In addition to the personal expense and inconvenience to the homeowner and mailers, undeliverable as addressed mail has become one of the hidden costs of mailing. Postmaster Boyett says the Postal Service spends about $\$ 550$ million a year to handle an estimated 4.5 billion pieces of mai that is undeliverable ultimately withinately ends up within the price of postage stamps, and worse, it is un necessary. ## Trash Illegal

Article 4477-9, Ver
non's Texas Civil Statutes, "Dumpin Solid Waste on Proper ty or into Water" is on of several statute which may be used in cases of unauthorized dumping. This statute states that any person who dumps or disposes of trash, junk, gar bage, refuse, unsightly matter or other solid waste on public highways, rights-of ways, on public private property, or inprivate property, or in water of Texas without the owner, his agent owner, his agent charge, shall be guilty charge, shall be guily of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than $\$ 1.00$ nor more tha $\$ 200.00$. Every law enforcement officer of this State and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the prov
statute.

## statute.

Paragraph A-2.5 of the enclosed Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations covers Article 6674v-2, VTCS, "Dumping of Refuse Near
Highway," which may Highway," which may also be used. This statute states that no municipal corporation, private corporation, firm or person shall dump, deposit or leave any refuse, gargage, rubbish or junk on or within 300 yards of any highway in the State.

As indicated in paragraph $\mathrm{H}-1.1$, it is the policy of the Department to encourage local enforcement where effective, however, the Department will initiate enforcement action when local efforts have not caused compliance
within a reasonable

Due to the recent
rains experienced in
our area, disease
pressure or the
likelihood of disease
occurence has increas-
ed greatly. Most of the
disease encountered in
the garden are caused
by Fungi. Fungi which
attack plants utilize
living or dying tissue
for their nutrient re-
quirements.
Plants in the
Cucumber family
(Cucumbers, Squash
and Melons) are
susceptible to a variety
of Fungal Diseases.
One of the more
predominant diseases
of this group is Downy
Mildew caused by
Pseudoperonospora
Cubensis. This disease
is characterized by
angular yellow spots
appearing on the upper side of the leaf. Durin periods of high moisture, the under side of the leaves, opposite of the yellow spots, becomes covered by a grayish white mold.
This mold is actually the fruiting structures and spores of the Fungus. The spores are the reproductive structures or "seeds" of the Fungus. The spores are more noticeable early in the morning, especially if a heavy dew is present. Spores are easily detached and carried by the wind from diseased to healthy plants.
Cool temperatures along with available moisutre are ideal for infection and disease development. Hot and dry weather will reduce or stop the disease development. Fungicide applications of Maneb should be applied before diseas symptoms appear. Another disease of Squash which occures during prolonged damp weather is WetRot. This disease is caused
Choanephora Cucurbitarum. The Fungus is usually confined to the Blossom end of the Fruit. The Blossom ends of Squash Fruits turn black, water soak ed, and covered by a Fungal growth that resembles numerous black-headed pins. Under favorable conditions the Fungus may destroy the entire
fruit. Diseased Fruits should be removed and Benlate Fungicide applied.
Always follow label instructions for rates and time between application and Harvest. For additional infor mation regarding this and other pests, contact the County Exten sion Office.
