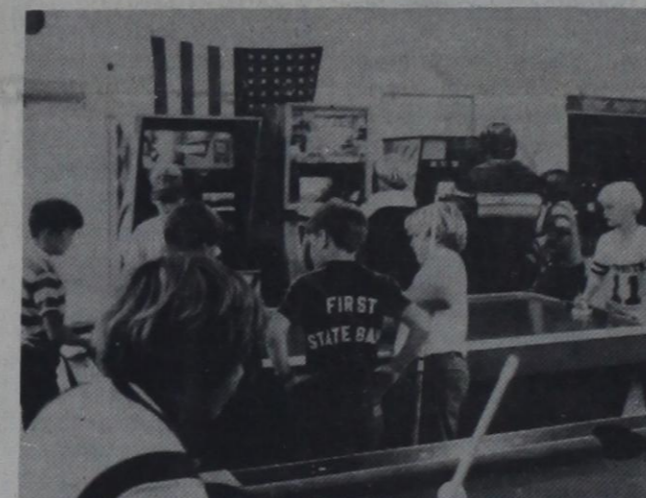

What is being done to give our youth something to do and to endeavor to keep them from the local drug scene?

For one, Mary Ann and Billy Paul Underwood have joined the Texas War on Drugs and would like to set up a parent-peer group in Rising Star.

They have information pamphlets from Austin on teaching parents awareness of drugs and drug-related problems among young people. To get an information packet of your own, get in touch with the Underwoods for the address.

Mr. and Mrs. Underwood have worked two years setting up a recreation center that encourages family type entertainment and gives young people a place to go.

The center features table action games such as pool and air hockey; video games, such as Puc-Man, Galaxy and Tank; two gun games; a juke box, and

an arcade game. None of the games cost more than 25 cents and each week two games may be played for free. The free games are rotated among those available except pool, which is free every Friday.

A supervisor is on hand at all times, parents who would not want to leave young children unchaperoned need not be concerned on that point.

The present location of the center is one block south of the old hospital on S. Cooper and Smith. The Underwoods have begun readying the old Jobe building on S. main to move into, and expect to make the move by summer.

The center plans to trade games back and forth with a similar establishment in Comanche as youth tire of certain games.

Mary Ann and Billy Paul Underwood also run a day care center and an art supply shop, Frames & Things.

An Old Timer Comes Back Home

"Brown's Automotive Service and Repair Shop", recently opened for business, in downtown May, on High way, 183, across the street from the May post office.

til his death recently. Mr. and Mrs. H.H.(Buster) Brown have three sons. All attended and finished school at May.

Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Brown had two sons who lived in San Antonio a number of years, where the sons attended school. "getting tired of the hustle and bustle of city", Jackie said, "we decided to come back home, and too, I wanted to be near my mother, who lives alone."

The younger Brown's bought a plot of land in downtown May. The rock building on the lot was built in 1933, and was used as a gasoline station, until recently, the Brown's tore it down and leveled the ground and went to work at once building a heavy sheet iron building for the new business. The father and two sons did all the building, since

they had had a lot of experience in this line of work, welding and construction work.

The working area in the building is 40 by 60 feet, with concrete foundation and floors, and is well equipped with power tools to handle any kind of work and repair on heavy equipment as well as regular machinery. Jackie said, "I am experienced and qualified to do all kinds of welding." Tommy and Weldon will work as associates with their father." We are all looking forward to serving the May people," they agree.

The Brown's have bought a new home in May and are just two blocks from the new business.

May welcomes these old timers back home and they in turn invites every one to drop by and renew acquaintances.

Dear Sis,

Here is a peanut butter cookie recipe with a honey flavor: cream together 1 c. peanut butter and 1/2 c. oleo; gradually beat in 1 c. honey, then 2 eggs. Then blend in 1/2 c. sugar, 2 tsp. vanilla 2 1/2 c. sifted flour with 1/2 tsp. soda. Mix well and drop by 1 teaspoon full on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes in a 375 degree oven. Chunky or creamy peanut butter may be used, and 1/2 c. raisins may be added if you like them.

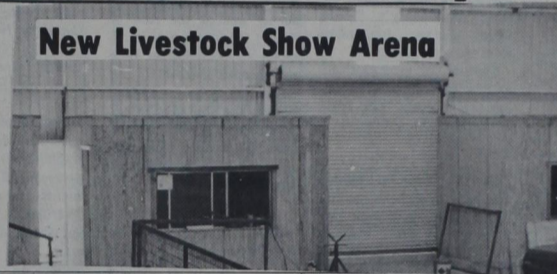

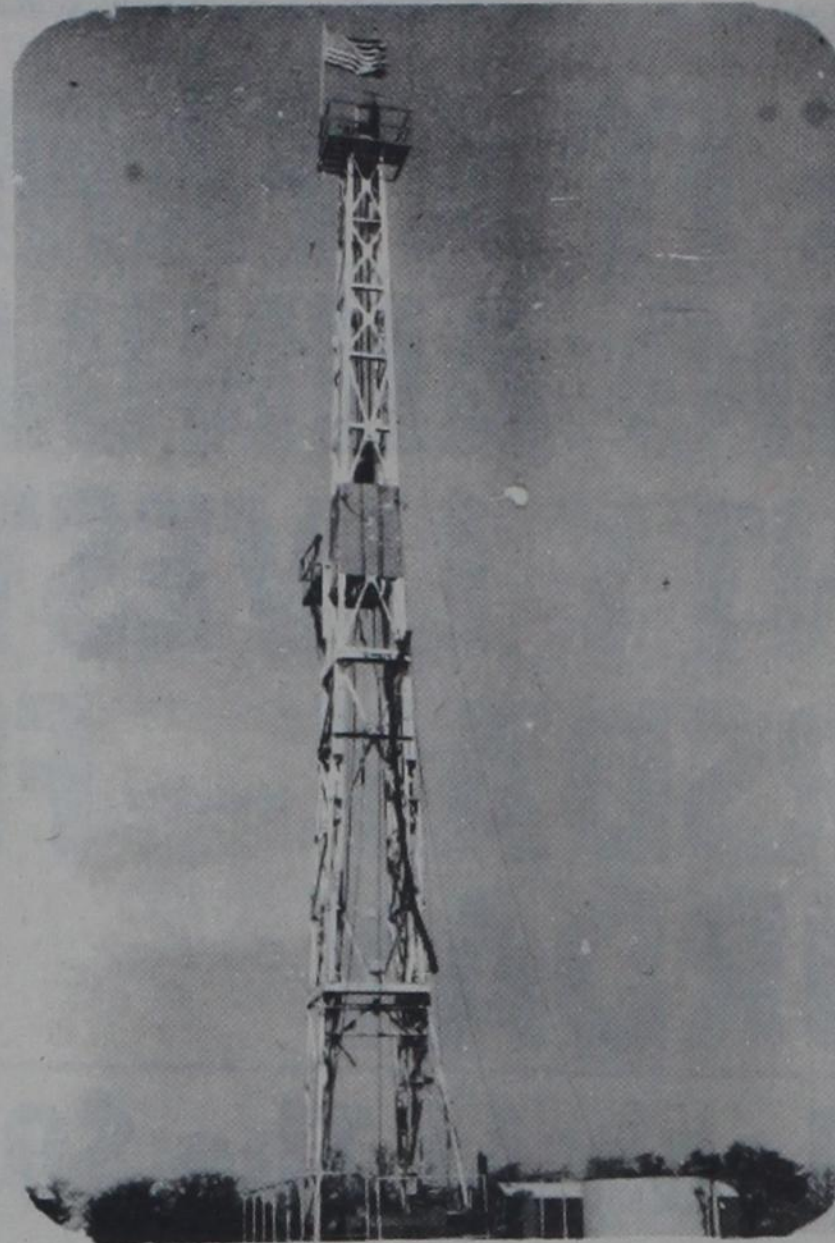

Producers who wish to comply with the program must sign an intention to participate by April 16, 1982. An intention to participate may be revised at any time prior to April 16, 1982 or will be cancelled if the report of acreage is out of compliance for the crop.

FAILED SMALL GRAINS

Failed wheat, oats, or barley should be reported to the ASCS office before the crop is destroyed or devoted to another use in order to maintain eligibility for any possible program benefits.

Dangers Of Marijuana

T-shirts, brochures and bumper stickers comprise a marijuana education sponsored by the Texas Medical Association Auxiliary.

The project, conducted in cooperation with the state's War on Drugs campaign, carries the theme "Stop Pot!"

The green-and-white T-shirts include that message along with an insignia of a marijuana plant encircled and crossed out in the manner of a traffic sign.

The brochure, entitled "The Dirty Dozen—12 Things You Need to Know About Marijuana," notes that:

—More than three-fifths of all high school seniors have tried marijuana. In the last five years, the number of teenagers smoking it daily has almost doubled.

—The ingredient that causes the high in marijuana is THC, which tends to collect in fat. Since the brain has abundant fat, THC heads there. It also collects in the liver, lungs, kidneys and glands. The chemical remains long after the buzz has gone away.

—Recent tests show that it may take as much as a month for the body to clear out the THC from only one marijuana cigarette. Because the body still has almost half of the dope left after one week, even weekend smokers have it in their bodies all week.

—Marijuana adversely affects the growth and division of all kinds of cells. It may be worse on the lungs than cigarettes. Even light, but regular, smokers show mild lung damage in less than two months. Heavy marijuana

smoking narrows the breathing passages. In addition, tests on monkeys indicate that marijuana may damage brain cells permanently.

—In pregnant women who smoke marijuana, THC goes directly to the unborn baby and interferes with protein formation and the growth of new cells the baby needs.

—Regular users often cannot drive well, have difficulty remembering details, show a loss of willpower, have problems concentrating and are paranoid.

The brochure also offers tips to parents in dealing with the situation.

Order blanks for the T-shirts can be obtained from county medical society auxiliaries or from the TMA Auxiliary, 1801 N. Lamar Blvd., Austin 78701. Brochures also can be obtained there. The bumper stickers will be available by May.
