Indians were not only the work of mischief in the early history of this country. Bands of masked white men rode through the country at night, cutting fences, falsely accusing law -abiding farmers and hanging them in the woods. These outlaws called themselves "The Mob." At times four to six innocent men would be hung in one night, to be discovered later, their bodies almost unrecognizable, for having been eaten by birds and wild animals. Many of these atroscities were attributed to Indians who were innocent of the crimes.

At the close of the Civil War a man named Dalton killed his wife at their farm home near the township of Stephenville. He was tried by the largest jury ever assembled.


