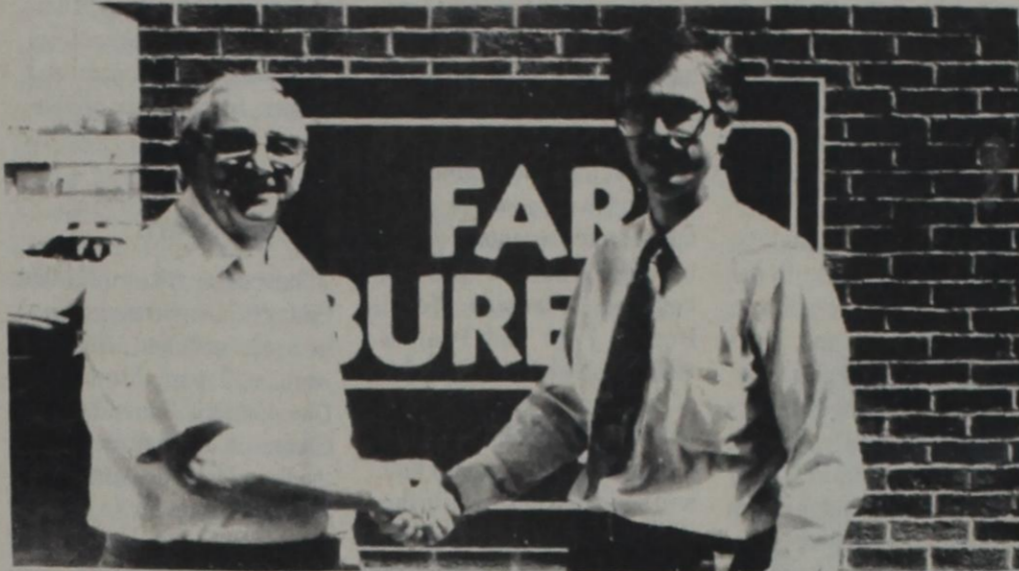
night Monday through Wednesday.

## Election Results

Unofficial totals for the voting results of the Rising Star City Council election Saturday put Randy Goldston, Dr. Charles Banes and Billy Harmon as winning the three places on the council.

Goldston received 209 votes; Barnes, 266; Harmon, 117; Johnny J. Hubbard, 101; and the incumbent, E.L. "Moose" Vaughn, 96.

The City Council will meet and canvass the votes before they are considered official.

The Board of Directors for

Rising Star Independent School District met Monday night and canvassed the ballots in that election, also held Saturday.

Of the five candidates vying for three places on the board, Frances Agnew, Gary Wilson and Dale Wolf took the top votes in a close race. The tally was set at 172 votes for Agnew; incumbent Wilson, 157; Wolf, 142; Wanda Williams, 139; and Joyce Baker, 132. Tallies for the five contender had only a 40-vote spread.

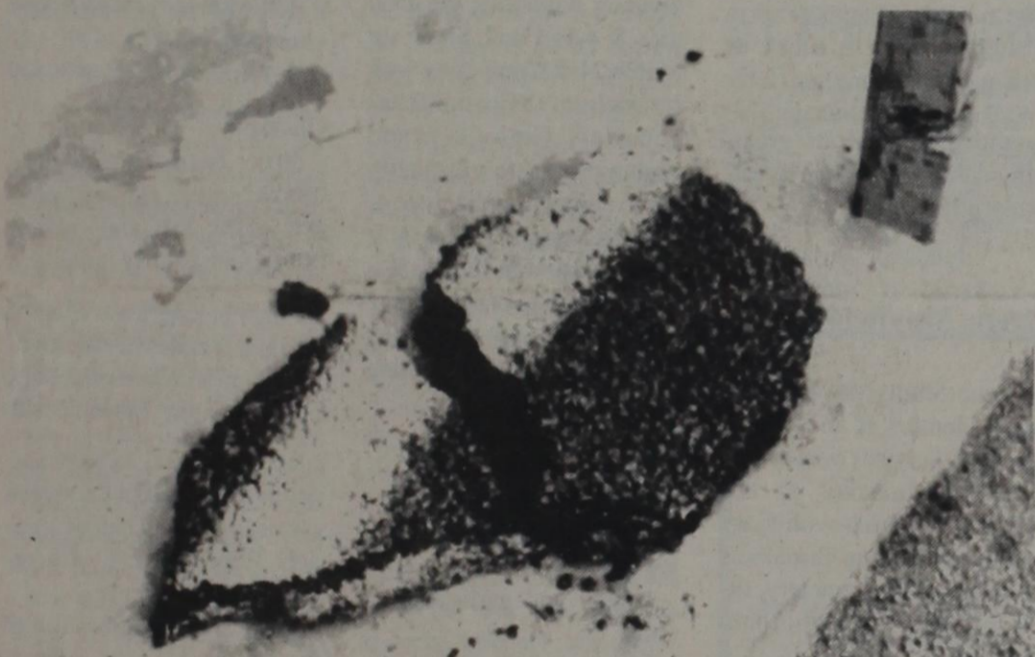

## County Asks For Disaster Funds To Repair Roads, Bridges



Chunks of paving from the damaged bridge that crosses Sweetwater Creek on U. S. Highway 36 between the Rising Star Comanche was brought into town during the flooding April 25-26. Rains of up to 17 inches in the Comanche and De Leon areas caused considerable damage to highways, bridges, fences and country roads. Numerous bridges and roads in Eastland County were also damaged.

Eastland County Commissioners estimate that it will take a total of \$698,000 to repair county roads and bridges damaged by recent rains and flooding. They have applied for Disaster Relief Assistance to make these repairs.

County Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners met Wednesday with August Koerning of the Emergency Management Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Koerning complied information on the damage in each Precinct. He gave out questions about washed out roads, debris that needed clearing, structural damage to bridges, and other types of damage.

It appeared that Pct. 2, on the east side of the county, received the most damage of any part of the county. Norman Christian, Commissioner of this Precinct, estimated that it would take \$345,000 to repair roads and bridges and other damages.

Commissioner Richard Robinson of Pct. 1 reported the least damage of any area of the County. He estimated it would take \$63,000 to put his roads back in shape.

L. T. Owen of Pct. 2 - south side of the county - listed considerable damage to roads and bridges. He estimated it would take \$215,000 to re-

ing across roads.

These Disaster requests will be carried to the office of Gov. Bill Clements, and hopefully passed on from there.

The Commissioners say it will take a lot of work as well as money to get the many miles of rural roads back in shape. Extreme caution should be used in traveling these roads until they are fixed.

## Declared Disaster Areas Include Eastland County

Additional counties in the 22nd Senatorial District have been declared disaster areas and are eligible for aid, according to State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville). "Palo Pinto, Bosque, Eastland, Denton, Wise and Tarrant counties have been added to the list of counties declared disaster areas due to recent flooding and storm damage. Erath, Parker and Comanche counties were declared disaster areas last week," Glasgow said.

Anyone who has suffered damage should call the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) toll-free at 1-800-782-6681. Agency personnel will take necessary information and begin the processing of claims as quickly as possible. Any per-

son who has sustained damage since approximately April 15, 1990, could qualify for disaster relief.

"In addition, those living in counties not yet declared disaster areas, but that have received flood or storm damage, are urged to contact the Agency at the toll-free number. It may be that they could qualify for disaster aid, as well," Glasgow said.

A number of programs are available under the FEMA relief program. Some of these programs include: temporary housing assistance; emergency home repair grants; rental assistance for homeowners or renters; Small Business Administration low interest loans and individual and family grants for serious needs and necessary expenses.

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Competing with entries from 18 Central Texas counties, Cathy's grand champion rosette will qualify her to compete at the State 4-H Food Show at Texas A & M University on June 4-5.

I will have to brag "a little" and let you know that Cathy is my daughter. Her winning dish was...

**Spinach Lasagna**  
2 lbs. cottage cheese  
2 eggs, beaten  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
Pepper and garlic salt to taste  
1/2 cup butter, melted

8 lasagna noodles, cooked according to package directions  
3 (10 oz.) packages frozen spinach, cooked and drained  
1 lb. Monterey Jack Cheese, shredded  
1 cup grated Parmesan Cheese

Mix together cottage cheese, eggs, parsley, pepper, garlic salt and melted butter. Generously butter 9 x

13 inch baking dish. Place 4 lasagna noodles in bottom of dish. Top with half of cottage cheese mixture. Sprinkle with half of Monterey Jack cheese, followed by half of Parmesan cheese. Dot with half of spinach. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

## Annual Air Show In Breckenridge

Each year on Memorial Day weekend the skies of Stephens County around Breckenridge are filled with aircraft that if one didn't know better they would be sure that World War II was on again.

Warbirds restored by members of the Confederate Air Force gather each year on Memorial Day weekend in Breckenridge at Stephens County Airport to present a very special program and honor to all veterans.

The Memorial Day weekend show began in 1978 when a small group assembled as a "weekend get-together" and has grown into a two day event with Saturday featuring the static display of Warbirds and other aircraft. The Annual Breckenridge Air Show has grown from an event when a "few old flyboys" got together for a weekend of fun and fellowship into one of the outstanding Air Shows of the nation. The Air Show annually features over 130 restored Warbirds from all over the United States and Canada. In addition there will be up to 500 other aircraft including several experimental models.

As the Air Show has grown the Department of Defense has provided a number of special aircraft on display for the crowds to view. In addition current members of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines have provided displays of new equipment that is currently in use by the different units of the military.

The Saturday before Memorial Day features static displays of the Warbirds and other aircraft. Stephens County Airport, located approximately two miles south of Breckenridge on U.S. Highway 183, opens at 9 a.m. on Saturday. Crowds are always on hand to view the aircraft on display as well as watch the late arrivals put on a "special show" as they arrive for the big event. Admission to the Saturday static display is \$3.00 per person.

On Sunday the airport opens at 9 a.m. for viewing the aircraft. Special Fly-overs of current military aircraft begin at approximately 1 p.m., with the Air Show beginning at 2 p.m. the Air Show will feature a reenactment of the air battle depicted in the movie "Tora, Tora, Tora". The program will exhibit a very wide range of special aerobatics and flying exhibitions by nu-

merous individuals and teams of aircraft making up the four hour aerial extravaganza. Admission to the Air Show on Sunday is \$5.00 for all over 12 years old, and \$3.00 for those from 6 through 11 years of age. Children under six are admitted free. There is no charge for parking.

Warbirds participating in the Annual Air Show are all absolutely beautifully restored to their original glory. Their owners and flyers are indeed a rare breed. Many of the Warbirds in the Air Show every year are usually one or two of only a few left of their type that are still flyable.

It would be difficult to list all of the Warbirds and their owners who are almost a ways on hand for the annual Breckenridge Air Show. Those who are on hand for the show may be assured they will thrill in their recognition of the uniqueness of seeing many of these very special aircraft.

**Property Tax Protest and Appeals Procedures**

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- exemptions that may apply to you
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal
- whether your property is taxable
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

**More Information:** You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 817/629-8597 in Eastland, Texas or visiting the office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

**Deadline for filing protests with the ARB**  
(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

**Special deadline:** On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraisal value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

**Late protests:** (If you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.) Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

**ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed)** Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

**Review by the District Court:** After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

**Review by the Appraisal Review Board:** If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

**Informal Review:** Contact the appraisal district staff at 817/629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

**The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. NOTE: You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.**

**Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land)** Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.



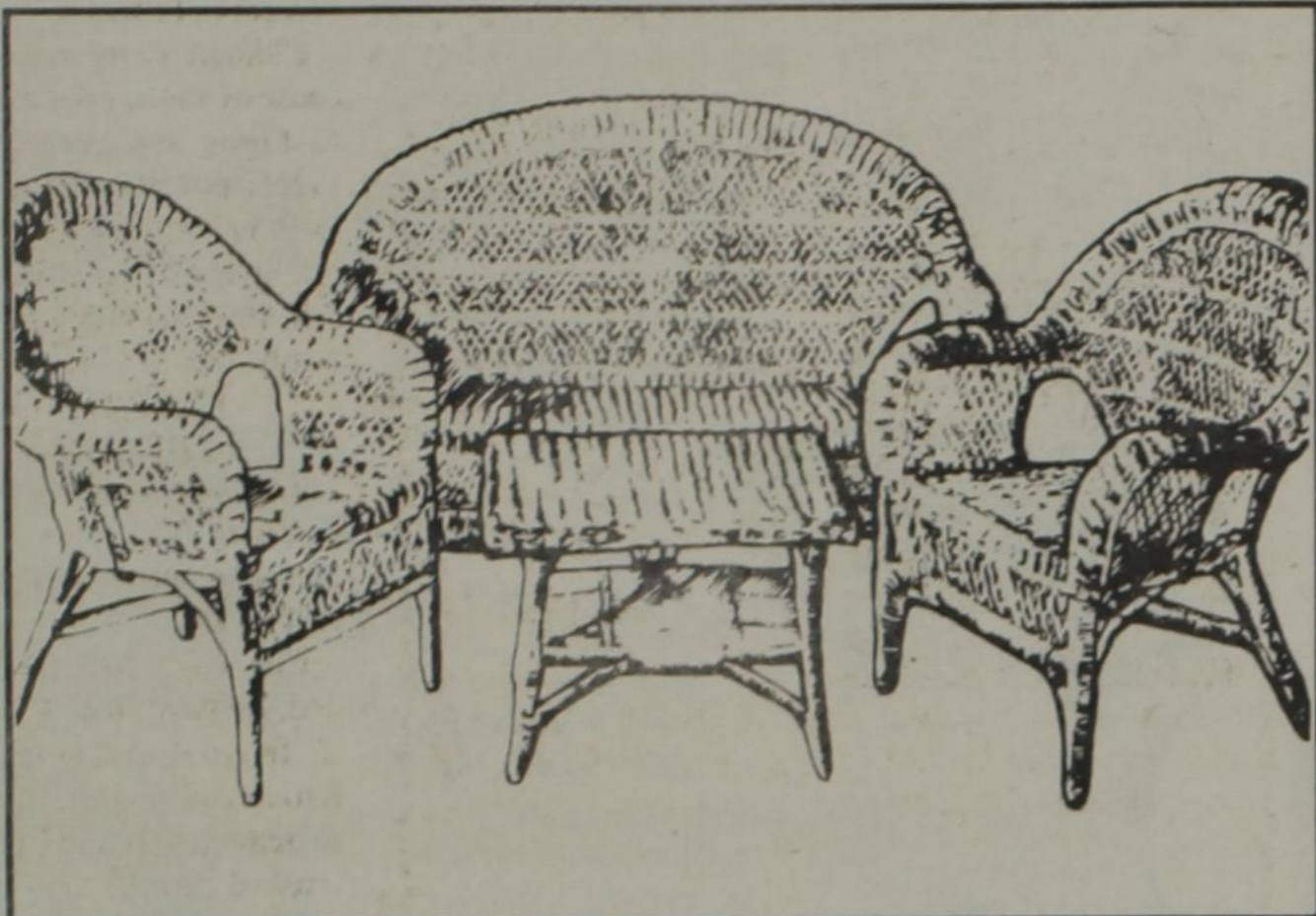

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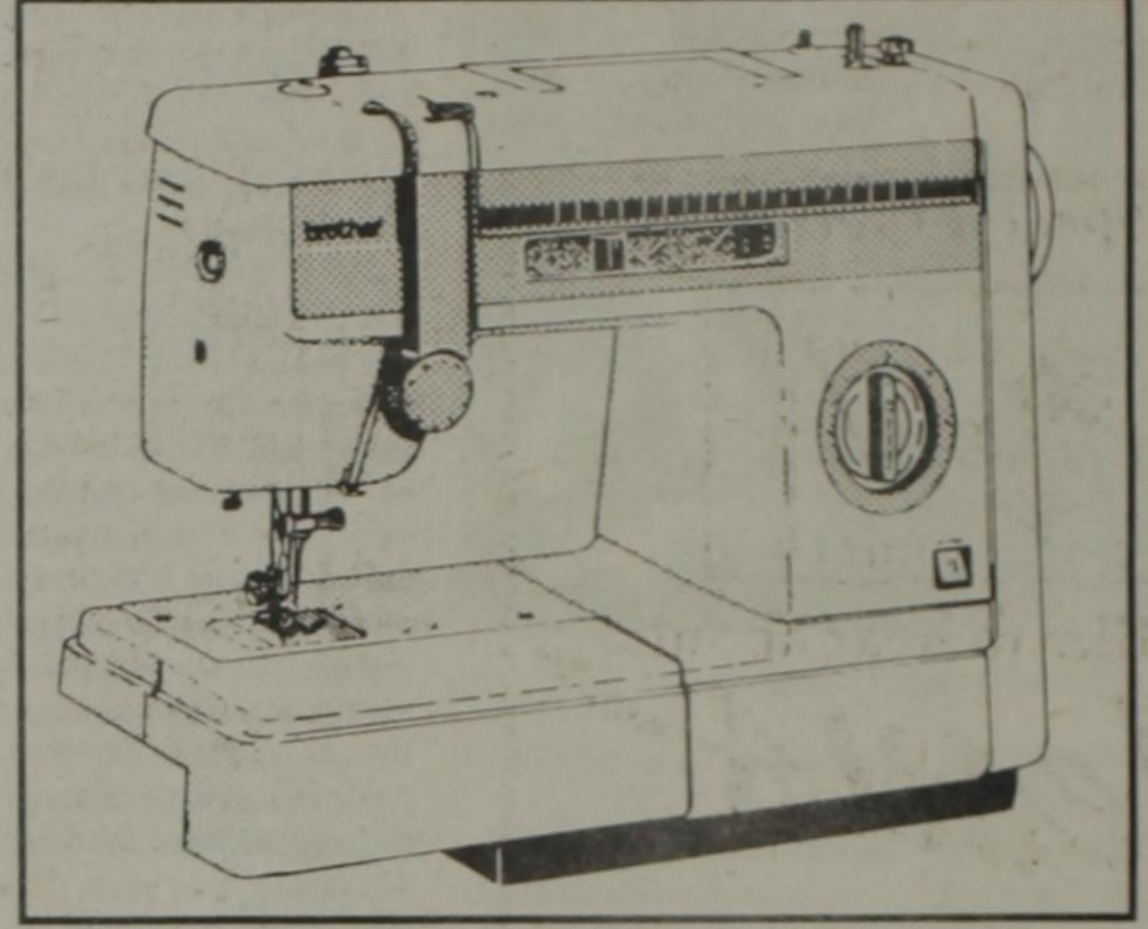

**Homemaking Hints**

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

The Tufts University Diet and Nutrition letter supplies the following information:

\*Bananas that are beginning to turn brown before you are ready to eat them should be put in the refrigerator. That's because the ripening process slows down considerably at temperatures below 55 degrees, according to the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association. The cold will kill cells in the banana's skin, resulting in an unappealing black peel, but the fruit itself will remain fresh for several days. If you want to hasten a still-green banana's ripening, store it in a paper bag. Ethylene gas that is needed for ripening is produced naturally by fruit and will be concentrated in those closed quarters to speed up the process.

\*A half cup of boiled cauliflower contains more than half the recommended dietary allowance for Vitamin C — and just 15 calories.

\*Newborns fed water to which sugar has been added appear to have a greater preference for sweets later in infancy. Sugared water as well

as sugary beverages should not be given to infants because they contribute calories without providing any of the other vital nutrients that young babies need for proper growth and development. They can also cause gas as well as exacerbate a case of diarrhea.

\*A swallowed bay leaf can potentially cause great pain by perforating the intestine or becoming embedded in the rectum. The best way to avoid that risk if you use bay leaves in marinara sauce, for example, is to remove them before pouring the sauce over pasta.

**CLOTHING COSTS UP!**

Clothing costs more this spring than ever before, particularly clothing for women

and young children. Prices for children's clothes were up by 10.3 percent in February, while women's clothing prices increased by 5.0 percent.

Men's and boy's clothing, footwear, and other apparel increased less, but the increase in price for all clothing averaged 3.6 percent, the largest monthly increase since 1947.

All the other categories of spending, such as food and beverages, housing, and medical care, that are used to determine the Consumer Price Index rose less than 1.0 percent in February.

Clothing costs soared because of higher priced spring fashions and economists expect that prices may drop later in the year. However, the styles being shown for fall, 1990, are expected to be costly, too.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK**

To lower fat in fried fish, here is a good suggestion. Buy fish plain and make your own fish sticks:

Cut white fish (pollock, cod, haddock) into 4" x 1 1/2" finger-shaped strips. Dip into low-fat yogurt, then roll in seasoned crumbs (1 cup crushed cornflakes, 4 tablespoons grated Parmesan, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 teaspoon salt).

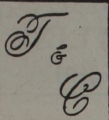



**County Extension Agents LREP Study Group Meeting**

Taylor predicted that it will be necessary to employ external development programs along with a strong and dedicated commitment to internal development for the county to rebound economically.

Nannette Keith, social worker for the Texas Department of Human Services, told the group that over one half of the population of Eastland County is over the age of 55 and the trend to an older population continues. Short term and long term care of senior citizens is becoming more important.

Keith said that the youth was one of our most valued commodities. Texas is, according to Keith, second in the nation in teen pregnancy. (Eastland County ranks highest in teen pregnancies with a 43 county region.) The school dropout rate is 25% in Texas. Eastland County also ranks high in drug abuse. Childcare for working mothers is a real problem in Eastland County according to Keith.

Don Shepard, Manager of Cisco Chamber of Commerce, said the county has real problems with solid waste disposal and lack of adequate amounts of quality water.

He said that 99% of the private sewage systems in Eastland County would not meet the standards set by the government. Cities in the county have the same problems.

After the panel of status reports the group divided into four task forces, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Home Economics, Youth, and Community Development. The groups identified the most critical issues facing the county. These issues will be studied and grouped into categories. A long range program will then be developed to reach objectives within each issue. Every county in Texas is developing the long range programs. They will all be considered in the develop-

ment of the Extension statewide program plan.

The major critical issues identified in Eastland County included: Agricultural Profitability, Alternate Crops, Vertical Integration, Integrated Pest Management, Rural-Town Relations, Water Conservation and Quality, Waste Disposal and Pollution, Insurance For Farm Workers, Rural Health Care, Weather Information, Animal Welfare, Development of Home Business, Leadership, Vocational Education, Money Management, Positive Parenting Skills, Parental Education (in drug abuse, cult and satanic influences), Motivation and Self-Esteem, Youth Employment, Life Skills for Youth, Environmental Awareness, Parental Involvement, Family Stress, Personal/Household Hygiene, Nutritional Needs, Elderly Needs (income, transportation, telephone reassurance, health) and Healthy Life Styles.

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

