When a writer combines two or more of these fields into a book of historyhistory not found in text books, there is such an interestholding quality, one learns while being entertained. So it is with Elmer Kelton's score or more books, not the least interesting is "The Wolf and The Buffalo."

The Civil war was over, but the country was not at peace. The Indian problem had not been resolved. Hostile Indians and the **U.S.** Cavalry continues to clash throughout the West.

Gray Horse Running was a Comanche warrior, who wanted the beautiful prairie of the Texas Plains, to remain a free hunting ground for his beloved tribe. With wolf medicine and his bullhide shield to protect him, he would surely triumph over the equally determined white man.

Gideon Ledbetter was an ex-slave, who, among other freed but disillusioned black men, had joined a black division of the Calvary, when the old plantation was sold.

Soon, he too loved the rolling Texas Plains. To him they were a vast and unspoiled land of opportunity, where he could earn thirteen dollars a month and finally become a man. Fate draws these two brave men together, on the battlefield. Only one could survive, but both remained men--one in life, one in death. "The Wolf and The Buffalo'' is a fascinating look at one of the most colorful, turbulent and heartbreaking chapters in American History, told in such a way, you don't want to separate history from fiction. "The Good Old Boys" by Kelton, will soon be a feature film.

Think back to last summer's heat and imagine what a difference a green canopy of shade would make around your home.

Trees provide more than landscape beauty. They provide climate control. They make important contributions to improving the environment. They add increased value and esteem to our property.

Trees are one of nature's best gifts; and a mighty fine investment for our homes. and communities.

If you've been thinking of adding trees to your landscape, this fall - right now would be an excellent time to do so.

Many folks think of spring as the best time to plant, but fall planting offers distinct advantages. During the winter months the root systems of the fall planted speciments develop and

dry summer without having scorched or burned leaves.

Another characteristic to avoid is a tree that has shallow root. Some trees roots emerge above the soil surface and usually the roots sprout causing young trees to come up in the area. I would also avoid trees that produce messy flowers, cotton, or seed pods.

Another characteristic that many look for is fast growth. Unfortunately, the fast growing trees tend to have weak and brittle branches and shallow roots. Fast growing trees usually have shorter lives than the slower growing trees. Actually, the so called "slow growing" trees will grow rather rapidly if they are properly planted, watered and fertilized.
