

Water And Drought Problems THE WATER SYSTEM

There are some decisions that will need to be made very soon concerning the City's water system.

Last year we pumped 58,896,000 gallons of water from t the City's Water Wells. We sold 35,900,000 gallons of water to the citizens in town. We also sold about 1 1,000,000 gallons of water under the tower to other people.

We have, then, about 20,000,000 gallons of water which we need to account for.

We know that our regular utility employees (we have three at this time) are spending 60 per cent of their time on "fire calls" such as water and gas leaks, sewer stoppage, etc., and 30 percent of their time is spent in meter sets, sanitation and street repair. The remaining 10 percent is spent on improvement such as installation and extension of water, gas, and sewer lines, landfill improvements etc. Too little time is available

for improvement. As an example, many of our water meter boxes are in grave need of repair or in need of replacement. These wooden meter boxes are not adequate in the sense that they don't last long enough. They cost us more in the long run. Again, an effort to save money is not satisfactory.

Discussed By Mayor but until this is done, we are

asking all citizens to report to the City Hall any person manipulating or tampering with these switches. We have asked our police

department to patrol these wells and to place under arrest any person found with tampering switches or wells.

If dry weather continues, we may have to curtail all lawn and garden watering. Especially this might be necessary when irrigation season begins.

study (Cross Plains, Rising Star, Cross Cut, Pioneer, etc.) to determine the feasibility for the purchase of treated lake water. The study is worthwhile but the purchase of this water may not be practical or economical. We are asking all people who are hauling water from our water tower to do so during our office hours at the City Hall. The valve under this tower will be locked at all other times (including weekends).

Anyone caught taking water from the tower by manipulation of the locked valve will be charged with theft and prosecuted.

Anyone caught manipulating the switches on the City's water wells will also be prosecuted.

Hopefully, we can get some rainfall and alleviate a situation that can get more

Overloaded Vehicles Can Cause Accidents Safety Group Warns

Washington, D.C. -- The **Tire Industry Safety Council** warns vacationing motorists that serious accidents can be caused by an overloaded car or station wagon.

"Too much weight can severely damage tires as well as cause springs and shock absorbers to fail," said Council Chairman Malcolm R. Lovell, Jr. "Excessive loads cause abnormal tire flexing and even for a short period of time can cause hidden damage to the tire. Abnormal heat is generated in the tread shoulder and can start a separation. leading to eventual failure of the tire. "Futhermore, excessive flexing can cause cord breakage in the sidewall area. Even if the load is reduced to normal. the damage can progress and ultimately lead to tire failure. This could result in an accident and personal injury, sometimes long after the damage initially occurred," Lovell said. He also pointed out that overloading makes a vehicle

harder to control, and suggested that drivers read their before starting on a trip.

He said the only sure way to prevent overloading is to weigh the fully loaded vehicle, axle by axle, on reliable platform scales. Federal safety standards require all passenger car tires to have their maximum load capacity at a specified maximum inflation pressure molded on the side wall. 

IT'S TIME TO SPRAY


Now is the time to spray your pecan trees to control the Pecan Nut Casebearer reports DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent. The first of the small worms have hatched and are beginning to enter the nuts. Insecticides are often applied to early for effective control of the worms. By watching the small nuts, a pecan grower can determine the best time to spray his trees. The most ideal time to spray is when one or two percent of the nuts have been penetra-

ted by the worms.

Gordon says since most growers cannot spray their trees on the exact day when one percent of the nuts have been damaged, the best thing to do is spray within the time when most casebearers can be controlled. This time period in Eastland County is May 26 through May 31. Most of the insecticides remain effective for several days, therefore, good control can usually be expected if trees are sprayed during this time period. Effective insecticeds for the commercial pecan growers include Guthion, Malathion, Thiodan, Sevin, or Zolone. Recommended insecticides for yard trees include Sevin, Malathion and Guthion. For control of diseases, such as scab, the grower should also add a fungicide, such as Benlate, Du-Ter, Cyprex or Polyram. Zinc Sulfate should also be added to provide Zinc for the Trees. The recommended amount of Zinc Sulfate is 2 pounds per 100 gal. of water or 2 tablespoons per gallon of water. Before using any of these materials, read the label directions; then follow them carefully, cautions Gordon.

If you would like to have your n name in the history books for having made an enormous contribution to the incomes and welfare of American farmers, I'll tell you what you have to do. It won't be easy. I don't know the answer. But I know the problem you have to answer to pull it off.

.

Your problem is to find a way to convince the farmers. that they should produce only as much food and fiber as they can sell at a profit. For generation, the farmers have grown up with the

belief that they have no control over prices. They do have control over production. So, the idea seems to be that producing all they can, and selling it for whatever they c can get, is the way to

increase their income. Well now, horses eat oats. Some people eat oats for breakfast. And if all the famers in America produced only oats, and all the oats they could, we would be up to our eyeballs in oats and couldn't sell oats for enough to pay for hauling it to the elevator.

We are not up to our eyeballs in corn, wheat, cotton, sugar, and soybeans- only up to our knees. And the farmers are having a hard time selling

these products for enough to make a decent living.

One's memory need not be very long to recall \$3.75 corn, 90 cent cotton, \$1.90 oats, \$9.50 soybeans, 60- cent sugar, and \$5 wheat. How did prices get that high only a few years ago?

The answer is real simple. We were only up to our ankles in the stuff and the world was afraid we would run out. And the bleeding hearts in Washington wrote legislation to encourage massive production, while telling you to eat fewer hamburgers so an African could eat corn mush for

breakfast. Supply management for farm products is not going to accomplished be in Washington. Anyone who thinks so might as well forget it. The laws are written to please voters. And nonfarm voters outnumber the farm votes by 50 to 1.

Washington is going to vote for cheap groceries while they prattle about inflation, \$1- a- loaf bread, and the undernourished of the world. Meantime, the cost of government is the biggest single cost item in the family budget- bigger than food, clothing and shelter all combined.

The farmer is going to have to solve the supply problem. As long as he begins this year's harvest with last year's harvest still in the bin, he is going to have a hard time making a living. And you can get your name

in the history books if you figure out a way to cinvince him of that. Of course you will have to keep him convinced after the first year or two of good prices when he will be tempted to go plant all the land in sight.
