Council Hears Proposal From Fire Department

The Rising Star City Council met in regular session Monday night, July 11 at City Hall with all members present.

Mayor John Lee brought the meeting to order.

Jerrel Bishop, representative from the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department was present to propose a plan to operate the ambulance service in Rising Star. This proposal would be set up as a Rescue Unit similar to other surrounding towns and operated by the volunteer Fire Department.

The mayor was instructed by the Council to look further into the matter and contact operating Rescue units for more detailed information concerning insurance, licensing, and various qualifications. Jerry Winfrey of Winfrey Feed and Peanut was present to discuss the gas distribution system with the council.

The Council authorized Mayor Lee to borrow money from the First State Bank for general

operating expenses as needed by the City. A motion was made to pay the Eastland County Dispatch \$138.75 plus yearly closing expenses, but to check further into the payment of the Ranger portion left when they terminated their contract with the dispatch.

Three sealed bids on the H. Moore Well No. 2 were opened and all three were rejected.

Weldon Lee was voted in as Mayor Pro-Tem of Rising Star. Gene Hicks, Chief of Police was present with a request to hire a replacement for Mr. Robert DePriest, who was recently hired by the council as patrolman. Mr. DePriest has left Rising Star, leaving only one patrolman.

There was a short discussion on the Crownover Well operating fund. No action was taken. No further business, the meeting adjourned.

N.M. Dillard of Cross Plains will drill a proposed 2,800 foot wildcat in Brown County. It is No. 1 N.M. Dillard located eight miles northwest of Brownwood on a 296 acre lease. Drillsite is 660 feet from the north and 1,115 feet from the east lines of TTRR Survey 1. A-1299.

PEACH COBBLER A LA MODE

Base:
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup water
5 cups sliced fresh or canned and well drained peaches
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/8 teaspoon almond extract

Biscuits:
1 1/3 cups packaged buttermilk biscuit mix
2 tablespoons sugar
1/3 cup light cream or half and half
Slivered almonds
Vanilla ice cream

Heat oven to 400°F. and butter a 1 1/2-quart shallow baking dish. For base, combine sugar, cornstarch and nutmeg. Stir in water until smooth. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Add peaches; return to a boil. Remove from heat. Stir in butter, lemon juice and almond extract. Pour into buttered baking dish.

For biscuits, combine biscuit mix and sugar. Add cream and stir just until a soft dough forms. Drop by tablespoons over hot base to make 8 biscuits. Sprinkle with almonds. Bake about 15 minutes. Serve warm with scoops of vanilla ice cream.

BEEF EXTENDER—How can you stretch a pound of ground beef to service eight? Three good extenders are cottage and Cheddar cheese and elbow macaroni. With good seasonings it makes a satisfying casserole that teams well with an economical salad of spinach leaves, cauliflowerets, lettuce and tomatoes.

COTTAGE BEEF BAKE

1 package (7 oz.) elbow macaroni
2 cups cottage cheese
1 pound ground beef
1 cup chopped onion
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons Italian seasoning
1 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese
Seasoned bread crumbs

Heat oven to 325°F. and butter a 2-quart casserole. Cook macaroni according to package directions; drain well. Combine with cottage cheese; set aside. Cook together beef and onion until meat is cooked; drain. Stir in tomato sauce, flour, Italian seasoning and salt. Cook 1 minute. Spread half of the macaroni mixture on the bottom of the casserole. Top with half of the meat mixture. Sprinkle half of the Cheddar cheese over meat layer. Repeat layers. Bake 40 minutes. Sprinkle bread crumbs and remaining cheese in a ring on top of casserole. Bake an additional 5 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Yield: 8 servings (1-cup each).

GOOD TO THE LAST DROP --- At today's prices, utilize even the coffee can. They make dandy miniature greenhouses. Remove both ends with can opener. Press can vertically into soil over newly transplanted plants and cover open end with plastic lid. Keep cans around the plants until the danger of frost disappears. Lids can be removed in daytime and replaced on cool nights.

THE PITS --- Once table salt has pitted your silver shaker, the damage cannot be removed. Better to remove the salt from silver shakers each time before storing and avoid problems.



CALORIE COUNTDOWN

DIET HOT DOGS
Calorie counters need not avoid hot dogs. If you eat them right, the calorie count isn't all that bad.

All-beef hot dogs not only have the lowest calorie count of all the frank varieties, they also give you the assurance of being made from wholesome, controlled ingredients. Look for the all-beef specification no matter how or where you buy your dogs. These contain 145 to 150 calories each, depending mostly on slight variations in size. That's not a bad calorie count in itself, but franks are seldom eaten all by their lonesome, so let's check out the calories in the products we're likely to eat with them.

First the bun. A bun has about 120 calories which immediately puts the hot dog calorie count up to about 270 per.

As to condiments, a tablespoon of pickle relish will add 20 calories. Chopped raw onion amounts to only 4 calories per two tablespoons. Cooked onions in tomato sauce have about 15 calories per tablespoon. Sauerkraut has only 2 calories per tablespoon so you can pile that on without hesitation. Tomato catsup has 15 calories per tablespoon; yellow mustard has about 10 in a tablespoon, and a tablespoon of spicy brown mustard has about 13 calories.

None of these conditions will be very restrictive to your diet and, even in combinations, it is unlikely that you will push your hot dog calorie count above 300 by indulging in them.

For lunch or dinner, a simple satisfying 300-calorie is quite modest, but it is rather difficult to avoid the other allures that go with weiner-eating especially if you are hot-dogging at a snack stand. The best beverages are, of course, diet sodas, many of which have only 1 or 2 calories per 12-ounce can. If no diet soda is available, ginger ale is the best bet for dieters among the sugared drinks. It contains 115 calories for 12 ounces. Root beer, grape, orange and the other fruit sodas are the highest in calories; lemon-lime and colas are slightly lower, but still too far up there for serious dieters.

Chips, fries, baked beans and most of the other accompaniments of hot dogs are certainly to be avoided if you are serious about your diet. If you're having a hot dog at home, a tossed salad with diet dressing is a perfect accompaniment for pound watchers. If you have two hot dogs (totaling 600 with buns) with a diet soda, avoid the fattening side dishes completely.

The lot number is on the top of the products label, preceded by the words "control number." Tests conducted by Ames, the manufacturer, indicated that about 15 percent of the strips will give false positive results. Return products with these numbers to your pharmacy for an exchange.

Why is my pacemaker considered a safe device when I have to be careful around microwave ovens? — F.H.
A medical device is considered safe when its use involves less risk for the patient than the disease the device is designed to correct, and if the device is the best available. Does your pacemaker fit this description?

Is it possible for me to deduct transportation costs as a medical expense? — M.T.
Yes. You may deduct bus, taxi, train, or plane fares, or ambulance fees. You may also deduct a standard mileage of 7 cents for each mile you use a car for medical purposes. Fashion 'n Fabrics
By FANNIE GLEESON

The gored skirt is back. The simplicity pattern illustrated has only two panels in front and back. The Jiffy top is designed with a clever yoke that combines sleeves and collar. The pocket, which punctuates the opening, as shown in the sketch may be deleted.

The circumference of the skirt, i.e., the area around the waist and hips, is critical in relation to fit, appearance and comfort. Though sections of a gored skirt are shaped, it is simple to increase or decrease the circumference without distorting the design.

For example, you might be more comfortable if the waist was a little more snug. You don't want to tamper with the ease, which is a basic part of the design, but want to reduce the circumference of the waist by one inch.

Mark off one-quarter inch on the side seams at waistline of pattern. Draw a tapered line from the mark to just above the fullest part of the hips. This is your new cutting line. As you have two seam allowances on each side, the total reduction is one inch.

To increase the circumference of the waist one inch or more, place white shelf paper under the tissue pattern; tape them together and mark off an extended waistline. Proportion the amount of the extension. Draw a new cutting line, tapering it to just above fullness of the hips.

If the waistline does not need alteration, but you find there is too much fabric at the hipline causing vertical wrinkles rather than true drape, you can reduce the hipline only.

Determine amount of reduction needed. Identify fullest part of hipline on pattern and place a mark at seamline. Indent one-fourth of the amount of total reduction. Draw a line from this mark to the cutting edge of waistline, tapering as you go. Draw a line from the hipline to the hem edge, which is uniform all the way down the remainder of the seam.

To enlarge hipline of pattern without changing waist measurement, place paper under tissue pattern and extend seamline from mark at fullest part of hips. With a yardstick, draw a slanted line that connects hipline mark with cut edge of waistline and the extended seamline at hem edge.

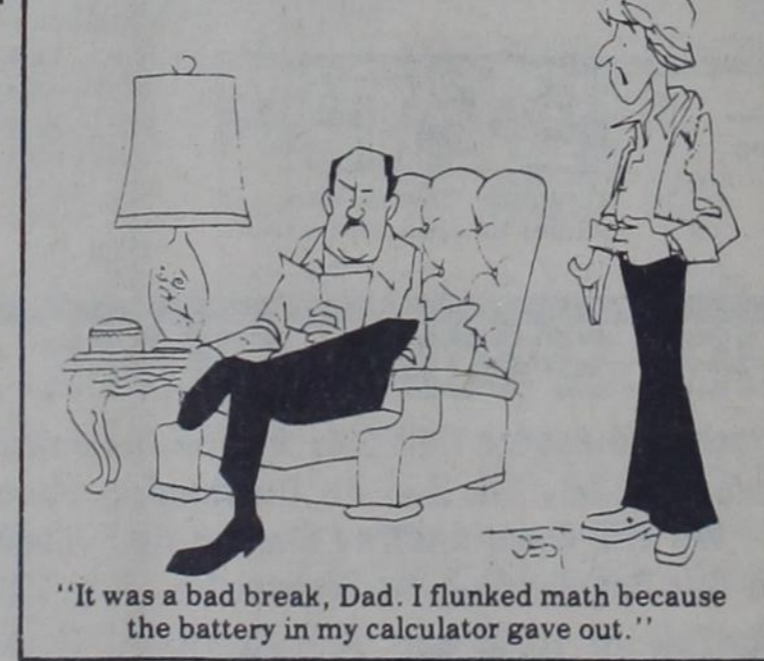

I've had millions of chest X rays, blood and urine tests, gi series and other examinations. They all show nothing wrong.

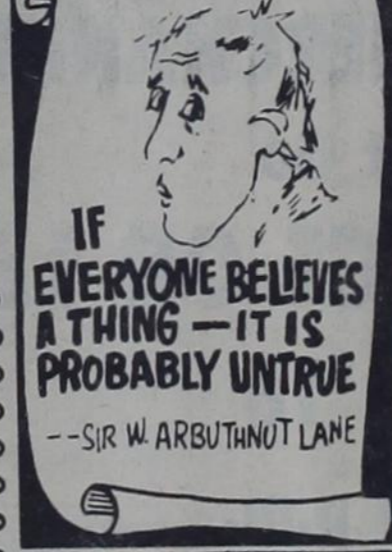

WHEN YOU BREAK DOWN ON THE ROAD

With all the traveling we do, the one thing that usually concerns us the most is having serious mechanical difficulty far from home. Where would we go to have the car or an RV fixed?

Of course, the chances of any such difficulty can be minimized by taking the precaution of having your vehicles checked out by a competent mechanic at home before the trip.

Until now there was no option but to place yourself at the mercy of the first repair station on the highway, an admittedly risky proposition for a stranger.

Now help is at hand. The Recreational Vehicle Dealers Association of North America has prepared an "RV Service & Repair Directory" listing locations where repairs will be available.

The new directory will contain listings of RV dealers and service centers who are willing to provide assistance to out-of-town RVers, whether they are owners or renters. Detailed listings of exactly which services and repairs each individual dealership can provide will make up the body of the directory, which will be arranged geographically for easy reference.

Membership in RVDA for dealers is not a requirement in order to be listed in the directory, therefore a wider range of options will be available.

The directory is designed to fit conveniently into a glove compartment. No brand names will be advertised in it.

Those listed will not necessarily be expected to provide free work under warranty unless the particular manufacturer has agreed to reimburse the dealer for service or repair work under the manufacturer's warrant. The customer should inquire about this before agreeing to any work.

The RVDA has also compiled an "RV Rental Directory" listing retailers across the country that rent camper trailers, travel trailers, truck campers, mini-motor homes, and full-sized motor homes.

The directory will be distributed in cooperation with the U.S. Travel Service, an arm of the United States Department of Commerce.

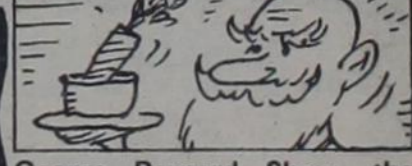
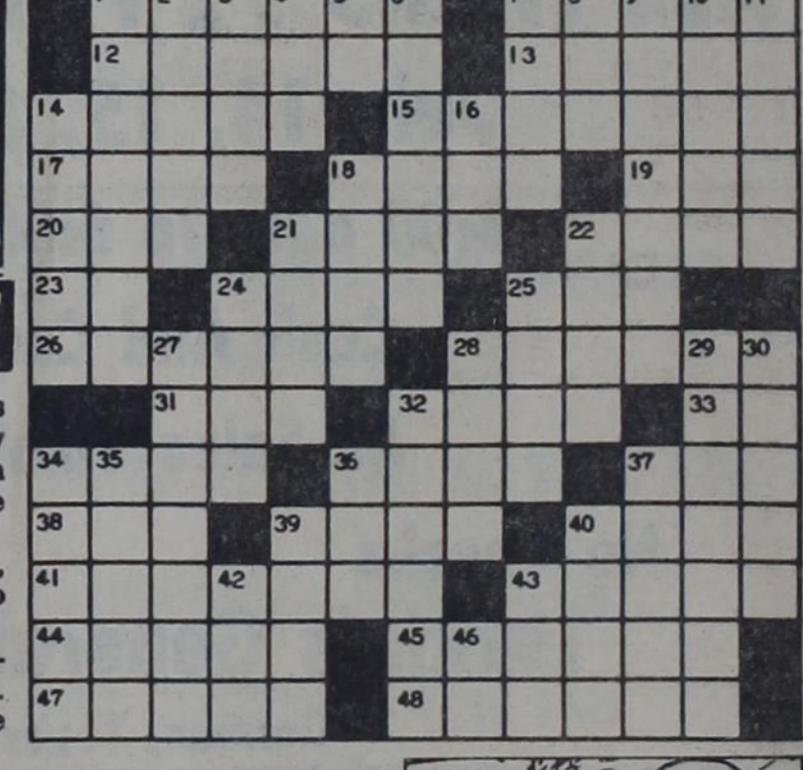

With all the participation and enthusiasm shown us, there should be no doubt that this will become an annual event in Rising Star.

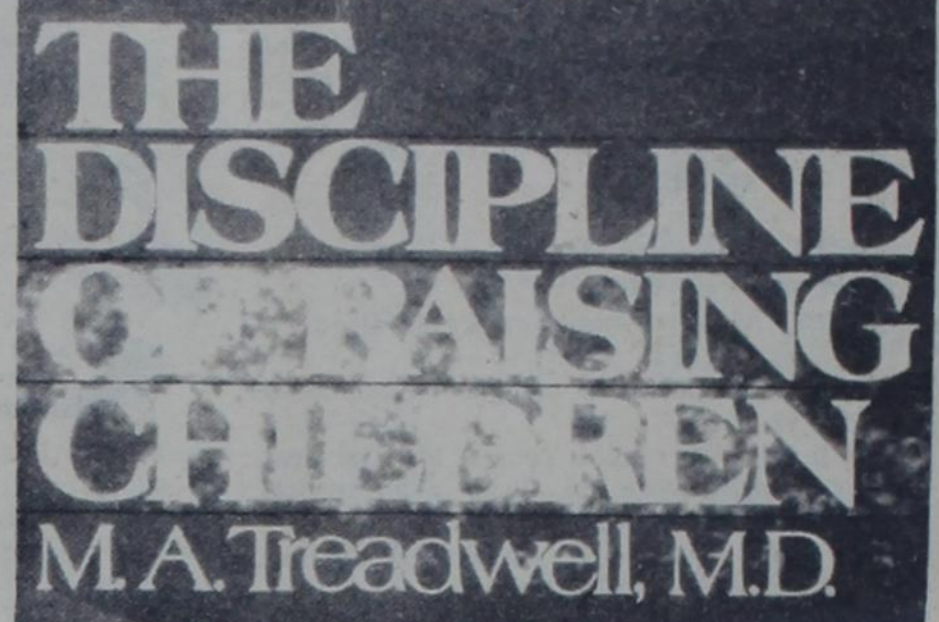

FARM NEWS

SOUTHWESTERN SECTION - Demand for Southeastern Grown peanuts was very light and trading was slow during the week ending July 8. Sales of new crop peanuts were too few to establish the market. Hot dry weather was the rule throughout the week. Scattered showers helped but most sections were in need of substantially more moisture. Temperatures averaged several degrees above normal. Soil moisture was very short to short in all sections. The Florida crop was in fair condition. Georgia Peanuts were rated in mostly fair to good condition with about 90 percent of the crop bloomed and 80 percent pegging. The Alabama crop was in fair condition but made slow development due to the lack of moisture. Only about one third of the Alabama peanut acreage was pegging. Prices paid per pound for shelled runner type peanuts sold on an Fob shipping point basis for July Shipment were: Jumbo 34 cents; Medium 33; and us splits 28 1/2.

VIRGINIA NORTH CAROLINA SECTION - Demand for Virginia and North Carolina Grown peanuts was very light and trading was slow during the week ending July 8. Sales of new crop peanuts were too few to establish the market. Showers provided little relief from the hot dry weather. Soil moisture dropped but was not considered critical. The crop was in generally good condition and was mostly in the bloom stage. Prices paid per pound for shelled number two grade Virginia type peanuts sold on a Fob shipping point basis for July shipment were 27 cents. Sales of other grades were too few to establish the market.

SOUTHWESTERN SECTION - Demand for Southwestern grown peanuts was very light during the week ending July 8. Trading was very slow. Sales of new crop peanuts were too few to establish the market. Most of the Southwest got very little rainfall during the past week. All sections were hot and were in need of moisture but soil conditions were not considered critical. Most sections were in bloom and were in good condition. Prices paid per pound for shelled jumbo grade Spanish type peanuts sold on an Fob shipping point basis for prompt shipment were 37 cents. Sales of other grades were too few to quote.

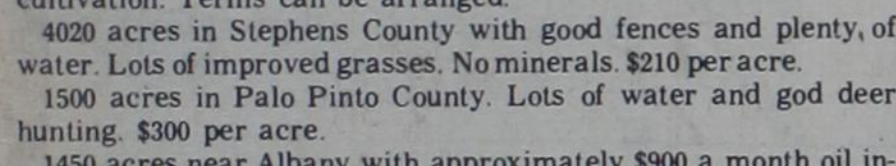

4-H Gold Star Award Judging To Begin Soon

On Wednesday July 13th, a tour of the applicants homes and projects and personal interview will be conducted. Results will be announced at the County Award Banquet in October. Anyone interested in applying for this honor should contact Danny Phillips or Susan McMillan.

July 11th, 5 p.m. is the deadline for turning in recordbooks. This should be brought to the county extension office. And will be judged the morning of July 12th. Records can be filed out in many different areas ranging from sheep to food preservation or photography. Two divisions will be juniors

9-14 and seniors 14-19 years old. The judging will be based on 50 percent 4-H project 25 percent leadership and 25 percent citizenship and community activities.

Materials and information for recordbooks are available through the extension office. Those turning in a recordbook will receive a pin at the awards banquet for their efforts and time spent in filling these out.

Also due the 11th are 4-H club secretary's guides. These will be judged and a winner chosen on the basis of neatness, accuracy, completeness and related information the traveling trophy will be awarded to the winner at the county awards banquet.

Church Of Christ

An analysis of the New Testament will reveal two major divisions in the material presented therein. There is the message of redemption, the "Good News" of God's grace and concern, as manifested in the long centuries of preparation for, the coming, life, death, resurrection, ascension and promised return of the Savior. Untold millions have thrilled over the years to the realization that the "...God who made the world and all things therein...being Lord of heaven and earth..." "...so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life" (Acts 17: 24; John 3:16). The joy of this realization is compounded by the assurance that "the fulness of time" (Galatians 4:4) came nearly two centuries ago, that the "offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all" (Hebrews 10:10) is a fact of history and not still prospective, and that, through Christ, we not only have hope "as an anchor of the soul...sure and steadfast and entering into that which is within the veil..." (Hebrews 6:19) but also have the present privilege of "drawing near with boldness to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy, and may find grace to help us in time of need." (Hebrews 4:16).

The second part of New Testament contents builds upon the first. It deals with the continual process of "putting off the old man" of the world and "putting on the new man," in the likeness of God (Colossians 3:1-10; Matthew 5:48). In other words, there is the area of teaching (doctrine); what is true about God, Christ, salvation, etc. and that which concerns: "reproof" (Being made aware of faults), "correction" (how to remedy the situation) and "instruction

in righteousness (how to maintain the correct direction) (2 Timothy 3:15-17). There is the material designed to make individuals disciples and that which is intended to preserve that nature (Matthew 28:19-20).

Upon these two things every faithful Gospel preacher must insist. That is what is meant by "Preaching the Word, in season and out of season..." (2 Timothy 4:1ff).
