephanie Pat Long is ten years old and the daughter of Tony and Barbara Long. This is her second year in 4-H.

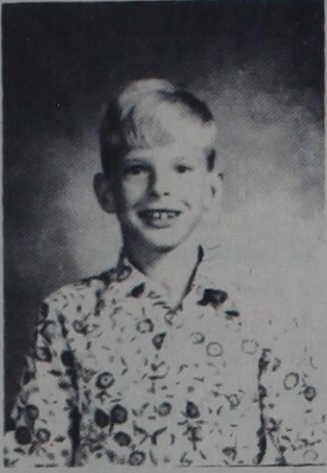

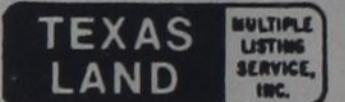

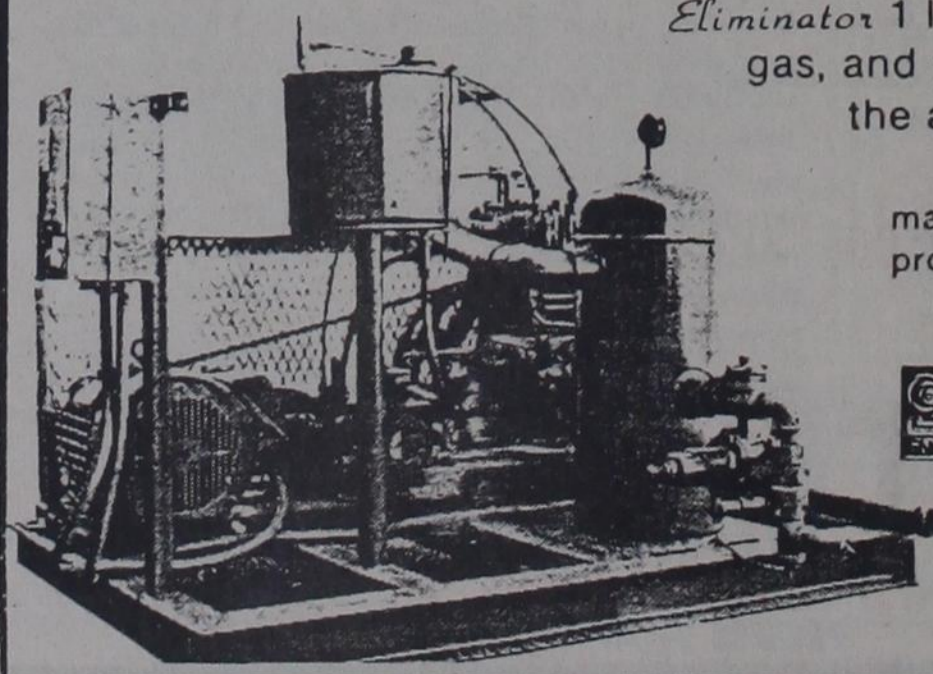

## Fall Gardening

COLLEGE STATION—Although there is still plenty of hot weather ahead, it's time to start getting things in shape for your fall vegetable garden.

Much of Texas is well suited for year-round gardening, and fall vegetables generally have better quality flavor than those grown in the spring, says Dr. Sam Cotner, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Many popular warm season vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, potatoes, okra, cucumbers and squash can be planted during the coming weeks.

Also, the so-called "winter" vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, greens, parsley and carrots can be planted now for early harvesting. Later plantings of these cold-hardy crops will supply fresh vegetables well into winter.

What are some of the important aspects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape, suggests Cotner. If you had a garden this spring and fertilizer was

applied, little if any additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, apply two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 per 100 square feet and work it into the soil, recommends the horticulturist. If plants make slow growth, apply a light amount of fertilizer between rows and water it into the soil.

Adequate water is vital for a successful fall garden, particularly for seed germination and early plant growth. Cotner suggests "pre-irrigation" before planting followed by subsequent, light waterings three or four times a week to keep soil from drying and crusting. Water stress during early growth of plants can reduce later yields.

Transplanting is good practice in the fall since this allows seed to be started in areas sheltered from high temperatures and drying winds. Check at garden centers for recommended varieties of vegetables and strong, vigorous, healthy plants. Or you may want to grow your own transplants, notes the horticulturist.

## Back To School Fashion-Economy Tips

COLLEGE STATION—Clothing for children going back to school need not be expensive, says Nancy Brown, a clothing specialist.

When choosing back-to-school clothing, consider the child's preferences and activities, styling, fabric type and care factors. Also, pay special attention to choosing shoes, the specialist says.

Brown is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

## PLANNING SCHOOL WARDROBES

In planning your child's school clothing purchases, remember that garment styling is very important to youth. They like "fit-in" with crowd which means wearing clothing similar to their peers. Therefore, observe what his friends are wearing, brown advises.

Plan to take your child shopping with you. Prepare him for what you are looking for, too, before you go. When you do go shopping, shop for only him, as children get tired of shopping if there are many other tasks to be done, the specialist reminds.

Make a list of specific items needed before you go. Also include the quantity needed.

Consider the child's growth patterns when deciding how many of each item to buy. Purchasing a lot of clothes he may grow out of in three months is expensive.

Also, consider purchasing two or three outfits that can be mixed and matched for a more useful wardrobe.

Evaluate what special activities the youth may be involved in, too.

If special clothing will be needed for each activity, consider these as a share of the clothing budget. Decide if parts of these garments could be worn with his regular school clothing for a wardrobe extender.

Unplanned expenditures such as special-activity items can wreck a budget. However, such clothing may be very important to the youth and should be planned for.

## STYLES, FABRICS, CARE

Choose styles and fabrics that will grow with the youth. Raglan sleeves, cuffs on pants, large hems in dresses and tops are features that can add to the wear-life of a garment, the specialist says.

Knits, especially cotton or cotton-polyester, are easy to care for and have stretch for comfort.

Choose durable fabrics such as denims and corduroy to withstand children's abuse and repeated laundering.

**CHILDREN'S SHOES**  
Always take special care in choosing shoes, Brown advises.  
Select at least two pair that can be interchanged for longer wear and comfort. Have a reputable shoe salesman determine your child's size.  
Then choose sturdy shoes that provide support. Children should not wear hand-me-down shoes, because such shoes force children's feet to conform to the footprint already in the shoe, Brown says.

**DAILY BAG LIMITS**

**MOURNING DOVES**  
Daily Bag Limit - 12  
Possession Limit - 24

**WHITE-WINGED DOVES**  
Daily Bag Limit - 10  
Possession Limit - 20

**NOTE:** Bag limits of both white-winged and mourning doves may be taken during the open white-winged dove season.

**SHOOTING HOURS:**  
Mourning doves: 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.  
White-winged doves and mourning doves during the Sept. 5, 6, 12, and 13 season: noon to sunset.

**OPEN SEASONS**

**MOURNING DOVES:** North Zone - Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1981. South Zone - Sept. 20-Nov. 2, 1981, and Jan. 2-17, 1982. In the shaded counties of the South Zone, mourning doves may be taken on Sept. 5, 6, 12, and 13, during the white-winged dove season. In these South Zone counties, the fall open season for mourning doves will close Oct. 29.

**WHITE-WINGED DOVES:** Shaded area - North and South Zones - Sept. 5, 6, 12, 13, 1981.

**SPECIAL NOTES:**

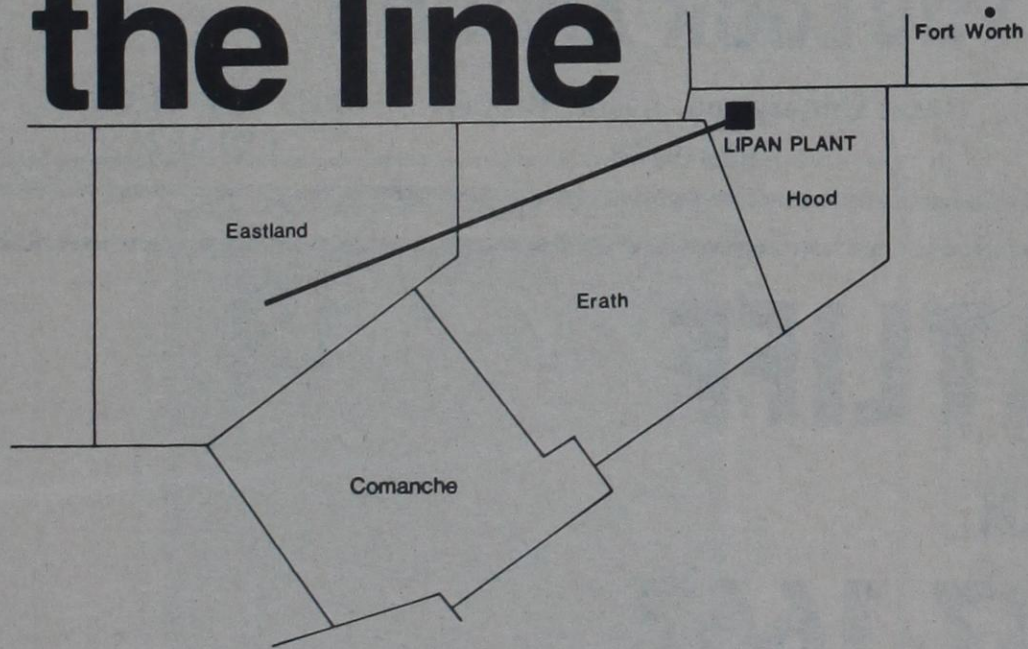
- No person shall possess more than one daily bag limit of freshly killed migratory game birds while in the field.
- Any freshly killed migratory birds given to another person, except at the residence of either the person giving or receiving the birds, must have a tag attached signed by the hunter who took the birds stating his address, total number of birds of each species and the date birds were taken.
- No hunting permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or from public roads or road rights of way.
- No hunting is permitted in closed sanctuaries (see reverse side) during white-winged dove season.
- The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties lying south and west of a line bounded by and including Culberson, Jeff Davis, Brewster, Terrell, Val Verde, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Wilson, Karnes, Bee, San Patricia, and Nueces counties at all times. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, and may not be larger than 10-gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.
- A White-winged Dove Stamp for a \$3.00 fee is required of all persons who hunt white-winged doves. This stamp is required in addition to the valid hunting license.
- Hunters who bring in wild game birds or animals from the Republic of Mexico must obtain a **federal statement** from a U.S. Customs official at a port of entry which shows the wildlife was brought from the Republic of Mexico.

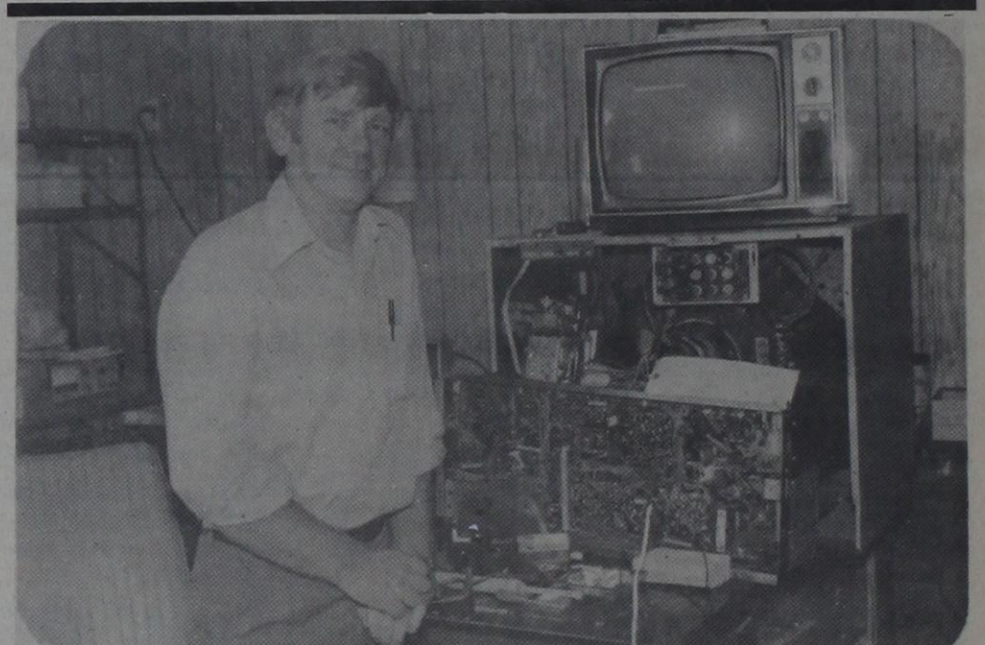
