COMPACT OF II Corinthians 3:1-6: Do we begin again to commend ourselves? or need we, as some others, epistles of commendation to you, or letters of commendation from you? Ye are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read of all men: Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ







Loss of Memory? Get It Back

"sharp" lately? "Ah, just getting older,"

you say? Millions of people think

failing memory and aging are like the proverbial horse and carriage-"can't have one without the other." Not true, says Judith L. Warren, a family life education specialist-aging. Here are some factors that really do affect memory: .Job satisfaction.

Disappointments of all types. Family stresses. Security. FORGETTING--A SYMP-TOM

Forgetting actually is a symptom of something else, Ms. Warren says. Many people over age 50 begin experiencing losses in their world-some real, some

imagined. Failing memory often is a SYMPTOM of the person's feelings about these other losses, she says. Once something, even a

name, slips his mind, then his anxiety about "all the losses lately" starts to grow, and this does affect mental alertness. At that point, the person

assumes his mind is "beginning to go," too. "I'm getting senile" may be said jokingly, but this label is very disturbing to any older adult, the specialist em-

phasizes. Ms. Warren is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M

University System. SENILITY -- MUCH TREATABLE

Feeling you aren't quite as have a correctable problem. 'SAME OLD' BRAIN

> Basically, everyone has the "same old" brain they had all of their adult life, Ms. Warren says.

Even though scientists do think the brain starts to lose cells after a person reaches their 20's, recent research suggests the brain doesn't really change very much with age, IF there is a stimulating environment.

A SLIGHT 'SLOWDOWN' There IS a seemingly slight "slowdown" in the brain's working capacity, however, the specialist explains.

"Think of it this way: it takes more time to process 60 years of information, for example, than it does to process 20 years of it," Ms. Warren says.

"Still, while it may take more time, the quality -or end result-is not decreased," she adds.

MEMORY 'LOSS'?-CHECK IT OUT

If you think you're becoming "forgetful" or feel you are losing your mental edge, take a close look at your life, the specialist advises.

Maybe it's time to say "no" to being on the sixth committee or that extra project.

Maybe just the simple realization that disappointment-personal or professional-happens to all of us will help," Ms. Warren stresses. If that doesn't help, and

your loss of memory continues, check with a doctor who does not dismiss com-





IPM Lecture Saturday



INNER PEACE MOVEMENT lecturers, Susan Green and Terry Brumfield, will conduct a lecture and workshop in Cisco this Saturday at the Community Room of the First National Bank at 7:30 p.m.



A lecture on Inner Peace Movement (IPM) will be held at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, May 23, in the Community Room of the First National Bank in Cisco. The lecture by Terry Brumfield and Susan Green, both of Breckenridge, will be followed by a workshop for those interested.

Not All **Are Pests** Insects Contrary to the beliefs of

many people not all insects are harmful or pestiferous. Only about 3% of the approximately one million known insects are pests. Of those that are left about 7% are classified as beneficials, the rest are of no consquence to man.

However the 3% which are pests have given the entire class of aniamsl a bad name. Everyone has had some experience with a Mosquito or Ant bite, a Cockroach scurrying across the kitchen floor, Fleas on their pet, or Tomato Horn Worm devouring their prize tomatoes.

It is because of these personal bad experiences or social conditioning that we often over react when we encounter any Insect in the yard or garden. Of course none of us want to share our Homes with any unwanted guests.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that many Insects perform valuable services for us all. Bees are involved in the tedius work of pollination of many fruit and vegetable crops. Many Insects are involved in the breakdown of dead animals and plants.


Probably the most beneficial work done by Insects is the control of other Insect populations. Insects which feed on other Insects fall into two classes: Parasites and Predators.

The Beneficial Parasitic Insects which live on or in other Insects are usually Flies or Wasps. These Flies or Wasps lay their eggs on or in soft bodied adults (such as Aphids) or Larvae (such as Leaf Feeding Catepillars). After the eggs are hatch the Larvae of these Flies or Wasps feed on the Pest Insects.

The moral of the story is you shouldn't always kill an Insect just because he's an Insect. You might be killing one that does Mankind a ser-






