Charges Filed In Lakewood Entry

A series of burglaries which has baffled officers in this county for several months was believed near solution with the filing of charges at Eastland this week against a former convict in connection with the burglary of the Lakewood Country Club clubhouse and the Desdemona School on December 12, 1958.

Charges were filed against James Anton Montgomery, who, County Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., said, made a written confession to Sheriff J. B. Williams and Texas Ranger officers who cooperated in the investigation which led to his arrest on the charges.

His case will be presented to the grand jury on April 13, Mr. Conner said.

Next week, April 13-18, is Clean-up Week in Rising Star, and every citizen owning or occupying property in the city and every business house is urged to join in a program of thoroughly cleaning up and beautifying the community, improving property and removing fire and health hazards during the period.

Special appeals are being issued this week by the Parent-Teacher Ass'n. and the Rising Star Fire Department, while city officials are pointing to the serious fire losses which have been suffered here in recent months as a powerful reason for the earnest and active cooperation of every person in removing further threat to the community in the form of trash, run-down buildings, faulty wiring and other hazardous conditions.

The city will lend its full cooperation to the enterprise, offering to move all trash accumulated during the clean-up period free of charge, provided it is placed where it is accessible to the trucks which will begin their rounds at mid-week.

"We would like to see Rising Star make this a real clean-up," said Mayor Walter Smith, "and it can be done if all our citizens will take an active interest and do their part in getting rid of the unsightliness and the fire and health hazards about their premises. It is certainly sound business to have a clean city, as well as a much greater living pleasure. I hope our people will respond in a magnificent and effective way to this effort."

Deep Try Is Reported East Of Rising Star

According to information obtained by the Rising Star Record, Coastal States Gas Associates of Houston, which has taken a large block of acreage east of Rising Star, on which several successful oil and gas wells have already been drilled, will shortly drill a deep test about four and a half miles east of Rising Star on either the Faulkner or Parker tracts.

The test will be designed to go to the Ellenberger lime in the even no satisfactory production is obtained at higher levels.

It will be drilled to test the gas potential at the deeper horizons in the area, the information said.

The test is seen as another important step in the gradual proving up of a gas area of considerable extent along the Balcones Fault structure running roughly northeast and southwest, where plans are reported to be under way for the eventual building of an extensive gas gathering system and involving construction of a hydrocarbons extraction plant in this vicinity.

Meanwhile, northwest of Rising Star, and in the Cook Community, a successful oil producer has been completed on the A. L. Bible place in virgin territory four miles due south of Nimrod. The well is producing from the Marble Falls and was said to be good for ten barrels hourly. It is creating a considerable interest in the area.

Another development in the oil and gas picture in this area is the offer of the Rudco Oil and Gas Co., to sell its two plants and most of its oil and production in this area. Bids have been asked. The company's main plant at Blake was recently heavily damaged by explosion and fire.

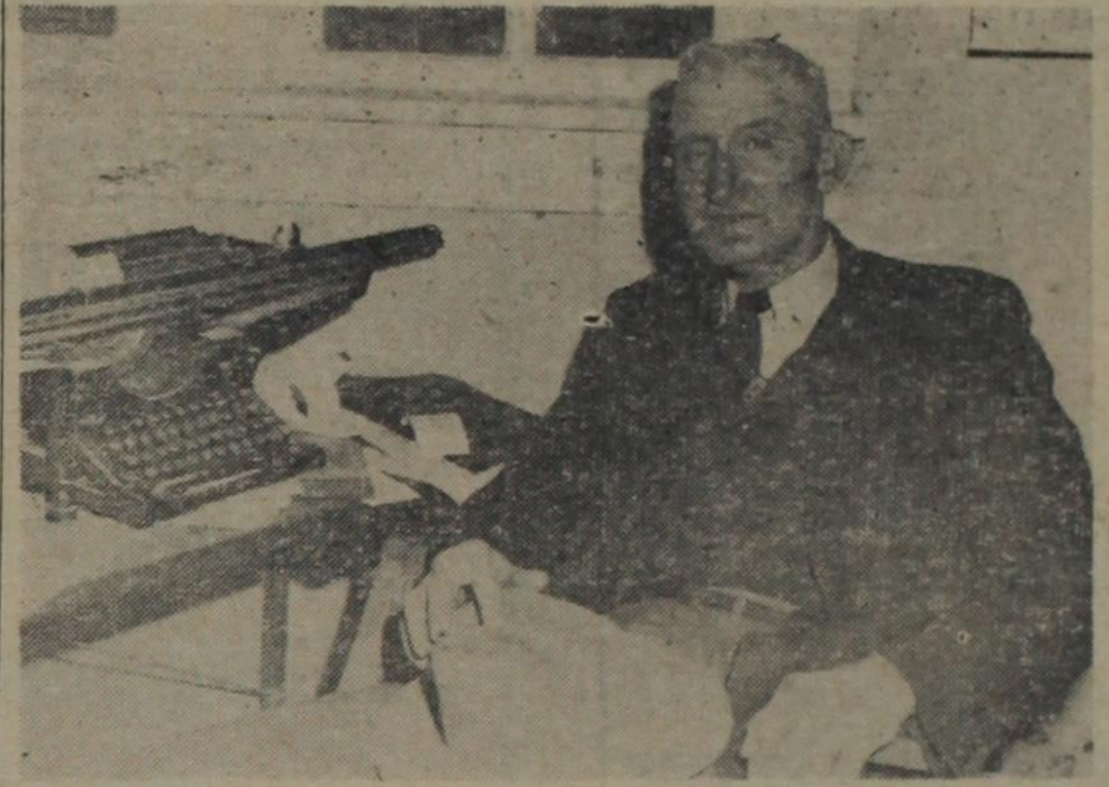



LEGAL HEALTH

Are you in sound legal "health"? It costs much less to avoid legal trouble than to get out of it once you are in. Hence the family lawyer.

But since you can't go running to him all the time, how do you spot legal trouble in time? The following pointers will help in diagnosing your situation.

1. When you come of age, marry, have children, get a divorce, buy or sell property, move to another state, or when someone in your family dies, you may take on new legal rights and duties. Then you may need to up-date your will, your insurance program, or the way you figure your taxes.

2. When you buy or sell property always have the legal papers prepared or checked by your attorney before you sign them or put up any money.

Double check your contracts, important letters or leases before (not after) you sign them.

3. The law defends your rights, but sometimes only if you yourself act within certain time limits. Make sure you do. Otherwise your claim may be outlawed, or it may be too late to file an action to protect your rights.

If you have been in a car accident, for example, get all the facts at once and check with your lawyer and your insurance company.

4. A few other questions may put you in good shape to avoid legal trouble:

In case something happens to you, who knows where you keep your papers - - your deeds, will, insurance policies, or contracts?

Has everybody in your family a birth certificate?

Where is your marriage certificate? Your social security card?

Have you checked your life, hospital, health, home and accident insurance policies? Do they cover you the way you want?

Do you have a life insurance plan, for instance, fit in with your will?

Are your tax records in good order?

At the fresh vegetable counter, potatoes, celery, carrots, cabbage and turnips are economical choices. Increased supplies of asparagus are expected and prices should drop somewhat. Fresh tomatoes are retailing at lower prices than at this time last year. The supply comes mostly from Mexico and quality is good for the season. Leave tomatoes at room temperature until fully ripe, then serve.

S. grades as a guide in selecting a picnic steak.

MORE THAN A PRESIDENT

April 13, 1789, saw the birth of one of our nation's most celebrated leaders. This leader, Thomas Jefferson, is a symbol of the true American spirit of freedom. He rose to the rank of President with the belief that all men were created equal and that men make the government. Jefferson cherished liberty and was largely responsible for the guarantees of freedom of speech, press, and religion in the Constitution. "I have sworn," he said, "on the altar of God eternal hostility against every form of tyranny over the mind of man." Through sixty years of service he was faithful to this vow.

Although Jefferson is best remembered as a great President and as the author of the Declaration of Independence, any one of a dozen other achievements would have assured him a place in history. His range of interests and talents is extraordinary. He won fame as a statesman, diplomat, political philosopher, and as the founder of the Democratic Party. Before being elected to the Presidency, Jefferson served as Governor of Virginia, a member of Congress, Minister to France, Secretary of State, and Vice-President of the United States.

In addition he was the foremost American architect of his time. Monticello, his home, the state Capitol at Richmond, Virginia, and the University of Virginia, and the University of Virginia are some of his outstanding architectural works.

Jefferson was well known as a scientific farmer, and his gardens were as lovely as any in America. Along with his beautiful gardens at his home were many of his own inventions. He invented a revolving writing chair, a weather vane with the dial on the porch ceiling, the first storm window, and many other ingenious things.

Our third President, being a great reader, collected the finest library on the American continent. This library became the nucleus of the Library of Congress. He wrote as well as collected books. A manual of rules for parliamentary procedure and a dictionary of Indian dialects were written by Jefferson.

I will mention but one more of Jefferson's interest. He had a great love for music and, learning to play the violin at an early age, took part in chamber-music concerts.

In all of this, we see that Thomas Jefferson was a gifted individual. His name will be remembered in the annals of time as an outstanding President; however, I will revere his name because he, with dexterity and determination, asserted himself to heights of success in various fields besides that of the political realm.
