At 17 years of age, he photographed the takeoff from the aircraft carrier USS Hornet of Jimmy Doolittle's "Tokyo Raiders"...covered atomic bomb test at Bikini Atoll...flown over North Viet Nam in a Marine Corps Phantom Jet...photographed an eclipse of the sun in Siberia...made a film on Albert Schweitzer in Gabon, Africa...covered the historic meeting of President Truman and General MacArthur at Wake Island...photographed such notables as: Presidents Roosevelt, Kennedy and Nixon, Charles DeGaulle, Premier Nikita Khrushchev, Charles Lindberg, Paul mantz, Frank Tallman, General Doolittle, Eddie Rickenbacher, Neil Armstrong, John Glenn, Dr. Werner Von Braun, and many others.

Bill's true love is aviation and space. He has installed his camera on everything from a 1905 Curtis Pusher to a Nike Zeus anti-ballistic missile...designed a television automatic tracking system and has accumulated over 30 hours flying with the Navy's Blue Angels, the Air Force Thunderbirds and the British Red Arrows. Bill was a consultant to the National

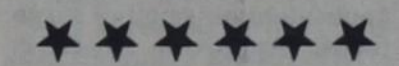
Before this, Mr. Butler had taught school for three years.

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# FROM OUR CHURCHES

## Church of Christ

### HOW CAN YOU KNOW IF YOU ARE RIGHT?

How can one know if he is right in doing anything? It is necessary to have a standard or authority in all affairs to life; otherwise chaos would fill the earth. If there were no traffic laws, for example, how many people would be killed on the highways? In religion, because many people ignore the authority, many are discouraged from trying to travel the "way of life." I suppose that if there were no traffic laws, or if the judges all said we could interpret those laws anyway that seemed good to us, many would be afraid to get onto the highways today. But what is the authority in religion?

We could use the religion of our parents. Or can we? Trace your genealogy back seven generations and you have 128 parents, all more than likely having different religious backgrounds. Paul had to give up the religion of his ancestors. (Galatians 1:14); Abraham was called upon to leave his kinsmen to serve God, (Genesis 12:1). Is it possible that we might have to leave the religion of our parents to serve God?

Possibly our conscience should be our guide. If that is true, then there would be a different standard for every individual. Many heathen people do things that are wrong, even in good conscience. They, with a clean conscience, could even cook and eat you. Paul had to give up trusting in his conscience because, with a clean conscience, he persecuted the church. (Acts 23:1). Proverbs 14:26 says there is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the ends thereof are the ways of death. May be our conscience should be guided, not be the guide.

Well, then, we can follow the majority. That sounds safe. Most people can't be wrong! Or can they? In Exodus 23:2, God told his people, "thou shalt not follow a multitude to do evil." In Matthew 7:13, 14, Jesus said, "Enter ye in at the strait gate; for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat; because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." If Jesus said that the majority is going to be lost, do you want to follow them?

Well, we will elect church councils and leaders. Surely these can agree on what is right. But look at the facts; they contradict each other, and often times in the same church different councils will contradict and embarrass themselves. It is not within man to direct his steps. (Jeremiah 10:23).

What is the authority? In Acts 3:22, 23, Peter quoted Moses as saying that God would raise up a prophet like

Moses from among his brethren that "Every soul which will not hear that prophet shall be destroyed from among the people." Verse 26 tells us he was talking about Jesus. ### Postmaster Cautions Citizens Of Door-To-Door Sales Of Zip Code Directories

Postmaster Don Boyett cautioned citizens of Rising Star, Texas to be wary of door-to-door sales of incomplete or out-of-date ZIP Code or post office directories.

"Business and households in Rising Star should be on the lookout for persons going door-to-door selling these directories. They are not authorized to do so by the Postal Service," Postmaster Boyett said.

Frequently, he said, the person doing the selling will be a young person posing as a student who will use the proceeds from the sale to further his or her education.

A ZIP Code directory is of little use unless it contains ZIP Code information for the 480 major cities which have more than one ZIP Code. The directories being sold door-to-door often list complete ZIP Codes only for smaller post offices having one ZIP Code. In addition, the information in them may not reflect changes in ZIP Code assignments which are made periodically to accommodate post office

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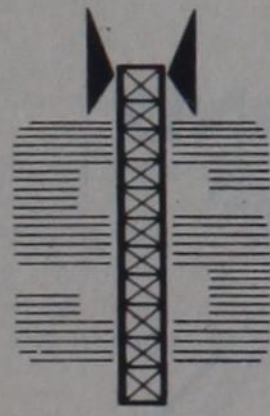

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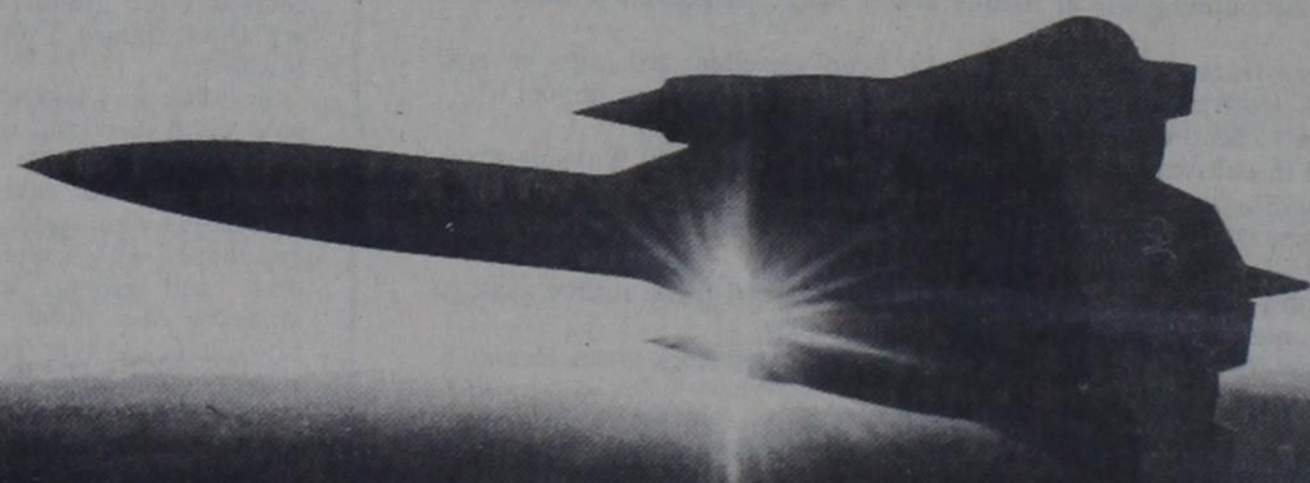
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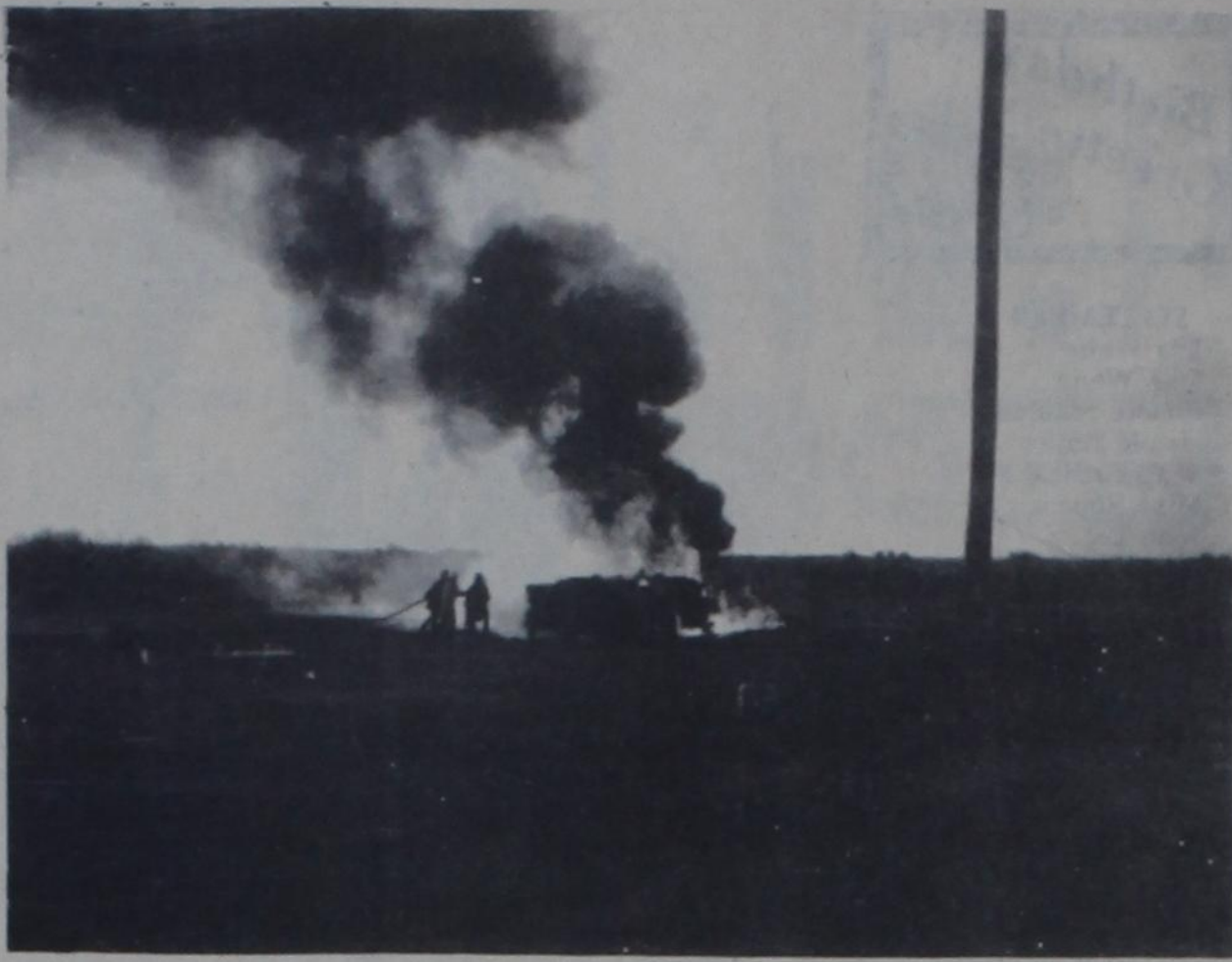
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**Members Of Rising Star Valuntary Fire Dept.

The sixth annual hay show will also be a part of the County Fair. The Eastland Young Farmers, sponsors of the hay show, urges all

producers to enter one bale in each class. These bales may be left at any feed or implement dealer in the County by September 8. Protein analysis will be run on each bale. This is a real good way for a hay producer to learn the quality of his hay.

There is still plenty of time to make a good hay crop and recent rains should help some.

The key to harvesting top quality hay is to cut grass when the greatest amount of digestible nutrients per acre may be obtained. This is

usually at a stage of growth just before plants begin maturing or producing seedheads. Delaying harvest may provide a slightly greater increase in yield, but this increase consists primarily of stems, stalks and other low-quality parts.

Once grass is cut, it must be dried to 12-18 percent moisture for safe baling and storage. Rapid curing and baling conserves leaves, nutrients, color, palatability and other quality factors, and this can be enhanced with the use of a hay conditioner.

For great effectiveness, use a hay conditioner within 15 minutes after cutting grass. Producers should take a close look at hay made from each cutting to determine its quality. This can be done visually as well as having a sample chemically analyzed. Visual inspection should be made by checking the knife edge of the bale. Check for state of maturity, texture, leafiness, foreign material and color. Top quality hay has mostly small stems that are pliable and flexible, has a high proportion of leaves, has few seedheads and is generally void of such foreign matter as weeds, manure and mold, and is a bright dark green color.

Chemical analysis of hay determines its nutrient value. The most common chemical determination is crude protein percentage from which the amount of digestible protein can be calculated. The County hay show will provide you with a quality score for both chemical and physical qualities.

AUSTIN, TEXAS--Figures released by the State Treasury Department indicate a sizeable increase in stamp tax collections.

According to State Treasurer, Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp tax collections for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1978 amounted to \$289,601,633.42, an increase of \$12,105,664.37 over collections in the previous fiscal year.

Collections hit an all-time monthly high in May, 1978 when \$27,071,882.90 was collected. The increase reflected during fiscal year 1978 averaged in excess of \$1 million per month.

Collections from the sale of stamps on liquor, beer, and wine amounted to \$1,836,206.29, an increase of \$70,959.63. This tax is imposed on tourists who bring alcoholic beverages across the bridges from Mexico into Texas.

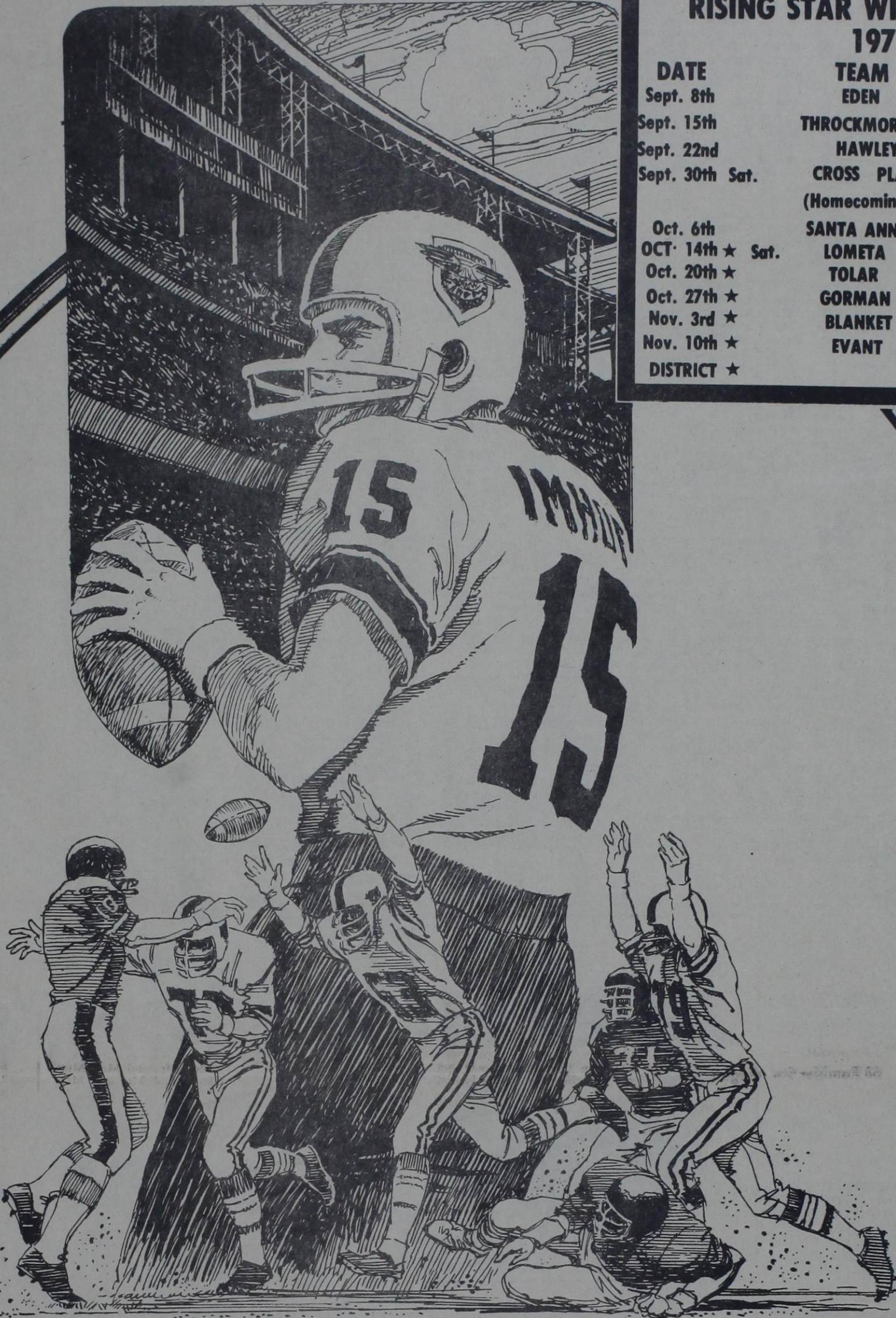
