## Burglary Operation Busted New Years Eve

A sizeable collection of stolen property was recovered by law enforcement officers from a residence in Rising Star on New Year's Eve, according to Sheriff Don Underwood of Eastland.

Officers of the Rising Star Police Department, the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and Constable Gene Hicks of Rising Star worked together Thursday to acquire information and evidence, and to seize the property.

"Eight to ten area burglaries should be solved as a result of Thursday's efforts," says Sheriff Underwood. "Some of the property matches the description of items taken in burglaries in the Eastland and Ranger areas."

Much of the seized property is believed to have been taken from rural houses and farms in the area. Officers continued to recover property and add it to an inventory that included refrigerators, wood burning stoves, a sewing

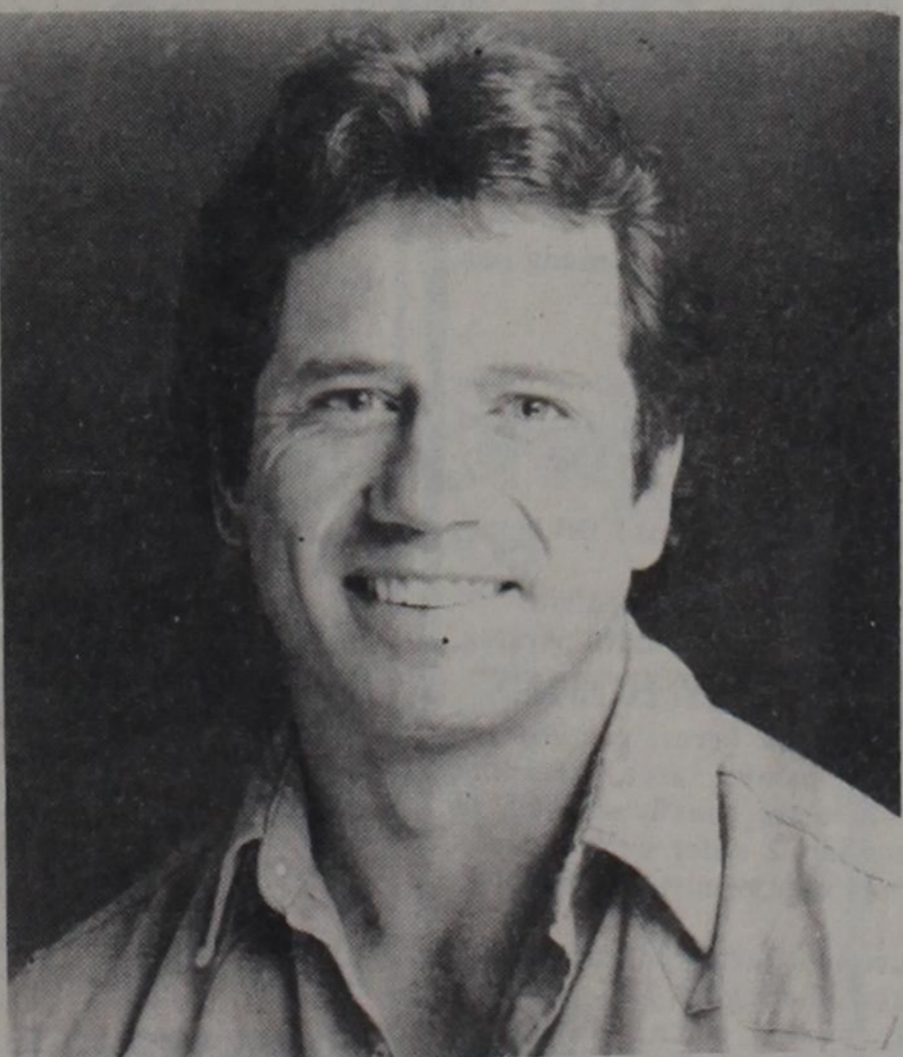

## American Farm Bureau To Meet In New Orleans Jan. 10-14

WACO-The Texas Farm Bureau, "the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation with 334,162 member families, will send 23 voting delegates to the 69th annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Jan. 10-14 in New Orleans.

They, along with voting delegates from 48 other states and Puerto Rico, will adopt national policy for the 3.6 million member families within Farm Bureau for 1988.

Major issues that will be considered by delegates include farm program amendments, international trade, government monetary policies, environmental regulations, farm labor, and immigration reform regulations.

The 69th annual meeting will feature addresses by AFBF President DEan Kleckner, Radio/TV Personality Art Linkletter, White House Chief of Staff Howard Baker and Ian McLachlan, president of the National Farmers Federation of Australia.

The Texas voting delegates are comprised of the TFB Board of Directors and nine leaders elected in district caucuses at the recent state convention in Lubbock.

The TFB contingent includes TFB President S.M. True, Plainview; TFB Vice

President John Baker, Temple; and TFB Secretary-Treasurer Neal Burnett, Plainview.

Other voting delegates will include state directors Aubrey Rosor, Gruver; C.H. Dowdy, Wichita Falls; Royce Magness, Telephone; and Don Smith, Sulphur Springs.

Other directors among the voting delegates are Jesse Stephens, Lamesa; Robert R. "Bob" Turner, Voss; Russ Arnold, Trinity; John Earl Smith, Quemado; Bob Stallman, Columbus; Gerald Clark, Edna; and Steven Bearden, Harlingen.

## RSISD Board Meeting

The Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees met December 14 at 7 p.m. in the board room with President Larry Wilson, Vice President Doug Owen, Tony Long, Ronnie Green, Bud Vicars and Dr. Charles Barnes present. David Harris was absent.

School personnel present were Dr. Don Bryan and Weldon Hill; also present was Danetta Bible.

The minutes of the November 9 meeting were read and approved. Tentative district goals were presented by the superintendent.

The board requested a firm bid on property insurance from Texas School Services Foundation for not later than January 15.

No action was taken after discussion on the copy machine.

Board members will attend a Board Training Session on Standards II and III in De Leon in January.

On a motion by Vicars, seconded by Long, the Gifted and Talented Program was adopted as presented by the administration, 6-0. The board made this statement: "We as the undersigned, have read and do accept as this district's policy the long range plan developed through E.S.C. Region 14 Cooperative participation. This plan should function as

this district's policy for governing procedures pertaining to implementation of Gifted education."

The board voted 6-0 on a motion by Owen, seconded by Long, to accept a bid from Smith, Verett and Prker, P.C. to audit all accounts of the Rising Star I.S.D. for the year ending August 31, 1988, not to exceed \$2,750. A higher bid in the amount of \$3,500 was submitted by Davis, Kinard and Co.

Concerning the asbestos inspection and response plan, the administration submitted a proposal and estimate of cost on laboratory and site survey team from American Analytical, Inc. Dr. Barnes volunteered to investigate the process through the EPA prior to any action taken by the board.

A Christmas party will be held December 22 for board members, staff and spouses. A comparison of revenue to budget and a statement of cash in bank was presented by Superintendent Bryan. No action was taken.

Principal Hill presented the monthly lunchroom report. TEAMS test results from the 85-86, 86-87 and 87-88 school years were presented by Superintendent Bryan. Baseline data from this text is used to set instructional goals. No action was taken.

One fact should be obvious and that is that children do not have maturity, experience nor education enough to run the world or even their own lives while still in school. Pushing them into adult situations and constant presentation of subjects above their age levels have produced miseries and ruin beyond measure and most often beyond recovery. Those who pushed things to this point still argue that we need more of the same, yet, they have no sensible explanation for the state of things. Simply accepting it all as "signs of the times" is a sick cop-out. F.D.R. said, "Nothing just happens. You can bet that at least in politics they were MADE to happen." Now, what needs undone?

# Escape and Evasion - Real Life Experience

by Gaston Alford

This is a narrative of the mission of the 91st Bomb Group on 4 February 1944 against a target in Germany flown by David Gaston Alford as the wing leader and his subsequent experiences in Holland and Belgium in trying to get back to home base. Alford is a native of Rising Star.

4 Feb 44 - 11 Sep 44  
Frankfurt, Germany

## PART 1

The mission was to bomb railroad yards at Frankfurt. I was the Operations Officer of the 91st Bomb Group, Basingbourne, a member of the 1st Wing of the 1st Division, 8th Air Force. The 91st Bomb Group was to lead the wing on this mission and I was to be the Wing Leader, along with the Group Navigator Capt. Dave Williams.

We had some B-17 airplanes in the theater equipped with the H2X Bomb Device, which we commonly called the Pathfinder. These planes were all assigned to the 482d Bomb Group, and when we were to be the Wing Lead, they would send one airplane over to us. With our leader and navigator, the rest of the crew belonged to the 482d.

Lt. Bock, now living in Houston, was the pilot of the Pathfinder airplane that day. After Capt. Williams

and I got aboard, we proceeded on our way with no unusual occurrences until we got over enemy territory. We began to experience some fighter opposition and quite a bit of flak, which was normal.

Our route was north of the Ruhr Valley and on down into Frankfurt. Over the target we received considerable more flak and a little more fighter opposition. At the target area we could see visually and proceeded to drop our bombs. (Four or five airplanes did not release for reasons unknown to me, perhaps some malfunction in the bomb devices). We went over the target, turned around and started back toward England, a course to the northwest.

We'd had problems with the radar equipment all the way across, trying to navigate over an undercast. At the time we dropped our bombs, it almost went out completely. However we proceeded toward England, picked a target of opportunity and dropped the rest of the bombs, then continued on course.

We encountered a very strong northwest wind which blew us off course and we were unaware of this since our equipment just could not pick up definite checkpoints. We continued to get hit very strong when we got over the Ruhr Valley in the area of Cologne and finally our airplane got shot up so bad we had to leave the formation.

We were hit pretty badly and had fire in the nose and

in the right wing. We put the wheels down and entered the clouds around 25,000 feet. About this time the pilot was hit and went into a state of shock, it seemed, and shortly thereafter he passed out completely. I thought perhaps he might be dead, but after we got down a ways he came to. We determined that his oxygen line had been severed with some flak that come through into the cockpit. At that point he seemed very rational.

Incidentally, flying in that same formation that day was my cousin, Frank Alford, who had come to the theater about a year and a half after I did. I knew some people he was assigned to in another group and managed to get him assigned to my group, the 91st. This was the second mission he had flown with us and he was flying just above me.

On the first mission Frank flew, the crew and airplane got shot up pretty badly and they landed barely on the English coast way down from us. I was thinking that I would need to write my uncle and aunt and tell them what happened as far as I knew but the crew got back and everything went fine. When I went down, there was Frank, sitting up there above me in high flight, and it's going to be his job to write MY parents and tell them what had happened. Fortunately, Frank finished his missions and came home safely.

About this time it was quite evident that we needed to bail out and I so ordered the crew, which they did, not knowing where we were but figuring we were still over Germany some place because we hadn't been very far from target when all this anti-aircraft fire hit us. Dave Williams helped me get the pilot out. Dave was the last

one to jump. He asked me if I was going, and I said, "Of course, as soon as you get out!" Dave jumped and then I left the co-pilot's seat where I'd been all the time and started back to bail out through the bomb bay.

About halfway back I looked around and my parachute was strewn out between the seats and in the aisle. There was no way in the world I could bail out with that kind of a situation. I crawled back into the pilot's seat, sat down in the pool of blood left by Lt. Bock and decided I had to fly the airplane down.

To say that I flew the airplane down is not quite right. It glided down because two engines were out and I never did put the power on to the other two engines. (I had known then what I discovered later, I probably could have flown that airplane back to England with two engines, provided I didn't get shot down by a bunch of fighters someplace. The fire in the wing, which looked about the size of a number two washtub, apparently was a severed fuel line. The fuel had been set afire by the supercharger and it was really burning more fuel than it was airplane. After I landed the airplane, the fire finally burned itself out when the fuel was exhausted and the airplane did not explode as I

had expected.)

Many of us had seen this situation in other airplanes that exploded in the air and I figured the quickest way to salvation was to get that thing on the ground as early as possible. I went down through the clouds and broke out somewhere between 500 and 1000 feet. I was mostly over woods and I saw some houses and a few villages. My windshield had iced over completely in the front but the windows on either side were clear. Spotting an open field out the right window, I made a right turn and bounced the airplane into the field which turned out to be a dairy farm.

I finally came to rest without turning it over or anything else, a great bit of luck. When the plane stopped I jumped from the window (the pilot's window) down to the ground and ran from the airplane thinking it would explode any moment. Enroute, I threw away my helmet and goggles into a little pond because I immediately knew they would be telltale evidence of who I was. Surely the Germans would be looking for this airplane very shortly because smoke was beginning to go pretty high up into the air.

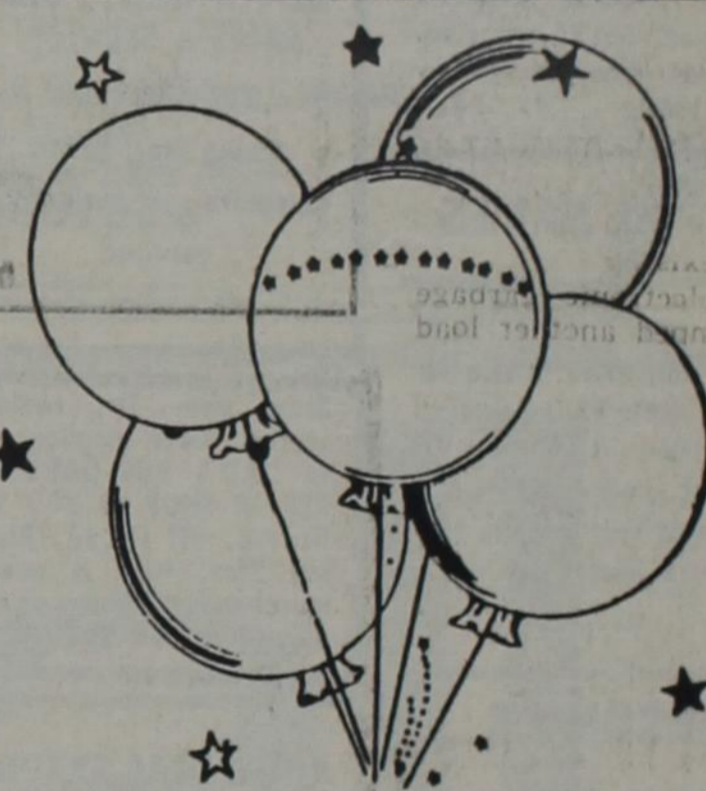

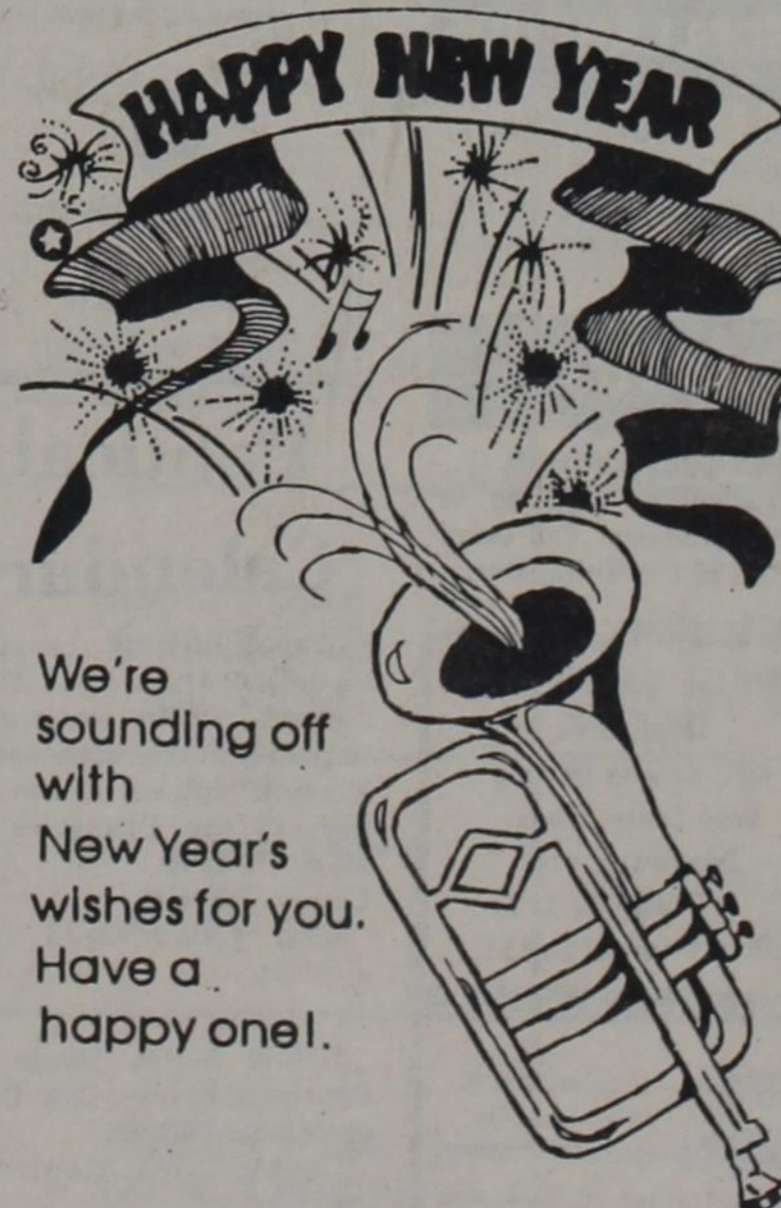

## TEENAGE PREGNANCY IN TEXAS

The rate of births to Texas teens is higher than the national average and is taxing social, economic and medical resources, according to the September issue of Texas Medicine.

The study of Texas teens aged 15 to 19 from 1980 to 1984 shows that while Texas is above the national average in births to teens, the actual number of births has decreased over the past 15 years. The state's national rating may be due to its population mix and the increasing proportion of female teens with Spanish surnames, write authors Peggy B. Smith and Laurilyn McGill, Baylor College of Medicine, Houston. In the period studied, births to white teens with Spanish surnames aged 15 to 19 increased 1.6%. While the Spanish surname group is composed of persons with different nationalities and cultural heritages, 96% of all Texas births to women with Spanish surnames are of Mexican origin. In addition to the increase in the Hispanic teen population; half of all Hispanic women migrating to the US through Texas are 18 years old or younger, which is a period of high fertility.

The study also shows that births to black teens decreased 9.4% and births to white teens with non-Spanish surnames decreased 11.4%. In 1984, 46,987 babies were born to Texas teenagers. Black teens have the highest birthrate of the three groups studied.

According to the official journal of the Texas Medical Association, this migration eventually will affect the national population mix and the types of services that are needed. "These trends, if they continue, suggest that public maternity services, not only in Texas, but across the country, will be dominated by cohorts of young fertile Hispanic women," writes Smith, associate professor, and McGill, research assistant, Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

The authors suggest that the role of the family and degree to which they have become integrated into American culture should be considered by health care workers when providing services.

## A Successful Life Is So Simple

I am sure that it has never been proven but it is my honest belief that, if you could take a huge room; fill it almost to capacity with people from the general public; place a living teacher at one end; a podium in the center; and a wet bar at the other end, after much visiting back and forth, you would soon have three distinct groups settled into their most comfortable environment.

He would see my problem and sit down in the seat in front of me, turn around, and whisper a little near naughty joke or a word of wisdom to wake me up a bit. Then one day he told me something that really opened my eyes and started me thinking. He said that, to be a success in this world, the only thing necessary would be to mingle with and favorably impress three different groups of people—the educated people, the religious people and the drinking people. This so impressed me that I was ready to start working on a way to accomplish this goal.

To this day when I see or hear the word "education" I think of my old-maid English teacher. I feel sure that the only reason Miss Petsick never married was because she was so in love with Shakespeare. I knew just where to start to gain favor with this educated person and I immediately started going through the works of Shakespeare to find favorite "quotes," and to commit them to memory.

Each day I would go into English class and at every opportunity I would recite a quote from the works of Shakespeare. This never failed to bring a smile and a glow from my dear, dear teacher's face. She would pat me on the tip of the head, and I knew she must be rearranging my "halo." I knew at this time that I had the educated people in my "hip pocket."

These quotes come from many works of Shakespeare but the one that sticks in my mind came from McBeth. If any teacher reads these lines; think what they might mean, and please have compassion and a word of encouragement for the poor little fellow who did not quite complete his homework. After all, his life only represents a split second in the infinity of time.

"Tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow creep into this petty pace of time, from day to day to the last syllable or recorded time, and all our yesterdays have lighted fools the way to dusty death."

Next came the religious people to deal with and I did not even have to stop and think about where this information should come from. It could only come from God's own word. I took my Bible and started reading and studying and reading. This took a considerable amount of time, but I discovered that in the process I was gaining valuable information that would help me through this life.

In the middle of this Bible study, a light suddenly came on in my mind, and I realized that Coach Newton was not only a great coach but an even better psychologist. He would pass by my desk in the study hall; see me hard at work; smile; walk on past; and leave me to my study.

After much hard work, I discovered the very thing that I had been searching for and it has been a source of comfort to me all my life. If religious people read these verses, they will realize that

this is the very "bottom line" and the ultimate goal that we have been working for all these years.

Revelations 21:1-4  
 And I saw a new heaven and new earth: the first heaven and the first earth were passed away; and there was no more sea.  
 And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.  
 And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God.

And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: For the former things are passed away.

When I started on the task of mingling with the drinking crowd, this created quite a problem. I was forced to "sneak" into some very unlikely places. But this I did. I started listening to and talking to some of the patrons and I discovered that they are not a group or a type. They are individuals. They all have different needs, desires and problems. They all need great compassion, understanding and help from those of us who are able and willing to give it.

Now in those days a drink was always preceded by an appropriate toast. After much listening and discarding some for obvious reasons, I found the one I had been seeking. So, I now share the perfect toast to you "drinking hands."

"It was a hot day in October and I was feeling far from sober, and I was carrying home my load with manly pride, when my feet began to stutter, and I lay down in a gutter, and a hog came up and lay down by my side. A lady passing by was heard to say, "You can tell a man who boozes by the company that he chooses." And the pig got up and slowly walked away!"

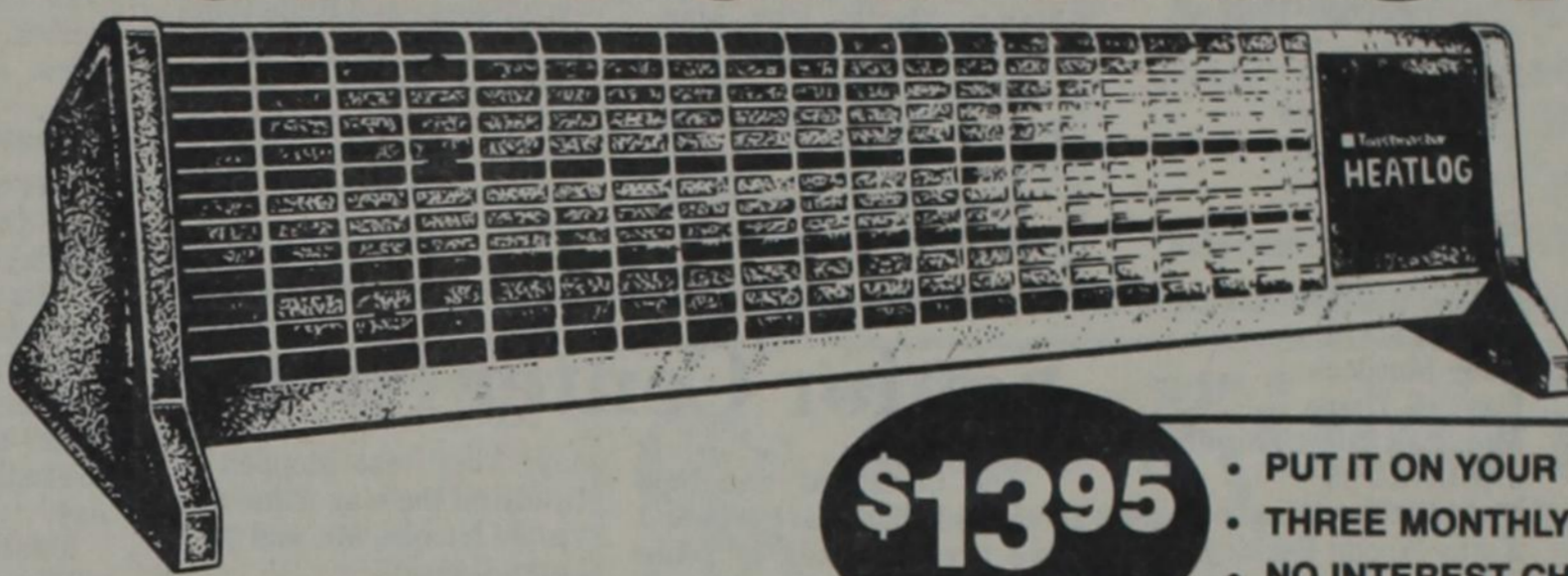

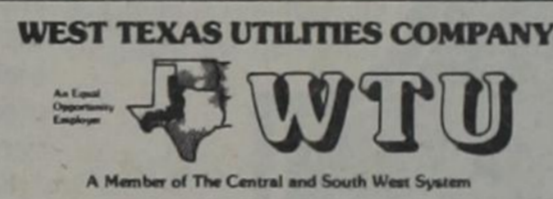

# Majestic Presents

## 'The Untouchables'

"The Untouchables" is a robust and meticulously crafted crime drama that excels on all levels. It re-introduces us to crime-stopper Eliot Ness of Prohibition era Chicago, although it is a different Eliot Ness than the one portrayed by Robert Stack in the legendary TV series. This Ness, as played by Kevin Costner, is a wet-behind-the-ears and almost stridently naive Treasury agent who is brought into town to enforce Prohibition laws and (more importantly) to bring down Al Capone (Robert DeNiro). Working within a corrupt police department to uphold a law which, in retrospect, was sadly futile, Ness accepts the job with full fury not necessarily because he agrees with the law, but because it is the law.

Unable to trust the cops on his own force, Ness sets out to assemble a team of outsiders who will form "The Untouchables", the group of lawmen who will remain untouched by corruption and criminal influence. His most important find is Jimmy Malone (Sean Connery), a wise beat cop who agrees to work alongside Ness to provide him with the street savvy that he so desperately needs. Rounding out the team is Oscar Wallace (Charles Martin Smith), the nerdy accountant who came up with the ingenious idea of pursuing Capone for tax evasion, and George Stone (Andy Garcia), a rookie sharp shooter.

Ness and his small band immediately go head-to-head with Capone, first by going to the Canadian border to bust up a major liquor transaction and then on Capone's own Chicago turf. But the toll is high. First Wallace is killed while trying to guard the bookkeeper who

is supposed to finger Capone, and then Malone is slaughtered by machine gun fire after he stands up to a hoodlum police chief. With each death, Ness becomes more obsessed with capturing Capone.

Although "The Untouchables" does cheat on the facts, you can be sure that the major story elements are left alone. Therefore, there is no final, theatrical shootout between Ness and Capone. When the gangster finally gets his due, it's in a court room, where a judge unexpectedly disallows a tainted jury and sends Capone up the river for tax evasion. Ness gets his revenge, but it's such a remarkably passive one in light of the violence that has gone before it. But it is no less satisfying.

After making so many vile and contemptuous films, who would have thought that Brian DePalma had a movie this great in him? All of the things that he has been accused of before - the violence, the "aren't-I-clever?" camera work, the outright thievery from other films - are all here, but they all mesh together with the story beautifully this time and the film is buoyed by humor, which is one thing that DePalma always seemed to have absolutely no grasp of. One can only assume that the script by playwright David Mamet was simply too good for even DePalma to foul up. Whatever the reason, it is masterful filmmaking.

The film is rated R for violence.

## Rural Hero Search

The search is under way for the rural hero for 1987, according to Ben Bullard of Waco, president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council which presents the annual rural heroism award.

The 1987 recipient will be announced March 7, 1988, at the 49th annual Texas/Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition to be held at the Marriott Hotel in San Antonio. Deadline for

submitting 1987 entries will be Feb. 15, 1988, Bullard said. Send all nominations to Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, Box 2689, Waco, Texas 76702-2689.

To qualify for the honor, a candidate must have performed a heroic act of human-lifesaving within Texas during 1987. Preferably, it should be related to farming and ranching, Bullard noted.

The 1987 winner, Arzo Burnim, junior high coach at Teague, rescued Russell Keaton, 13, also of Teague, from a rain-swollen storm drain at the edge of this small Central Texas town. Mr. Burnim received his award at Houston on March 24, 1987. The 1985 and 1984 winners also received the prestigious Carnegie Medal.

Nominations should include a written account of the incident and the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved. Newspaper clippings and photos should also accompany when available, Bullard said. Bullard is associate director for safety and health for the Texas Farm Bureau.

## Social Security

Ownership of the home in which you live does not exclude a person or couple from getting supplemental security income (SSI) payments, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

"It is true that SSI is a means-tested program," Hammons said. "That means that eligibility for SSI is limited to people with little or no income or resources; however, it does not mean that people have to be penniless before they can apply for SSI payments."

"In figuring the value of an SSI applicant's resources, in most cases, a car or truck does not count. Neither does any money up to \$1,500 that is kept separately for burial and life insurance, nor furniture and other belongings worth up to \$2,000."

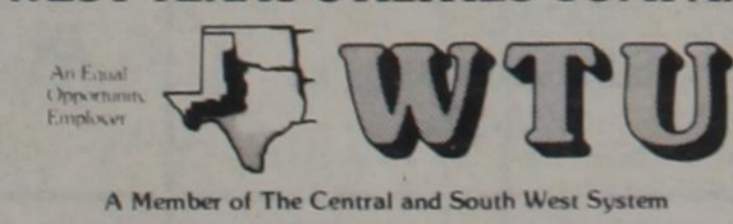

## Lake Cisco Is Stocked

Workers with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked Lake Cisco with five different species of brooder fish on New Year's Eve in connection with a new program that will help to identify the fish. In years past, fish that completed their work as brooders on state hatcheries were quietly put out to pasture in public lakes. While this probably suited the fish just fine, it did little for fishery management since the brooders could not be identified later. Now the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Hatcheries Branch has launched a new program that will encourage the "catch and release" concept while giving anglers complete information about the fish's past. Under the "Veteran Broodfish" program, brooders of five species will be tagged when released back into the wild. The internal tags will have an external streamer inscribed with "veteran brooder," a broodfish number and the department's toll-free number, 1-800-792-1112. Anglers catching the fish are encouraged to write down the broodfish number and release the fish. Then by calling the toll-free number the angler will receive a history of the fish's production record and a copy of its "honorable discharge." Bill Rutledge, hatcheries chief, said the program will focus attention on the catch and release concept, and also call attention to the contribution the hatcheries make to fishery management in the state. "The department is implementing several programs that promote catch and release because we feel as fishing pressure increases it will be necessary to use larger fish more than one time."

Rutledge said. "Besides, the department has a considerable investment in these fish because genetic selection and hatchery maintenance are costly." He added that the veteran brooders may be more susceptible to being caught after spending all their lives on a hatchery. "We would like to protect as many of them as possible to give them ample opportunities to spawn," said Rutledge. Along with Lake Cisco the first 1,000 Veteran Broodfish (largemouth and smallmouth bass, channel and blue catfish and red drum) were released at the following locations: Lakes Coleman, Ray Roberts, Fork, Meredith, Medina (lake and river), Possum Kingdom, Greenbelt, Twin Buttes, Town (Austin), Ascarate, Casa Blanca, Livingston, Brownwood, Red Bluff, Spence, Waco, White Rock, H-4, H-5 and Dunlap. Several red drum broodfish will be released in Galveston, Matagorda, Corpus Christi and Laguna Madre bays. Brooders also will be released into small lakes at the following state parks: Purts Creek (not yet open for visitation), Choke Canyon, Lady Bird Johnson, Tyler, Rusk, Bastrop, Buescher, Huntsville, Blanco, Arrowhead, Mineral Wells, Balmorhea, Caddo, Palmetto and the J.D. Murphree Wildlife Management Area at Port Arthur.
