



Separate yolk and whites of hard cooked eggs. Force yolks through a sieve. Mince the whites into 1 recipe of medium white sauce. Toast and butter 2 slices of bread. Spread the white sauce over the toast and sprinkle yolks over the top. Garnish and serve.

And to go with some of the other eggs you just "happen to have on hand" after Easter Sunday, fix an extra special bread. My Mom has a favorite that just hits the spot. The name? Easter Lilies. Most appropo, don't you think ?! The reason they are named this is that the dough is shaped to resemble an Easter lily and a filling in the center makes the stem area of the flower. Mom always mixes her own delicious roll dough, but you could easily shape prepared doughs such as the refrigerated crescent dinner rolls into the trumpet shape that is the Easter lily. Here's the recipe for the filling and you can take it from there. Be sure to put a simple icing on the rolls while they're still hot for extra goodness.

EASTER LILY ROLLS FILLING: 2 Tablespoons sugar 1-2 cup raisins 1-4 cup chopped nuts 1 tablespoon flour 1-4 cup boiling water Mix sugar and flour. Add raisins and water. Simmer 10 minutes to thicken. Add nuts. Cool.


