Lundstrom Appeal Denied

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin denied a motion on Wednesday, January 6 for a rehearing for Loyal Lundstrom of Cisco. This, in effect, affirms his conviction in Eastland County, and he will remain in prison.

Emory Walton, Eastland County District Attorney was informed of this decision on Friday, January 8. Walton prosecuted the case, which involved the slaying of Lundstrom's wife, Doris, on March 3, 1983.

Lundstrom fled the county at that time, and remained at large for about 10 days. He contacted authorities and was later tried for the murder.

The two-week trial in the

91st District Court ended on September 6, 1983. A jury found Lundstrom guilty of his wife's death, and he was sentenced to life in prison.

Attorney Bill Hart of Eastland represented Lundstrom in the case, and District Judge Jim Wright presided at the trial.

After his conviction Lundstrom appealed to the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland for a ruling. In 1984 Judges McCloud, Dickenson and Brown affirmed Lundstrom's conviction.

The case was then referred to the Court of Appeals, the highest in the state. In 1986 this Court overturned Lundstrom's conviction, stating that 91st District Judge Jim Wright improperly

denied Lundstrom's change of venue request.

District Attorney Walton then filed a motion with the Court for a rehearing. The Court granted the rehearing in the early part of 1987, with the panel of Judges affirming Lundstrom's conviction.

The Defendant asked for a rehearing on that opinion, but was turned down last Wednesday.

In speaking of this case, Emory Walton said, "We were dealing with a very heinous crime that left five children without a mother. I'm glad the jury gave him (Lundstrom) life in prison."

"I hope this final decision will give people more faith in our state judicial system in Austin."

At the present time he serves as the Tri-County representative for Panasonic and Savin Corporations in the distribution and sales of office equipment.

He will issue a formal statement at a later date, he said.

The class A Texas high school football All-State Team as chosen by the Texas Sports Writers Association was announced this week.

From our area punter David White of Rising Star, RB Adam Popplewell of Santo, and DL Dwight Masters of Santo made first team All-State.

On the second team were DL Taggart Williams of Baird and LB Adam Popplewell of Santo.

Guy Duncan LB of Baird

made the third team. Scooter Morrison OT and Richard Payne TE of Baird, and James Holman DL of Rising Star made Honorable Mention.

Commissioners Discuss Jail, Roads

Eastland County Commissioners discussed a number of items during their meeting Monday, Jan. 11. All Commissioners were present, Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Norman Christian, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and Billy Bacon, Pct. 4. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

One of the first topics mentioned was "How many people are in the jail today?" Comm. Billy Bacon reported that 11 prisoners were currently being held. This was considerably below the 24-25 allowed under the State Jail Standards "guidelines."

Commissioner Owen inquired if the Inter-Com system had been fixed up to standard, and Sheriff Underwood replied that the firm that was supposed to attend to this had not been there lately.

Bacon said the matter had been referred on to James Wheeler, Abilene architect

who had recommended this San Angelo firm. Hopefully these last details would be taken care of before the next jail inspection in February.

Sheriff Underwood handed out copies of a book on the "Identification of Hazardous Materials" to Judge Bailey and the Commissioners. He explained that the Texas Department of Transportation had sent 245 copies of this book, without charge, to the county. They are being distributed to Lawmen, Firemen, and all other officials who are concerned with public safety.

In case of train wrecks, truck collisions or other accidents involving chemicals these books will help decode and identify the material.

On other matters, Comm. Billy Bacon brought up a discussion of a land owner's intrusion with a pipe rack or railing into county road No. 130 in Pct. 4. He also reported that west of Cisco a

certain oil company drives a bulldozer down the middle of a county road for several miles.

Norman Christian said there were similar offenses in Pct. 2. In one case, he said, a bulldozer was on a county road "every day."

"We have a right to prohibit things like that," Judge Bailey said. "The county roads are for people who live on them - for agriculture, school buses, mail routes and so forth. People who use them otherwise must pay for the damage."

The Judge said that state law applied on both accounts, that of the intrusion into a county road, and track and lug type machinery over it. "We've had these discussions before," he remarked.

On the intrusion into the roadway, the Commissioners approved a resolution that the County has a

legal right to control the right-of-way on county roads, and that structures built into such roadways constitute a violation of law.

Everyone is invited to come. Some beautiful music is expected from this fine group of musicians.

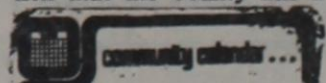

They requested the District Attorney to notify any landowners affected by this problem.

They also passed a resolution confirming and reissuing the Court's former order prohibiting lug-type machinery on roadways. The District Attorney will also contact violators in these cases.

Another agenda item was the drawing of names for people to serve on a Salary Grievance Committee. Those drawn to serve on the Committee were Dorothy Jackson, Carbon, James Alexander, Rising Star, and Fred Hull, Cisco. Alternated were George Simmons, Gorman, Michael Moore, Cisco, and Don Knox, Eastland.

Other items involving claims, bills and accounts occupied the Commissioners. They also set the trial jurisdiction of the county court in two-month terms. It was reported that this court has moved a number of cases since its reactivation last year.

The next meeting of the County Commissioners Court will be on Monday, Jan. 25.

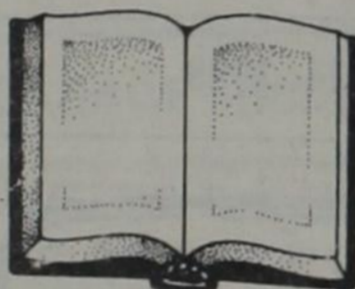

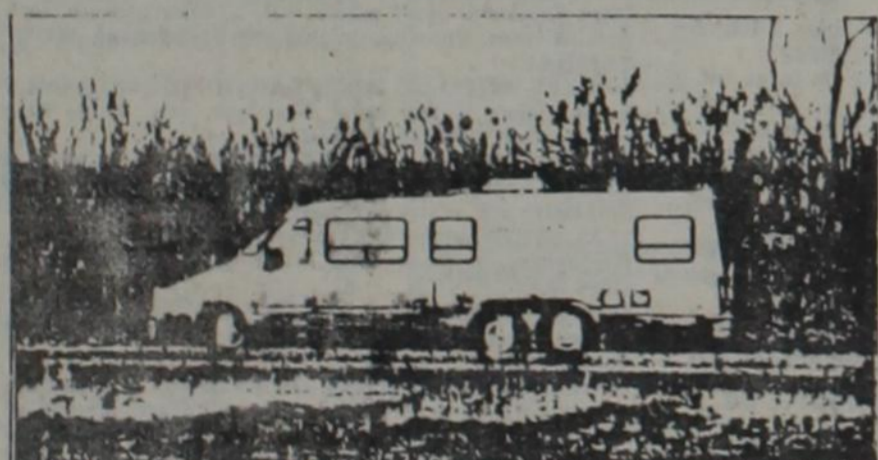

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer that is small, even before it can be felt.

Mobile Unit Will Be Parked Beside Dr. Carpenter's Office

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

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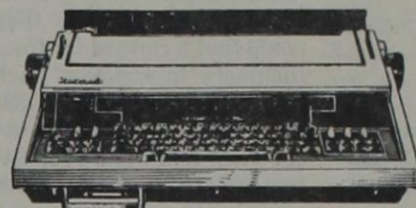

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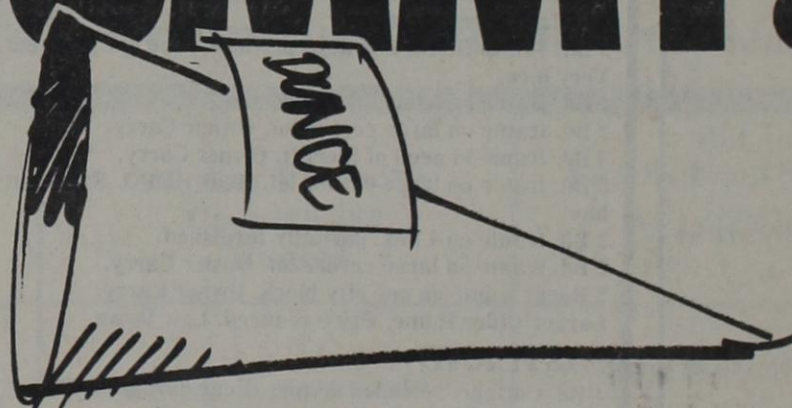

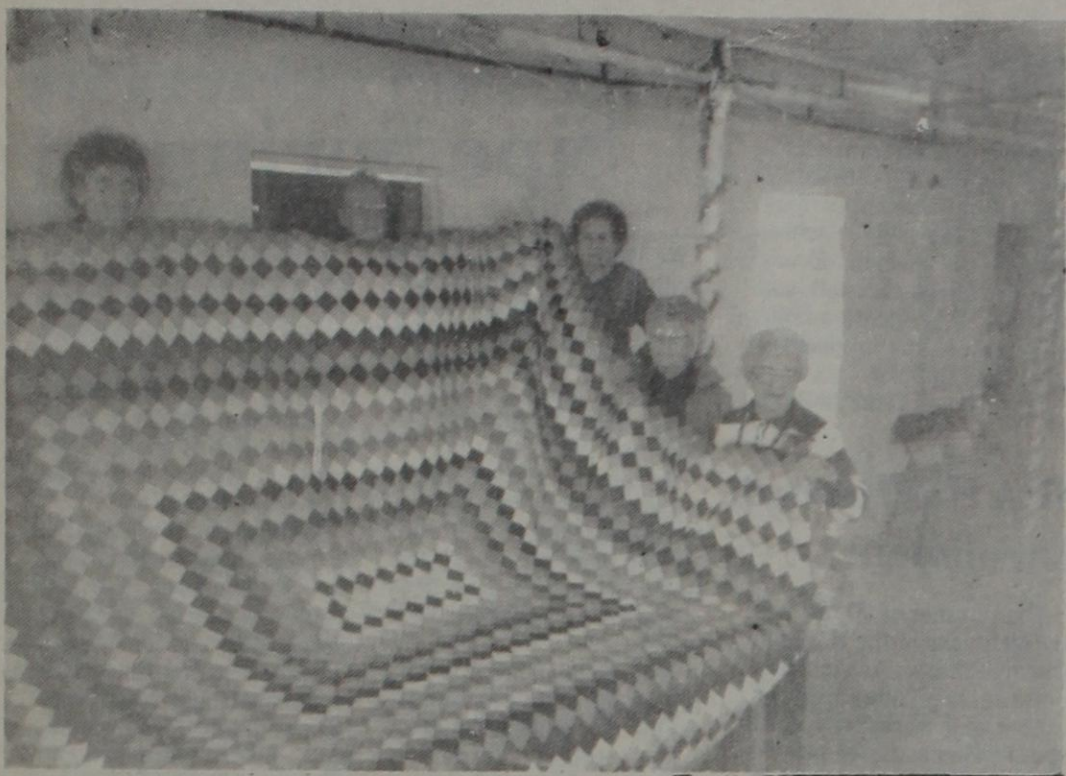

Majestic Theatre To Present "Baby Boom"

"Baby Boom" will probably receive its share of critical barbs for being too predictable and sitcom-like. But let the grouches grumble among themselves, because audiences are going to love it. Diane Keaton, performing everything here from sophisticated comedy to slapstick, hasn't been this appealing in ages. And the story, even in its most predictable moments, is breezy, funny and perfectly in tune with social trends.

Keaton plays J.C. Wiatt, a high-powered New York executive who shares an apartment with Steve (Harold Ramis), a stuffy investment banker. She works 14 hours a day, is on the verge of a promotion and loves her stressful life. But then she inherits a year-old bundle of cuteness named Elizabeth. The baby moves in and Steven moves out.

Her attempts at combining parenting and a demanding career meet with predictable failure. Her boss pulls her off a big assignment, prompting J.C.'s resignation. Having also become fed up with her fellow yuppie

parents and their attempts at creating "designer babies" through pre-pre-school, J.C. moves to a Vermont farmhouse.

But that lifestyle proves to be less than idyllic when the roof caves in, the pipes back up, the well runs dry and she's snowed in for the winter. To while away her time, she cans baby food made from her orchard apples. She sells a few jars, develops new packaging and before you can say "Mrs. Fields' Cookies" she has a booming mail order business.

Meanwhile, she has met the local veterinarian, Jeff Cooper (Sam Shepard, in his Gary Cooper mode). As he points out, they're the only two adults under 60 in this quaint community and soon they fall in love. But then J.C.'s old company comes a'calling, wanting to arrange a takeover of her babyfood company. It's a lucrative deal and the details get J.C.'s juices flowing again. But then she realizes that back in Vermont she finally "has it all", and she turns down their offer.

"Baby Boom" is a fantasy. In the end J.C. gets to turn down lots of money for moral reasons, while still retaining a good business, a cozy country home, Sam Shepard and the cutest darned baby you've ever seen (the last item obtained without the messy problems of childbirth). It's beyond fantasy. It's a fairy tale.

But the movie never pretends to be anything heavier. The satire is gentle and the soapbox is kept in the closet. The Vermont scenery is gorgeous, the photography is flattering to everyone involved and it all adds up to the sort of glossy, highly enjoyable entertainment that hasn't been around much since the early '60s. What it is, actually, is a Doris Day movie for the '80s. We could do a whole lot worse.

It's rated PG for some mild language.

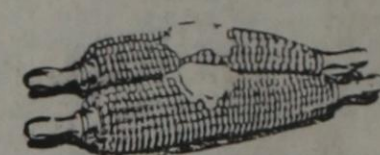

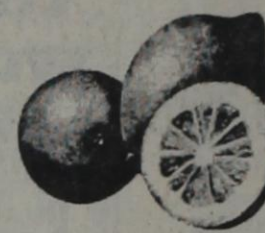
