An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this



Also, personnel at the local laboratories became aware of the need for greater standardization among the regional laboratories.

For these reasons, a system of regional laboratories was established. As financing became available the number of laboratories and services provided were expanded, until today there are 22 laboratories located outside Austin serving nearly the entire population of Texas. Areas without regional services continue to submit specimens for testing to Austin.

The bulk of regional laboratory service include serological studies, water and milk bacteriology and some identification of disease organisms related to communicable disease control.

Biologics production - manufacture of vaccines - and rabies identification, except in Houston, are performed solely in the Austin laboratory.

Standardization is maintained among the regional laboratories with frequent seminars and training sessions in Austin and by standardization tests. Syphilis serology is tested for instance, by samples distributed for examination which have been codare positive and which are neg-
