#### **Evidence Gathered** for Lundstrom Trial

Copies of evidence gathered by or under the direction of the district attorney in the case of the State of Texas vs. Loyal Lundstrom were ordered to e turned over to defense attorneys by April 27th by the 91st District Court in a pretrial hearing Friday.

#### Race-Track Betting Likely On .0008 Poll

Could it be?

Will Texas usher in pari-mutual betting because the "opposition people" in Eastland County and Senate District 22 failed to express their opinion and only 405 in the district were polled?

A break-through for betting came Thursday when the Senate voted 21-10 to debate the bill. A one vote switch would have blocked debate.

Sen. Bob Glasgow, whose 22nd District includes Eastland County, voted for the debate, stating that while he is personally against parimutual betting, the majority of the people in his district favor it, and therefore he is willing for the matter to come to a vote.

Sen. Glasgow said that 62 percent of the people

in his district support the measure.

Contacted by telephone Friday morning by this newspaper, Harold Freeman of Sen. Glasgow's Austin office said that a telephone poll was made recently throughout the district. (Results of the poll and mail to the senator's office prompted the vote.)

A total of 405 persons were sampled and all were asked their opinions on these four items: water, property taxes, betting and DWI, the

senator's office reported.

The betting question was asked in this fashion, Freeman said: "Would you approve or disapprove of changing the law to permit betting on horse racing in Texas?"

The results were tabulated as follows: Rural: 52 percent approved, 41 percent disap-

Urban: 60 percent approved, 32 percent disapproved.

Male: 60 percent for, 33 percent against. Female: 50 percent for, 42 percent against. Republicans: 57 percent for, 38 percent

Democrats: 53 percent for, 39 percent against.

Independent: 59 percent for, 36 percent

A final Senate vote, expected Monday, is needed to send the bill to the House where a similar measure is locked in a committee that has refused to budge.

Sen. John Leedom, Dallas Republican, and Sen. Ed Howard, Democrat from Texarkana, opposed the debate bill, introduced by Sen. O.H. "Ike" Harris, Dallas Republican. Sen. John Traeger, Sequin Democrat, who has supported horse race betting for 21 years, said after the vote, "They're off."

Sen. Bill Sarpalius, D-Hereford, tried to block the bill by raising a point of order that reveunueraising bills have to originate in the House, but Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby overruled his motion.

Hobby explained that revenues received were incidental and the primary purpose of bill is legalized horse race wagering in Texas.

## **Local Oil Company Gives View**

OIL AND WATER DON'T MIX. Everyone has surely heard that statement. Well recently it was brought to our attention once again. Since we are in the oil business, it is required that we submit an application for the Texas Water Resource Department to tell us how much surface casing must be set in order to protect the fresh water zones while drilling for the discovery of oil and/or gas. While it is Not a requirement it is requested on the applicaiton that the applicant submit an electrical log on an adjacent well previously drilled to assist with the determination by the Water Board. We have always tried to submit logs when available, and did on the application referred to in this letter.

Mr. Robert Flores of the TDWR called and thanked us for submitting the log and apologized for the change in requirements as the No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 wells drilled on the same lease only called for 350' casing. The cost is significant in surface casing and requires additional rig time and cementing charges amounting to approximately \$5,475.00 for 350'. Mr. Flores apologized because the log sent showed that there was a fresh water sand located at approximately 410 feet. The added costs would amount to approximately \$1,000.00 since the required amount of casing would now be for 425 feet. We would like to say thanks to Mr. Flores, for doing his job and helping us do ours properly. No apology is necessary when the order is to protect our fresh

water supply in Eastland County, which effects every property owner in the county not just those who have wells drilled for oil and/or gas. Without our fresh water everyone would suffer.

What some may not realize is that while the costs are definately a factor to the oil business, the protection is more than twice fold. Without surface casing, should a well "blow-out" the chances of controlling the well are cut into a very small fraction of what they are when casing is set properly. We in Eastland County are really fortunate since we have had rare occasion where a well was blowing out and out of control. The damages that could arise would be so much greater for the oil operator, as well as the land owner there is really no comparison in cost evaluation.

NO OIL AND WATER DON'T MIX, but in Eastland County, the oil business and the fresh water protection MUST MIX for the benefits offered to us now as well as in the future. A well drilled with surface casing may also be plugged back for fresh water after the oil or gas has been depleted. Is there any farmer that couldn't use another fresh water well?

We would like to see it mandantory to set surface casing in all of Eastland County, the benefits are two-fold, and the rewards are
