



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

# **Articles Of The Past**

Y. McCutchen Second part of the Rising Star Record Historical Edition, August 1937 of Smith and Agnew Families were among the first----

By 1880, the year the Anderson family arrived and opened a store here and a number of families had located around the present site of Rising Star --including I.B. Walker, O.D. Reed, T.H. and W.H. Cox, L.I. Cox, Joe Cone and several others. W.W. Anderson, known as uncle Will and who now makes his home in Cross Plains, was the first of the Andersons to come to Texas from Arkansas. As early as 1870 Uncle Will was engaged in freighting in Texas, operating around Gonzales and from Llano to old Fort BenFicklin present site of San Angelo. His father, T.W. Anderson was the first to open a store here, which was operated by Uncle Will, who also had charge of the local stage stand. H.E., Jim and Charlie Anderson did not come out until a few years later and did not become identified with business life of the new town of Rising Star until about 1883. The Bucy family, with Capt. W.P. Bucy, as its head, arrived in 1884 and settled on the present Jim Smith place, just south of town in a new log house. The family made their home there for several years while Will and Ed were engaged in farming. Later they moved into town and were actively identified with the business life of town for many years. Will, being the first telephone man and Ed, one of the town first lively stable operators.

**TOO CROWDED** 

J.M. "Uncle Mose" Roach, first settled a few miles southeast of town in 1878 and in 1883 located his present homestead and erected one of the first "plank" houses in this section, which still stands on the farm. Uncle

now covered with what is known as sand rough shinnery being open plain covered with luscious sedge grass. Game consisting of

deer, antelope, quail, wild turkey and some bear was abundant and there was no problem of supplying the larger with meat. The main thing was bread. A mill was put in at Sipe Springs in an early day and corn was taken there to be ground. Many of the first settlers hauled wheat to the old mill on the Bosque River near Clifton.

**Homes Built of Logs** All the first homes were built of logs cut from the abundant post oak timber and neighbors pitched in together and helped to erect

one another's houses. Life was simple with the early settlers here-most of them had little money-but found that they did not need much, as there was nothing to spend it for. Practically everything for the table was 'raised at home. Corn was taken to the mill at Sipe Springs to be ground and wheat could be made into flour. Some sugar and coffee was about all that was needed to complete the fare. Any farmer could keep his table well supplied with game for meat and if a change was desired one of them would kill a beef and portion it out with the neighbors. When another beef was needed another neighbor would do the same thing.

Beef was never sold. **People Were Honest** An interesting side light on the lack of money and the honesty of the people was

# **OIL NEWS**

Louisiana Crude Oil & Gas Co. Inc. of New Orleans will drill No. 2 Raymond Beck in the Pat Kahan (Mississippian) Field in Eastland County.

The planned 4,100-foot venture is located on a 114-acre lease five miles north of Eastland. It spots 2,230 feet from the south and 2,107 feet from the east lines of Section 21, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Sers Oil & Gas Co., Brownwood, will drill No. 1 Clausen in the regular field two miles northeast of Williams.

The planned 3,200-foot venture is located on a 100-acre lease. It spots 6,000 feet from the

north and 6,800 feet from the east lines of H.P. Brewster Survey 790.

F.J. Saddler, Abilene, will drill two regular field projects in the county.





> "It's quite likely that many of us received mail during the recent holidays bearing a special cancellation that read: 'Rural Letter Carriers, Serving America."" he said. "And you may see the same imprint on some of your mail for a few days into the new year.'

The cancellations were part of a tribute to the National expected to be effective Rural Letter Carriers Association, which has been considerable economic in existence for 75 years. "The number of Americans who receive their mail on rural routes today totals "Effects of a high rate of about 14.3 million families. Each day, more than 30,000 full-time rural carriers travel some 2.2 million miles --"It aggravates the cost-price

roughly equivalent to four round trips to the moon -delivering letters, packages, catalogs and other materials to the nation's rural residents," Postmaster Boyett said. Locally, about 590 families

are served by 2 rural routes. Mr. Boyett noted that rural delivery was first officially suggested by Postmaster General John Wannamaker in his annual report for fiscal year 1891. The first bill to authorize rural delivery was introduced in Congress by Rep. James O'Donnell of Michigan on January 5, 1892, but the \$6 million appropriation request failed to pass.

More than a year later, Rep. Thomas E. Watson of Georgia managed to get a \$10,000 appropriation measure through Congress for an experimental rural delivery service. It becomes law on March 3, 1893, the day Postmaster General Wannamaker left office. His

bid for reelection, so the idea languished for several years. It wasn't until October 1. 1896, that Postmaster General William L. Wilson used a \$40,00 appropriation set aside by Congress to begin an experiment with rural delivery service in his home state of West Virginia. It began with five routes. three out of Charles Town, a fourth from Halltown and a fifth out of Uvilla.

On December 20, 1899, Carroll County, Md., became the first county in the nation to be served by rural delivery.

Congress continued to appropriate funds for the service on an "experimental" basis until 1902, when an appropriation act made it permanent as of July 1. After this, rural service spread like wildfire. It went from 82 routes in 1897 to more than 8,000 in 1902. And it was up to 15,000 in 1903. when the National Rural

in Chicago. The number of rural routes peaked at more than 45,000 in 1926. But the total number of miles served that year --1.2 million -- was only about half the number travelled by rural carriers today, even though the actual number of routes has been reduced by about 13,000.

There is a story of a little girl who had never been to worship before. As the preacher went to the front and started to offer a prayer he said the usual "Let us bow." At that, the congregation bowed their heads. The little girl's voice could be heard very clearly as she asked, "Mommy, what are we looking for?"

Sometimes it may get to be a ritual to pray. Sometimes we may even be so tired as we pray at night that we drop off to sleep as we are saying the "amen." But from time to time, it may do us good to ask ourselves, "What are we looking for?" Do we pray really believing? James tells us to pray "nothing doubting (James 1:6, 7). And in the same context we learn that if we lack wisdom, God will give it to us if we ask Him for it. In the last chapter of James, starting with verse 15, he lets us know that th the prayer of the faithful would be answered and gives Elijah as an example of the Almighty God listening to a man of "like passions" such as we have, and answering that man's prayer.

Jesus taught us to pray in the sermon on the mount. In Matthew 6:9-13 he gave his disciples a model prayer. In that example he taught that we have a relationship to God; we are his children, calling on our Father. We are to praise Him, ask for our needs, ask for forgiveness as we forgive, and ask for his protection from evil. We learn that all is to be done in Christ's name, so we end our prayers in His name. Prayer is one thing that every person can do; Christians are the only ones who can really appreciate God as their Father. When we pray, what are we looking for? Let us pray without ceasing, looking for only the will of God to be done on earth as it is in Heaven.



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


