Declared Disaster Areas Include Eastland County

Additional counties in the 22nd Senatorial District have been declared disaster areas and are eligible for aid, according to State Senator Bob

"Palo Pinto, Bosque, Eastland, Denton, Wise and Tarrant counties have been added to the list of counties declared disaster areas due to recent flooding and storm damage. Erath, Parker and Comanche counties were declared disaster areas last week," Glasgow said.

Anyone who has suffered damage should call the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) toll-free at 1-800-782-6681. Agency personnel will take necessary information and begin the

quickly as possible. Any per-

son who has sustained damage since approximately April 15, 1990, could qualify for disaster relief.

"In addition, those living in counties not yet declared disaster areas, but that have received flood or storm damage, are urged to contact the Agency at the toll-free number. It may be that they could qualify for disaster aid, as well," Glasgow said.

A number of programs are available under the FEMA relief program. Some of these programs include: temporary housing assistance; emergency home repair grants; rental assistance for homeowners or renters; Small Business Administration low interest loans and individual and family grants for serious processing of claims as needs and necessary ex-

Property Tax Protest and Appeals Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

. the value placed on your property . exemptions that may apply to you

. cancellation of agricultural appraisal

. whether your property is taxable which local governments should be taxing

your property; or you think the appraisal district has done

something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Contact the appraisal district staff at 817/629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. NOTE: You should not try to contact ARB members attside of the hearing. The law requires you to

sign an affidavit saving that you haven't done so

before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.



If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.







RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Cut white fish (pollock, cod, haddock) into 4" x 1 1/ 2" finger-shaped strips. Dip into low-fat yogurt, then roll in seasoned crumbs (1 cup crushed cornflakes, 4 tablespoons grated Parmesan, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/4 teaspoon salt).

Place on cookie sheet sprayed with vegetable oil cooking spray.

Bake in preheated 400 degree oven 10-15 minutes or until fish flakes.

Yield per 3 ounce serving (approximately 2 fish sticks) 99 calories, 1 gram fat, and 150 milligrams sodium).

(This compares to 3 ounce serving of commercially prepared frozen fish sticks, on the other hand, can be as high as 255 calories, 16 times as much fat, and twice the sodium).

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

County Extension Agents LREP Study Group Meeting

Taylor predicted that it will be necessary to employ external development programs along with a strong and dedicated commitment to internal development for the county to rebound economically.

Nannette Keith, social worker for the Texas Department of Human Services, told the group that over one half of the population of Eastland County is over the age of 55 and the trend to an older population continues. Short term and long term care of senior citizens is becoming more important.

Keith said that the youth was one of our most valued commodities. Texas is, according to Keith, second in the nation in teen pregnancy. (Eastland County ranks highest in teen pregnancies with a 43 county region.) The school dropout rate is 25% in Texas. Eastland County also ranks high in drug abuse. Childcare for working mothers is a real problem in Eastland County according to Keith.

Don Shepard, Manager of Cisco Chamber of Commerce, said the county has real problems with solid waste disposal and lack of adequate amounts of quality water.

He said that 99% of the private sewage systems in Eastland County would not meet the standards set by the government. Cities in the county have the same prob-

After the panel of status reports the group divided into four task forces, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Home Economics, Youth, and Community Development. The groups identified the most critical issues facing the county. These issues will be studied and grouped into categories. A long range program will then be developed to reach objectives within each issue. Every county in Texas is developing the long range programs. They will all be considered in the develop-

Bullock said that today's checks reflect the amount collected by 60 counties and 108 cities during the first quarter of 1990.


