

Calf Scramble Winner

HOUSTON - When the flag dropped at the Feb. 19 performance of the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 28 students and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre Astrodome arena with excitement.

Brian Bailey from Rising Star won a \$800 calf certificate by catching, haltering and maneuvering one of the elusive calves into the winner's circle. The certificate, sponsored by The Kroger Company, will enable Brian to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

During the next year, Brian will raise the calf under the supervision of his

county extension agent or agriculture science teacher. He will send monthly progress reports to the calf certificate sponsor and to the Show. Also required are accurate monetary records, a journal including photographs and a 500-word essay covering the year's experiences.

The culmination of the year-long project will be when Brian returns to Houston to show the heifer at a special competition during the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

"Those students fortunate enough to receive one of these certificates should seize the opportunity and make the most of it," said John Smallwood, chairman

of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee. "Maximum effort is required—effort that just starts in the Rodeo arena," he added.

The calf scramble awards 302 calf certificates each year. Since the first scramble was held in 1942, more than 11,000 calves have been purchased at a price of more than \$2 million.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, which runs through March 4, is the largest of its kind in the world.

Net proceeds from the Show fund scholarships for more than 1,000 students in Texas colleges and universities, also provides money for research projects.

'Ole Rip' an Item for County Commissioners

During the County Commissioners meeting Monday Judge Scott Bailey announced that on Wednesday, Feb. 28, at 9 a.m. there will be a program in the Courthouse lobby (or outside, weather permitting) to observe the anniversary of Old Rip's removal (alive) from the cornerstone of the 1987 Courthouse.

"Old Rip" was released from the old cornerstone on Feb. 28, 1928, when the construction began on the present courthouse.

"We just want to commemorate an occasion probably in the national news more than anything that ever happened in the county," the Judge remarked.

He mentioned that Boyce House, Eastland newspaper writer, was told by his publisher to "Forget the Bible, newspaper and bottle of whiskey" that was in the cornerstone with Old Rip, and "concentrate on that horned frog."

House, like the symbolic frog, became nationally famous over that incident.

Judge Bailey said that all people who witnessed the original removal of Old Rip from the cornerstone had a special invitation to attend Wednesday's program.

Another event scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 28 drew the Commissioner's attention. Inspection of the County Jail by the State Jail Standards Commission was expected on that day, having been postponed from last Monday.

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that everything was ready - he expected the Jail to pass. He said that 22 prisoners were currently in the fa-

cility, "with six of these for TDC and one on a 'blue warrant' for Dallas." That would make 15 prisoners for the county - well under the limit of 24.

On another agenda item, Commissioner Richard Robinson reported on some details on the replacement of the current elevator with an automatic one. The company doing the work was requesting more information before beginning construction. Some of this information was needed about the old elevator shaft (now closed). Motors and pumps for the new elevator will be placed in the unused shaft.

The topic of county roads came up briefly. Pete Noska of Olden asked Norman Christian, Commissioner of Pct. 2, why he, Noska, couldn't have some gravel for a short road near his home in Olden, and why the road was never graded?

Christian replied that the small road didn't show to be a county road, and didn't appear to need it (gravel and grading) as bad as some other roads. He also said the road was narrow, with grass on either side, and graders would tear the grass up.

Noska answered that the road was very bad after a rain, and he had seen some other dead-end roads that were graded. The discussion ended when Christian said he would haul some gravel to the road, with Noska saying he would see that it was spread.

The session ended with payment of routine bills. The Commissioners said it must have been one of the shortest meetings on record - Court adjourned before 11 a.m.



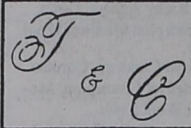
