The first step in producing healthy fruit and pecan tgrees is to select a variety that has resistance to most of the major disease that occur in this particular area of the state.

Good pecan varieties for Eastland County are Choctaw, Wichita, Mohawk, Sioux, Cheyenne and Shoshoni.

In selecting peach and plums, be aware of the rootstock on which the variety is budded, The rootstock Nemaguard is resistant to root knot nematodes and should be the understock on all peach and plum varieties grown in the home planting. Root knot nematodes are a major problem on peaches and plums. Homeowners sometime get the idea that a nurseryman plants an Elberta seed and two or three years later the tree is dug and sold as an Elberta. This is not true. The nurseryman plants a seed which may be an Elberta, Nemaguard or Lovell. After one year the tree is budded to a variety such as Elberta. This insures that all Elberta trees are the same and reduces the differences that would occur between seeldings of the Elberta variety. Look for adapted varieties that are budded onto the nematode reistant rootstock, Nemaguard.

Bacterial leaf spot is a disease that attacks the leaves and fruit of peaches and plums. Currently there

an is no totally effective chemical treatment for this diesease, so use resistant varieties whenever possible to avoid losses. Peach varieties such as Spring Gold, Sentinel, Harvester, Loring, Redglobe, Redskin and Frank have varying

bacteria and should be planted where adapted. Grapes are another crop for which homeowners should request a specific variety. The variety Champanel has a definite place in the home fruit planning. It is resistant to root knot nematodes and to the serious foliage and fruit disease, Black Rot. It also appears to be resistant to cotton root rot. The fruit can be used for fresh consumption and has been used to make juice. In addition to selecing

levels of resistance to this

varieties which are resistant to disease, select healthy vigorous plants that have the abiltiy to grow and develop. Before planting a tree, check the roots to make sure they are free of galls or knots which would indicate the presence of nematodes or crown gall. Ends of the roots should not be, torn or damaged. Clip damaged roots  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch behind the damaged portion.

Large amount of high quality, home grown fruit can be produced in a small area if homeowners start off right. Take the time to find the right variety based on disease resistance and adaptability.


Services for Ada Clark, 74, of Rising Star, who died Thursday, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel.



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

# **Need Evidence To Get A Duplicate Social Security Card**

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to mensity of Texas agriculture change or correct information on his-her social security record must submit evidence of identity and and related inventory--totals evidence substantiating the change before the new card "While agriculture is can be issued. For example, strong and vibrant both in a woman who is changing her surname because of marriage should submit any evidence such as a marriage license or driver's license which shows both the previous and new names. A social security number will not be reissued if the evidence requirements are not met.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card

security card must complete an application form and present evidence of his-her identity. In addition, the application must be checked against the records at social security headquarters before a new card will be issued. Since it takes 3 to 4 weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted (if the individual is unable to provide his-her number) the Social Security Office encourages anyone who has lost his-her social

or has changed her name to apply for a duplicate card as soon as possible.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a Social Security Number,"lists the new kinds of evidence that can be used to establish a person's identity. Copies can be obtained at the Abilene social security office located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.





BERGLAND ORDERS YELLOW SHEET REPORT **REWRITTEN:** Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland sat on a report culminating a year long investigation of the Yellow Sheet and other meat-pricing sheets, including the USDA's own Market News Service.

Bergland then gave the reprort's authors 30 days to overhaul it.

He then ordered the copes of the report destroyed.

AP news service got a copy before the 3,000 copies could be destroyed.

The report was delivered to Bergland on October 16, just three days after a congressional committee found that the Yellow Sheet is potentially subject to manipulation by industry giants at the expense of farmers, small businesses, and consumers.

The House Small Business Committee said up to 90 per cent of all beef carcasses were sold on the basis of prices suggested by the Yellow Sheet.

The investigation found that the Yellow Sheet reported inaccurately on many trades, and concluded that 80 per cent of the trades reported either never took place, involved different prices, or lacked specifics on the volume trade. Yellow Sheet officials asked to appear before the committee--on Saturday when no committee meeting was scheduled. The Committee did not hear their statements.

The report which Bergland ordered destroyed found that prices published were based on less than 4 per cent of the total sales, and that 8 packers accounted for more than 50 per cent of the total sales information recorded in the Yellow Sheet.

The report found that the Yellow Sheet is the principal guide used in the purchase of live cattle by slaughtering packers, and that 67 per cent of all beef carcass sales were made on the basis of the formula pricing the services provided.

Six of 12 supermarket chains surveyed paid prices based solely on the Yellow Sheet. The other 6 bought an average of 75 per cent of their meat on the basis of Yellow Sheet prices.

The report noted that the pricing system relies on voluntary price reporting by packers which "does not produce an accurate picture of the market.'

Bergland's action ordering the report kept the secret supposedly came on the advice of aides who said the report contained serious gaps of information, and aides questioned the data on packers' profits.

The report was based on the July, 1977, transactions of 35 major packing plants in 5 marketing areas.

The Meat Sheet, published in Elmhurst, Illionois, was also studied, along with the Yellow Sheet (The National Provisioner) and the USDA's Market News Service.

Iowa Representative Nel Smith introduced a bill in late September to regulate meat price reporting, but no action was taken. Smith said he will try again next year because "the current meat price reporting system is open to manipulation and inaccuracies" causing higher meat prices for consumers. Smith's proposal would give the Secretary of Agriculture the power to license meat price reporting M.L. 


#### Compassion

Jesus is our example in everything and he is our example in compassion. At the time Jesus was on this earth, it was unheard of for a "god" to have compassion. The people of his day who were under the influence of the Greeks throught to have compassion was to admit that you had feelings toward someone who was lessor than you and if you were moved by compassion, then you were indeed yielding to the service of a weaker person. It seems at times when we are down there are those who would want to inflict further hurt and take advantage of our weaknesses. (Verse 2) If the things we have learned to depend upon collaspe, what then? If we find ourselves at the end of our resources, what then?

Rather than just seeking the help of those around us, we can look up. This is our .only recourse.

The christian has God. As the Psalmist expresses it, "The Lord is in his holy temple." (verse 4). When all other foundations crumble, when we seeminly are all around, God is with us.
