



This view from the No. 1 green of the Lakewood Country Club at Pioneer shows a portion of the 70-acre site which would be developed into an all-round recreation c nter for the people of this section under a program now in planning by the Lakewood Club. Lake Phil-Pe-Co is to the left and the nine-hole golf course extends northward along its shores. Plans envision an all-family recreation center with swimming pool, picnic faciliti s, golf, tennis, miniature, golf, etc. Preliminary approval has been given by the Farmers Home Administration under the FHA's rural recreation program. A formal loan application will be submitted as soon as planning and cost estimat's can be developed, the committee said.







cleaner. He can dissolve silly putty from a fabric. He used the same method with which he removes nail polish stains...

Preparation stains that have yellowed and set by aging frequently cannot be removed by simple methods such as ruband washing or by using a mild bleach. On washable white or color-fast fabrics these stains can usually be removed with a stronger bleach treatment.

One good method is to sprinkle sodium perborate, or a powdered bleach containing it, directly on the stain, then dip in very hot or boiling water. The stain should be removed in a few minutes. Then rinse well. Do not use this method on wool or silk.

One caution: Do not use a chlorine bleach on your wash and wear garments - this causes them to "yellow."



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
