### **Federal Judges Rule For Texas** Legislature Redistricting Plan

A three-judge federal panel in Washington ruled Wednesday that a redistricting plan approved earlier this year by the Texas Legislature should stand.

This threw a cloud over the State Senatorial races, which are opening under a redistricting plan drawn in 1992 by three **Texas Federal Judges.**



## **District Budgets in Texas**

To provide more information for Rising Star area taxpayers, figures for Rising Star, May and Cross Plains school districts are included in this report.

AUSTIN - Despite widespread reports last Fall of " school budget cuts, trustees adopted the largest spending increase in history-\$1.8 billion more. Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending.

Spending was \$1.4 billion more than budgeted revenue, and trustees increased school taxes by a billion dollars. However, when the beginning balance of \$4.2 billion is included, resources far outpaced expenditures.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1991-92 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based. educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,979 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$617 per student for capital outlay. Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD's budget provided

\$4,976.51 (\$4,841.96) (4,204.46) per student for current operations, \$-0-(\$88.05) (\$176.01) for debt service, and \$3,436.46 (\$722.05) (\$382.62) per student for capital outlay based on the 227 (227) (446) students enrolled in October 1991.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD in October 1991 was \$21,849 (324,000)(\$24,768) plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$34,769 (\$41,054)(\$37,688), and \$26,866 (\$22,894) (\$23,840) for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD would have been \$991 (\$921) (\$800). If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$791 (\$862) (\$614). That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$998 and \$793 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD's revenue from the property tax decreased by 13% (increased by 10%) (increased by 19.7%) for 1991-92 as compared to a 12.0 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4,835 (\$5,138) {\$4,426} per student in Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD as compared to \$3,969 statewide.

The state and the county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program,

which averaged \$2,784 per student last year and was \$3,852 (\$3,769) (\$3,879) in Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD. Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$831 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$354 per student to guarantee

the tax yield in propertypoor districts. Enrichment by Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD was \$403 (\$801) {\$224}; the state guarantee added \$580 (\$569) [\$323].

For the coming school year, there will be \$1.3 billion more for 1992-93 school budgets without any tax increase by school trustees other than the 10-cent increase by county education districts. That will consist of \$627 million from the county tax

plus \$684 million more state aid already appropriated by the legislature, the report concludes.





Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,236 per student, as compared to \$3,648.63 (\$3,437.31) (\$3,163.57) in Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 11.6(13)(11.4) students in Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.3 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.274 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.8% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.259 (\$1.274 times 98.8%) statewide. In this area, Rising Star (May) (Cross Plains) ISD imposed a rate of \$1.240 (\$1.180) (\$.955) including \$.886 (\$.783) (\$.825) by the county. Property was appraised at 94% (99.5%) (105.6%) of its market value making the true rate \$1.165 (\$1.174) (\$1.009) per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

FEWER FED CATTLE TRANSLATE INTO HIGHER PRICES

Retail beef prices could take a slight jump in the fall due to fewer cattle in feedlots now.

Texas and Nebraska, the two largest cattle feeding states, cut May placements from a year ago by 11 percent and 5 percent, respectively, said Dr. Ernest E. Davis, a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

ice "It will help the ranchlevel cattle market, definitely," Davis said. "If the fed cattle market goes, everything else will, too."

However, he doesn't expect retail prices to rise drastically because the and sell to consumers, currently is large.

Traditionally, if retailers have a large price spread, they do not immediately lower prices when wholesale beef prices decrease. Conversely, the price spread acts as a cushion. "If wholesale prices increase, retailers are rather reluctant to raise their prices immediately," Davis said.

"The price increase would depend on the retailers and how much they want to push their price up," he said. "However, the price should not go up much more than 6 cents, to \$2.94 per pound (average retail price), for the remainder of the year," he said.

The June Cattle on Feed report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture indicated that cattle feeders still are cautious about placing cattle on feed due to record losses felt last year, he said. Wholesale prices for 400 to 500-pound steers, for example, dropped from highs of \$115 per hundredweight in June of 1991 to \$9i per hundredweight in December.

During May, the seven major cattle feeding states placed 1.72 million cattle in feedlots, down 3 percent from a year ago and down 6 percent from the S-year average of May placements.



## **Social Security Obligations** For Hiring Household Help

In million of families, both the husband and wife now hold full-time jobs. Many of these families are hiring household workers to help them care for preschool age children, or to keep up with daily household chores. What these increasingly

typical American families may not know is that when they hire household help, they are probably required to pay Social Security taxes for the person they employ.

"Family 'employers' may not even realize that they are employers," said Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn S. King, when she was in Abilene recently. "And even those who are aware of that fact may not know that their household workers are sacrificing valuable Social Security protection when Social Security taxes aren't paid and when the employee's wages aren't reported to Social Security. These workers could lose their

eligibility for survivors, disability, retirement, and Medicare benefits-the entire Social Security coverage package."

How does a family who hires household help know if they are considered an "employer" under the law?

Generally, if an employer pays a household workers \$50 or more during a three-month period, that employer must also deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages to both Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service.

Why is the issue of coverage so important for domestic workers? All Social Security bene-

individual works and the amount of wages reported for him or her by each employer. Even part-time, seasonal, or temporary work can increase the future benefits amount for workers and their families. It also may provide current insurance against loss of income if the family breadwinner is disabled or dies before retiring.

Household workers should make sure that they are getting proper credit for work and that Social Security taxes are paid on their behalf. They can check their wage records regularly by asking the Social Security Administration to provide a free Personal Earnings and Benefits Estimate Statement that shows year-by-year figures of the actual wages reported to the agency by employers since 1951.

This statement also projects what an employee's retirement benefits may be and estimates what Social Security benefits may be payable to his or her family in the event of a disabling injury or death.

To receive this Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement, Call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Social Security benefits are perhaps even more important to domestic workers than to other workers because they are so much less likely to have a private pension program or other financial resources to draw on.

## **Hyperthermia Can Result From Prolonged Humid Heat**

Summer heat, combined with humidity, poses a potentially deadly threat to Texans. Health officials warn

that heat stress. or hyperthermia, causes about 200 death and thousands of illnesses each year in the U.S. The victims are usually the elderly, the very young, or people weakened by other illnesses, although prolonged heat stress can be fatal to anyone.

Dr. Erik K. Svenkerud, medical consultant for the Bureau of Disease Control and Epidemiology at the Texas Department of Health (TDH), said that high temperature alone is physically tolerable to most people. Combined with high humidity

person's natural cooling system, perspiration, to work overtime. "If a person fails to replace fluids and slats they lose during perspiration," Dr. Svenkings. erud said, "Dehydration

can follow." The symptoms of dehydration include muscle cramps, dizziness, nausea, low blood pressure and headache. "These are serious warning signs," Dr. Svenkerud said. "Anyone with these symptoms should immediately find shade, ventilation and fluids-preferably water-to drink until the symptoms subside."

He explained that if fluids are not soon replaced, heat stroke can follow, causing sudden weakness, headache, confusion leading to loss of consciousness, brain damage and death.

To avoid overheating, Dr.Svenkerud said, people should wear lightcolored, loose-fitting clothing and drink more than their normal intake of water. Those with heart or respiratory conditions or who take medications should be alert to any sings of physical problems.

Children can develop dehydration, especially

though, heat can cause a quickly during hot, humid weather, and also need increased fluids and light clothing, In addition, they, as well as pets, should not be left in cars or hot build-

> "One of the best ways to know whether to take special precautions on a


given day is to follow a local weather forecast. Although forecast cannot be exact, meteorologists usually are accurate enough to predict approximate temperatures and humidity," Dr. Svenkerud added.

Forecasters often refer to a "heat stress reading index," a numeric table which reflects how hot the air will fell to humans. A heat stress reading of 105
