

"New" Kaleidoscope Flags **Travel Far And Near**

Mr. and Mrs. Carl A. Smith, the originators and overseers of "Kaleidoscope of Freedom", have reported that a second set of the historic flags has been made, so that the popular project can be available for local and area use.

Mrs. Smith said that these flags are identical to the original ones, only smaller in

Rising Star Has Productive Year **Bicentennial Events**

Bicentennial Committee On Thursday, February 12, 1976, some 20 people met in the Community Room of the First State Bank in Rising Star to formulate plans for Rising Star's participation in the nation's Bicentennial celebration. At that time, Emmett Lasater, Chairman of the Eastland Bicentennial Committee, gave a general outline of requirements and procedures for securing recognition as a National and State Bicentennial Community.

After initial adjustments, the three b basic committees were organized, with Mrs. Jackie LeBleu as the Chairwoman of the Heritage '76 Committee, Travis Williams as the Chairman of the Festival USA Committee and R.D. Williams as the Chairman of the Horizon '76 Committee. Owen Aikin serves as the General Bicentennial Chairman for Rising

On February 20, application was made for Rising Star to be designated as a National and Texas Bicentennial Community. This recognition was granted by the Texas Bicentennial of Austin on March 11, and subsequently by the National Bicentennial Administration on April 15, 1976. Upon notification of Rising

Star's recognition as a National flower of Rising Star, with a Bicentennial Community, plans formal planting at the City were laid to coordinate the presentation of the National and State Certificates, along with the official ARBA flag, with the opening parade of the Rising Star Summer Rodeo season, on Saturday, May 22. Joe Hodges, Banker and Civic leader of Abilene, and the Texas Bicentennial representative for this area, spoke and made the presen-

projects already accomplished are: a patriotic musical program by the Crowley's Ridge College Chorus, of Paragould, Arkansas, on February 21; the formal presentation of the flags used in the H Historic Pageant: "Kaleidoscope of Freedom" (first presented in 1975 in Rising Star) to the MacArthur Academy of Freedom in Brownwood, on March 2, 1976; a display of antique lighting devices and Open House by the West Texas Utilities Company in Rising Star; the launching of the Rising Star Summer Rodeo season, on May 22; and a recital of patriotic and sacred music from the last 200 years by Kay Gray and James Steel on June 5.

Storm Damage



May Correspondent An official Texas Historical Survey Committee plaque proudly tells tourists to the south Texas town of Donna that the building they are looking at is the "First American Legion Hall built or owned by any post in the world.

The historical building was built and dedicated in 1920 by the Border Post No. 107 of the American Legion. The building was recorded as a Texas Historic landmark in 1969.

The American Legion Post was organized in November, 1919, when a group of World War I veterans met in the Donna High School business building. The charter for the Post was approved in February, 1920, and the fifteen charter members went to work on a building.

The hall has been used over the years by many people of the community and for many purposes. During World War II, the Donna Post turned the building over to the National Guard for their use during this time. This remains as one of the most outstanding contributions of the Post.

The Post also came to the aid of many during the most crucial days of the Depression, 1929 - 1931. The Border Post No. 107 fed 3,000 transient people who were without Word spread throughout the Valley that food was available at the Donna American Legion Hall and people came from throughout the area.

Located in the geographical heart of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the original charter for the City of Donna was granted by the state on December 3, 1904. One thousand acres was allotted for the townsite, and the completion of the railroad

to the Donna townsite soon followed. In 1908, 30 carloads of onions, cucumbers and other vegetables were shipped from the town. The City of Donna received, then, an award from the railroad for having shipped more produce that year than any other station on the St. Louis, Brownsville, and Mexico Railroad. A new city charter was approved February 19, 1957, thus contributing to the start of new growth for the progressive

Through the years, the Donna American Legion Post has repeatedly helped to meet the needs of community and area people. As visitors to the historic site are told, "You can brag about seeing and visiting the First American Legion Post in the world. Plans are in the making to make the Donna Legion Post No. 107 a National Shrine.'
