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# Through The Editor's Specs

We have plenty of authority for the gloomy prospect that the small town is on its way out. There are prophets on every hand. Remnants of once flourishing communities lie along the routes of our modern highways like withered pumpkins cut from the vine. The law that nature discards what is no longer useful is also an economic fact. Only in the realm of government fiat and special privilege do archiac forms per-

Nevertheless, there are many small towns which seem to defy the oracles of doom and prosper. What is the answer?

It is my observation that these healthy exceptions — as a rule, at any rate - have capitalized certain advantages they possess in relation to the changing pattern of population development. They have been alert to new conditions and new opportunities, resilient enough to admit new ideas and competition.

Most smaller towns think of survival solely in terms of new and sometimes pathetic efforts to attract new capital and new pay rolls to bail themselves out of they usually want these invasions of new enterprise to come on their own terms, with no guarantees or investments of their own.

New payrolls are welcome; but they must fit neatly into the established context, like a late-comer slipping into a pew at the Methodist Church. Let a new enterprise conflict with an established business; let it threaten the dislocation of an inherited pre-emption; let it require that the status quo get off its shine and scrabble for new business and a new reason for being, and the howls of Cerberus in the clutches of Hercules make an apt figure of speech. They want the growing, but not the pains.

Such antebellum thinking ignores the sanguinary fact that there are no vacuums in the economy. Any and every new enterprise must shoulder its way into the texture. Displacements. relocations and demises are inevitable in change. It is the price we pay for progress. Tragically, death is also the price we pay for standing still.

New nidustry is wonderful. There are communities ideally situated and endowed to benefit from industrial expansion; and there is even some merit to the small town which strains its civic budget to hire bright young advocates with new-mintof shiny literature to glamorize the commonplaces of the local web. Such spinning sometimes catches a nice, fat fly. Whether the fly is worth the web is a question that can only be answered when the value of all that is spent or sacrificed is balanced against the total of what is

gained. But when a small town pins its hopes solely upon its advantages and appeal to new industry, it is living in a brave new world. The new gas, arriving at the city gate through a pipe line laid by Henson Construction Company of Cisco, was fed into the distribution system under a pressure of 175 pounds, more or less, a pressure to which it was reduced from almost 1,000 pounds pressure at the well-head about 71/2 miles southeast of Rising Star.

It was cut to about 180 pounds with a regulator at the well and the pressure at the gate, after more han seven miles of line, was reduced only a few pounds.
