

Kyle Williams Attends Science Symposium Eric Wright Attends UT Workshop Going To Camp

Twenty outstanding students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the 19th Annual Energy Science Symposium at the University of Texas at Austin. The Conference got underway Tuesday, June 5th and ended Friday, June 8th.

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic

Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas utilities is one of the sponsoring companies.

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding scientists.

The Foundation was

formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and the University are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of energy science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the twenty students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in their field.

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Rising Star can be justly proud of its high school for having been chosen as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send students and teachers to the Symposium.

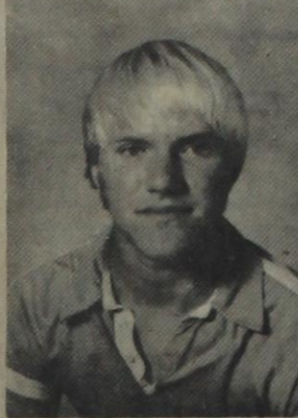
TO Qualify For This You Must:

3. Have a letter of authorization from the Social Security office that you are disabled and receive benefits.

Applications are available at the School Tax Office. THESE MUST BE SIGNED NO LATER THAN JULY 16, 1979.

The deadline date of April 30 for application for HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION has been extended to July 16th. Therefore, if you have not signed up for these exemptions please, do so as soon as possible. The three types of exemptions are:

1. Residential Homestead for 5,000.00
2. Over 65 Homestead Exemption.
3. Disability (receives payments for Federal Old Age, Survivors, and disability Insurance from Social Security.) For additional information please call our office. PH.643-1981.

It's almost the equivalent of a theatrical boot camp, with a no-nonsense schedule that begins each day at 8 a.m. and continues to 10:30 p.m. but youngsters clamor to get in it.

It is the Summer Theater Workshop of the University of Texas Drama Department, where high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors are immersed for a month in the nuts and bolts of play production--acting, stagecraft, makeup, costuming and dance.

Fifty-eight students (29 girls and 29 boys) will begin their training Tuesday June 5th in the 17th Summer Theater Workshop, which continues through July 8th.

The program has become so popular, according to Lynn Murray, drama director of the University Interscholastic League, that "this is the most students we have ever taken--and we already have 40 on the waiting list for next year."

In years past, workshop enrollment was limited to 40, then it inched up to 50. Mr. Murray attributes the increase to the growing number of highly qualified students "to whom it is hard to say 'no'."

Tied to this year's workshop will be a new short-term, noncredit workshop for teachers, July 2-6, that will help 25 high school teachers with minimal experience in drama instruction to acquire some quick how-to's about play selection, cutting long plays, using limited scenery and lighting and directing a play for the UIL's One-Act Play Contest.

As has been the case for many summers, 15

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teachers also will be accepted to enroll for 8 hours of UT drama course credits during the workshop period. They will take courses in high school play pro-

duction, rehearsal and performance, and directing, and also work with students attending the workshop.

The high school students, in addition to attending classes taught by member of the Ut drama faculty, will find on their daily agenda rehearsals and crew work for three plays to be presented at the end of the workshop.

The play include "Ah, Wilderness!" by Eugene O'Neill, "Appointment With Death" by Agatha Christie and a third play, to be announced.

The workshop productions will be staged at 7:30 p.m. on July 6 and 2 p.m. on July 7th in either the B. Payne Theater or the Laboratory Theater.

In addition to the 3 plays the youngsters themselves will put on, about 10 members of the workshop will be cast in the Drama Departments summer production of the musical "The Robber Bridegroom". The musical will be given on June 29-30 and July 1, 5-8 in the Drama Building Theater Room.

Mr. Murray notes that even though about 50 per cent of the students who come to the summer workshops return to UT as drama majors, "that's not our major motivation."

He says the intent of the program is extensive teaching, "to give something of the University's resources to the community, and, in this instance, that means increased interest and skills in theater that students and teachers can take home."

Students participating in the UT workshop will live in campus dormitories and have special counselors. Attending from Rising Star will be Eric Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wright of Rt. 1, Rising Star, Texas.

Rising Star To Get Ambulance

The Citizens of Rising Star will remember the ambulance mishap not too long ago. We now have the opportunity to operate our own ambulance again. The City Council is planning to purchase another ambulance which will be equipped with the old ambulance equipment.

Citizens, we are going to have to work together if this project is to succeed. The ambulance personnel will be on a strictly volunteer basis. In order to organize an efficient and worthy staff, a coordinator, secretary--bookkeeper and supply manager will be appointed. The more volunteers we have on call, will lessen the demand of service on everyone.

Please, we ask that volunteers of the Rising Star Fire Department do not volunteer for ambulance duty. The need for these two groups may be needed on occasional calls. When the ambulance staff is organized, we hope to work along side our Fire Department volunteers to better serve our citizens and surrounding areas.

The City of Cross Plains has graciously offered to help us organize this much needed ambulance service. Cross Plains has just recently been through this situation themselves. It took the hard work, determination and patience of many volunteers.

The volunteer staff, coordinator, secretary and supply manager (this does not include

the ambulance driver) must attend class to qualify as an E.C.A.--Emergency Care Attendant.

A state consultant will come to Cross Plains to lead the class (minimum 15 people with 40 class hours) in C.P.R., Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, how to transfer patients, how to administer oxygen, and how to treat shock.

The date and time for these classes will be set up with Cross Plains when a sufficient number of volunteers are acquired.

Oil News

Cassell Oil Co. of Rising Star will drill No. 11 Bagley as a proposed 3,500-foot wildcat in Brown County. Location is 2-miles northeast of cross Cut on a 162-acre lease. It spots 3,681 feet from the west lines of N.B. Mitchell Survey 150.

Duer Wagner and Co. of San Antonio spotted No. 1 Bobby Clark in the Brownwood, South (Marble Falls) Field 3-miles north of Winchell.

The planned 1,500-foot venture is located on a 160-acre lease.

Drillsite is 200-feet from the southeast and 675-feet from the southwest lines of D. P. Gentry Survey, A-1731.

An Eastland County wildcat drilled 4-miles south of Cisco has been completed as a dual discovery.

It is arledge petroleum Co. of Dallas No. 1 J. Lambeth, spotting 2,310 feet from the south and 1,000 feet from the west lines of Section 84, Block 3, H and TC survey.

From the Caddo it had an absolute open flow of 3, 819,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 2,965-73-feet. The pay was treated with 4,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 120 sacks of sand.

The well from the Lake pay had an absolute, open flow of 13,000,000 cubic feet of

gas daily. gas-liquid, hydrocarbon ratio was 232,200-1.

Production is from perforations at 3,384 to 3,45 feet.

The pay section was treated with 4,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 120 sacks of sand.

Site is 504 feet from the north and 526 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 19, Block 4, H and TC Survey.

Absolute open flow was 400,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 3,714-30 feet. The pay was treated 1,500 gallons of acid and fractured with 17,000 gallons of water and 20,000 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4-and one-half-inch casing at 3,850 feet, two-feet off bottom.

Clark in the Blind Hog(Ranger) Field two miles southeast of Pioneer.

Bend Arch Oil and Gas Inc. of Cisco will drill No. 2 M. B. Gilbert in the regular field two miles east of Carbon.

Answer Filed In 35th District Court

Valton Sudderth, Brownwood attorney, filed an answer in 35 District Court in connection with a law suit brought against the May Independent School District by two teachers.

The suit, filed by Mr. Dan McGhee and Mrs. Faye Morton are the result of non-renewal of their contracts for the 1979-80 school years.

The joint suit seeks to enjoin the school district from hiring any replacement teachers pending the outcome of their appeals to the state commissioner of education in hopes of regaining their teaching positions.

Sudderth's answer, in support of the school district and May Supt. M. H. Buchanan,

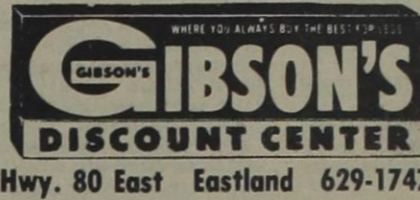
denies there are any grounds on which to issue an injunction

against hiring replacement teachers for McGhee and Martin by the school district.

The answer also stated that the petition filed by McGhee and Martin should be dismissed on several grounds including the fact that the Supt. and school board complied with all state laws in

their actions and owe no obligation to the fired teachers.

According to Brownwood lawyer, Charlie Gamblin who is representing McGhee and Martin and Citizens for Our School, a group organized in support of the two, the next step is the discovery phase of the suit in which he plans to subpoena the board of trustees and the superintendent.

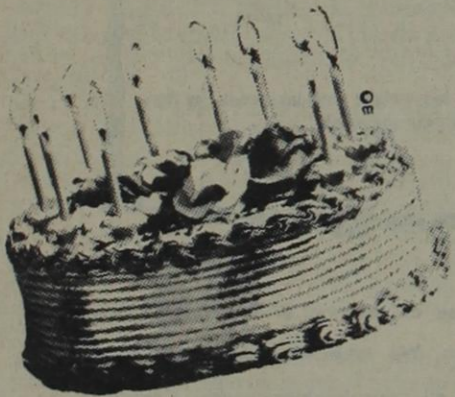

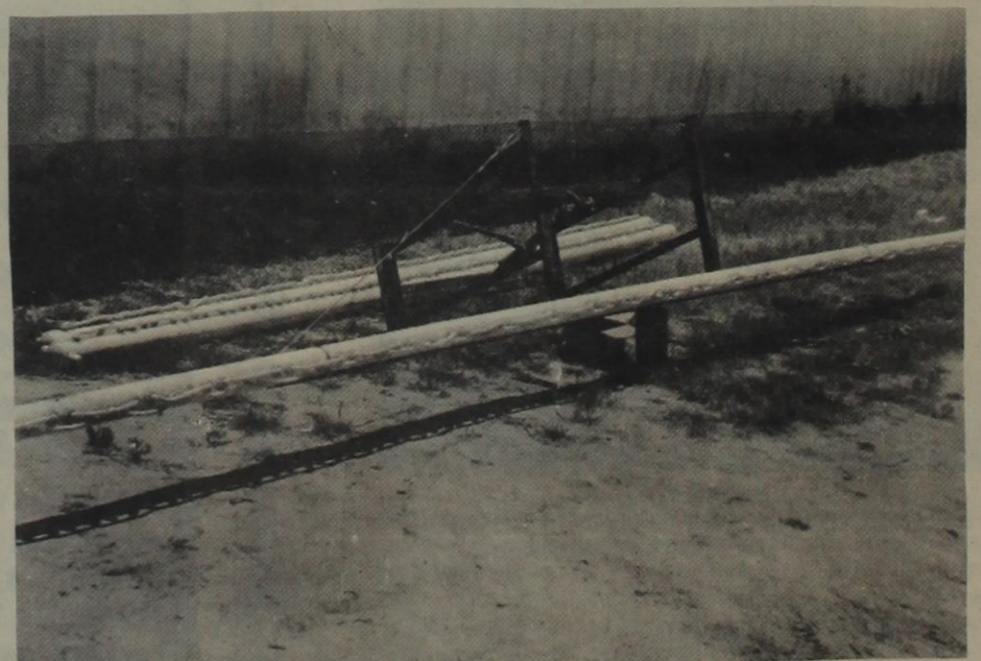

This process requires that calves be weighed, tagged and a color photograph be made of each calf. Exhibitors must also sign a validation form.

Congressional Comments

by Charles W. Stenholm

Washington, D.C. — A considerable amount of attention is being given these days to the growing dissatisfaction many citizens are having over high taxes and excessive government spending. People in Washington are finally beginning to reassess the will of the American people. Are the people most concerned about high taxes, excessive government spending, or waste? I believe they are telling us that they are not getting their money's worth for the taxes they pay. When workers get their paychecks every month and see the large income and Social Security tax withheld, they are wondering where and why it all goes — Good question.

One of the areas of greatest concern to the taxpayer is our growing social services programs. Next year the government will spend over \$300 billion on these projects. Much of this money goes for worthwhile services such as health care for those truly in need, income maintenance for the disabled, and services for the needy elderly. But a considerable portion of this money goes for programs that do not in any way increase the assets of America or provide gainful employment for those out of work. Often money is given to people who can and are supporting themselves. And one of the most costly side effects is the almost complete destruction of the work incentive for some of the poor on welfare. Why should anyone work if his or her income is already provided for? Government handouts too often stifle a worker's motivation to produce.

Last week the Agriculture Committee proposed to lift the spending cap on the Food Stamp Program and thus increase costs by over \$1 billion. In 1964 when the Food Stamp Act was adopted there appeared little question that the intent was to assist the legitimately needy of America in meeting their nutritional needs, particularly the children. This goal has grown out of proportion and the working taxpayer is now being asked to support too many people who are either voluntarily unemployed or who can and should be supporting themselves. In 1967 there were 1.5 million recipients, but 18.5 million people are currently enrolled in the program. The food stamp program is now out of control with one out of every four persons eligible for assistance and it is growing by leaps and bounds. The answer is not to spend more money, but to reform the system. We need to eliminate food stamps for strikers and college students. The eligible income levels should be lowered to make sure food stamps go only to those who are truly in need.

Certainly I realize that the government has to provide for those people who are physically unable to care for themselves — we are our brother's keeper. But the state has no obligation to support those individuals who can work, but don't. It is time to put people back to productive labor earning a living and not permit the government to rob a person of his dignity by giving him a handout. Only then will we control inflation and help all of the people.

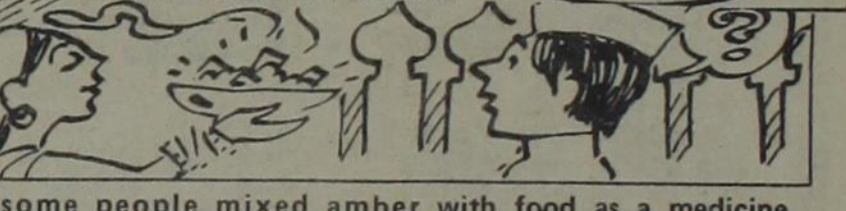
