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
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State Redistricting

JUDGE SCOTT BAILEY AND THE By Viola M. Payne **NEW YEAR**

Probably nowhere is local Government more typically American and more generally accessible than right in the Eastland County Courthouse. There County Judge Scott Bailey has presided over a local Court for almost 20 years, and there I went back to his office for his observations on another New Year - 1981.

It was a gray day, this end of 1980 - with high clouds, a cold wind rattling pecan husks, and the Courthouse solid and enduring. We sat in a corner office above the Square, and our conversation was punctuated by oilfield trucks grinding past. I missed the Bank Clock, which used to flick out the time across the street. Now the Bank was in its new building a block east, and the old location stared mutely down on Seaman Street.

Something new had been added to Judge Bailey's office in 1980 - a framed license stating that he passed his Bar examination for the State of Texas, and may practice law in all the Courts of the State. He could add this to his Degree as a teacher, and studies in history and Government.

"I feel more comfortable about this interview than the first one," I told Judge Baiely. "I'm better informed now on local Government - more interested. Is this a trend of the times?"

'By all means. There has been a real resurgance of in-

terest in local Government with people demanding something for the tax dollars they pay. The citizens are definitely more alert and concerned, and I want the County Government to have an open door policy toward

And speaking of concerned - "The Judge looked past his desk, far past, even beyond the motto on his calender which said 'Where Law ends, Tyranny prevails'. "I still think the situation of the hostages in Iran is a leading local story for 1980. Yes, I say local, for those Americans were over there representing us. They

are part of us, and we cannot say we are a land of liberty and justice until they are free, and also have justice.

When we first sent Christmas cards, in '79, my son picked the name Charles Scott for our card. Severa! days ago, for the time, we finally saw the name and picture of Charles Scott on

'Hostage situations are nothing new, especially for the State of Texas. Stephen F. Austin, you remember, was once held hostage in Mexico City. And Wm. Eastland, for whom this County is named, was a prisoner in Mexico when he drew a black bean and was executed. So human being's have suffered under this type of conduct for a long time. But that doesn't make it any easier."

After time out to attend to some business, the Judge turned to another subject.

"At least some of our Eastland County problems have settled down. Our new jail opened this year, and is in complete compliance with Federal Standards. The security is much better than in the old one, and it is easier to operate. It is also more expensive to operate than the

old one, due to increased staffing, utilities, and insurance.

Violent crime seems to be increasing in the County at this time. I believe it is part of a pattern of social deterioration almost everywhere - of disreagard for life.

'Alcoholism is about the same - a continued problem. I have been appointed Chairman for 1981 of the Four County Commisson on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse, and we hope to come up with something to help. One thenth of all persons who drink alcohol are abusive you can say they have a selfinflicted disease.

'In my Court here I am getting more marijuana possession cases - of small amounts, many times. This is still a crime - a serious · matter.

'I can't get over the thought that smoking cigarettes, especially for young people, makes it easier to begin marijuana smoking. And any type of drug dependency can lead to the use of alochol and hard

drugs.

budget was \$1,233,375.00. Add about 12 per cent to that, and you can project what the County will need for 1981.

Due to more oil and gas development, and related service industries, our local economy and tax revenues have been stable. But there are extra expenses on roads and bridges due to the increased traffic, especially of heavy equipment. During the past four years four bridges have been broken down. These are really expensive to replace.

We may lose around \$31,000 on Latera! Road Funds, due to a veto by Gov. Clements. I hope the 1981 Legisalture will override him on this.

We are also faced with the possibility of losing our Revenue Sharing Funds, which would affect every town in the County. I hope this can be averted.

When asked his opinion on why the National election went as it did in November. Judge Bailey commented: "I believe there is a conservative trend - that people are disenchanted with Government. Eastland County, in a Democratic area, went Republican by 95 votes. I believe the voters are looking at performance now, rather than party labels. They are insisting on a more open Government at all levels, and that they be allowed to participate in decision making. People,

also, are now more prone to seek legal redress.

But you will note that some effective Democratic Congressmen stayed in office, despite the National

Judge Bailey believes that the Tax Reappraisal of Eastland County will be big news for 1981.

"People don't realize the full impact of Bill 621," he states. "I believe the Legislature will have to revise this Bill and iron out some problems.

The Lw is an attempt to get a single value for all property, and then let various taxing agencies decide as to

The McMorries Co., which will appraise much of the Eastland County land, is working here at this time. The appraisers have held a mass meeting at Rising Star, and have procured maps and other data.

'It is very difficult to appraise property at market value in inflationary times. Eastland County land is varied, and complicated to appraise in any circumstance. Some of the value of the land is speculative, with taxes assessed at far less than market value. So there is much work ahead."

Judge Bailey was not particularly surprised at the 1980 Census, which tabulated Eastland County with 19,443 persons - a lower figure than some had hoped. "There are a number of one-person households here," he states. "I have to deal with death wills, probates, and the like, which make me aware of this. For the first time in 30 years deaths haven't outnumbered births! At least

we had about a six and onehalf per cent population in-

The year 1980 he believes, brought some positive changes for County govenment. A year ago both the County Sheriff and District Judge were appointees. Now these offices are filled by elected officials, who happen to be the same persons appointed. But the fact of their elections lends public support and stability to the offices, states the Judge.

Another plus for the County, and one in which the Judge feels a special interest, is the Nutrition Program for Sienior Citizens. "Now we have programs in Ranger, Gorman, Eastland, and Cisco operating under the West Texas Council of Government, with a Volunteer Program in Rising Star. The group in Gorman obtained their own Center in August of '80, with Ranger Jr. College in charge

of their program and that of Ranger. Cisco and Eastland are operated by Cisco Junior College. All the Directors, workers, and volunteers at these Centers do an outstanding job, in my estimation. The food is good and the programs interesting
