Through The Editor's Specs

I am indebted to Mrs. Samuel Butler of Eastland for the copy of a letter which C. U. Connellee, one of the founders of this county, wrote to M. S. (Doc) Sellers, then publisher of the Rising Star Record, in response to Mr. Seller's request for information about early days in Rising Star.

The letter gives what must be an authentic account of how Rising Star got its name. There are, perhaps, some variations on the theme which would fit very well into Mr. Connellee's context of local history. One reasonable version relates that the name "Star" was first submitted for the post office to be established here, a name changed to "Rising Star" when it was explained that a Mills county office had first call on this designation.

That version could very well fit with Mr. Connellee's account as contained in the letter he wrote Doc Sellers. Despite that Doc no doubt used the letter in an issue of the Record 30 or more years ago, we are reprinting it in this issue for the interest it may excite in many readers.

While I am on the subject it should be interesting to note that the community of Okra got its name from a seed catalogue. At least, so I am told. Seems that Levi McCollum, father of Bulis, and some of his fellow citizens were casting about for a name for the new post office, when they were attracted to a seed catalogue that a sister of Mr. McCollum was leafing through. They mulled over a number of names of vegetables until Mr. McCollum was inspired by the name okra. "That's it," he announced. And so Okra became "Okra."

I do not guarantee the version. I blame it on Cecil Shults who tells it for historical fact, and since Cecil knows about everything a man ought to know - and some things he shouldn't - I pass it on with some confidence.

Why is it, I wonder, that many people, normally sensible and courteous in face-toface contacts, become rude and even insulting when driving a car on the highway or answering a telephone? Avoiding its irritations, the experience suggests an interesting study in psychology.

The other day I made a telephone call for information. The telephone at the other end of the line was snatched up and when I asked who was speaking a male voice roared at me in the manner of a drill sergeant addressing a backward platoon: "Wh'd'ya want? Wh' d'ya want? Wh'd'ya want?" Lovely manners, yes, in deedy!

The same sort of egoistic stupidity is often shown by normally mild individuals once they get behind the wheel of a couple or so hundred horses on a highway.

They seem to need some sort of tonic, a charge to their sense of self-importance, and defying the rights of others is their way of achieving the recognition they crave. It seems to me that persons who feel they must make asses of themselves to gain atten tion are in a mighty poor way to get it. The kind of attention they want, at least.

It is generally true that the less a person needs being recognized the more certain he is of getting it. It is a pretty fickle accolade, at the best, as witness how quickly our national heroes become bums once they drop a few (Continued on Page 5)

Interest in Vote Nov.

Texans will vote on four proposed amendments to the State Constitution at a special election to be held on Saturday, Nov. 9.

Of the four, the amendment which would outlaw the poll tax as a qualification for voting in state and local elections is easily the most controversial. The amendment would also authorize the State Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters in lieu of the poll tax.

Adding local interest to the voting is a special county issue to be submitted to the voters on the question of whether or not the county will continue to pay a county trapper.

Raymond Gray will be judge of the Rising Star voting box, to be located at the City Hall. He will be assisted by a panel of clerks consisting of Mrs. Love Shults, Fred Price and Mrs. Lela White. All four were named by the Eastland County Commissioners Court last February.

In addition to the amendment which would repeal the provision making the poll tax a requirement for voting, voters will ballot on the following proposed amendments:

No. 2 - Providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy indi viduals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children: authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of the federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000.00).

No. 3 — The addition of subsection 62 or Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions with in Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

No. 4 - Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to in crease the Veteran's Land Fund by \$150,000,000.00; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the Unitd States between Sept. 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.
