Recently I had the privilege of listening to a so-called news analyst working in the area of the United Nations. The burden of his sketchy, poorly substantiated thesis was:

"We have been led into an unwanted war in Vietnam in pursuit of a "secret" foreign policy promoted by a large aircraft corporation. We ought to get out of Vietnam and turn our attention to a 'pollcy' of eradicating poverty south of the equator if we want to escape 15 or 20 other Vietnams."



Now there are a lot of people-patriotic people, too who sincerely believe that we ought to pull out of Vietnam and turn what's left of it over to the communists. And they may be right.

But I don't buy that pitch about a "secret" foreign policy devised under the sponsorship of an aircraft manusturing concern foisted. undebated, upon the American people, and treacherously administered by our govment leadership. As much as I may disagree with President Johnson in some of his programs, I certainly do not accuse him of stupidity or traitorous double-dealing. I do not think the American public so naive, or our system of government so susceptible and impotent.

The lecturer did not say what the "secret" policy was, other than to link it with Vietnam, which certainly is not secret, and the alternative was no policy of any sort; it was merely an objective, with which most of us agree.

But if the American people have not been informed, and have not debaled the foreign policies of our government leadership, then tell me what it is that we have been hearing so long and constantly over TV and radio and reading in our newspapers and magazines? None of the networks have turned Senator Fulbright or Martin Luther King or Senator McCarthy off the air; we get a broad spectrum of editorial comment on every conceivable aspot of scenes national and international in every 'day's press. The very fact that this lecturer stands before Amercan audiences who pay their cash to hear his uninhibited piece, was a refutation per se of his thesis.

His performance was "part and parcel" of what the editor of the Gulf Coast Lumberman vigorously condemns in an editorial in the February issue.

While I listened I was thinking of Japan, of Nationalist China, of Singapore, of Indonesia, of the Philippines, and Australia and all the crowding millions of people just now awakening to visions of freedom in that vast Pacific frontier that is our first western line of defense

against the encroaching communist blight, frankly dedicated to our destruction. The Marxists have no 'secret' policy; they have told us in plain language just what they intend to do and they are get-

ting on with the business of doing it. And our indecision and wishful thinking plays a basic role in their program. I recalled the picture of a bareheaded British prime minister jubilantly waving a piece of paper which, in effect, gave Adolf Hitler Czechoslovakia in return for "peace in our

It was flattering to a young man's ego to be offered them, but from this distance I sometimes suspect that Brother Kittrell found more pleasure in his sympathey than in his sharing.



He was well qualified in the remembrance of things past, particularly as regards Texas Revolutionary and pionneer history, for he was about as Texan as it was possible to be. His family were charter citizens, and his father served for many years as the personal physician and fatherconfessor of Gen. Sam Houston-if the doughty old hero of San Jacinto needed confession.

But Brother Kittrell had no regrets for the "old days"; his look was forward. There was absolutely no nostalgia in his recollections of frontier life where a barrel of wormy flour cost a month's pay and biscuits on Sunday were luxury enough to make the to'l of the week a service of anticipation.



Need to renew your driver's license?

Well, here is a list of the places where you can do so, a list furnished The Rising Star by Captain Hart of the Driver's License Division of the State Highway Patrol. Captain Hart, a native of Eastland County and brother John Hart, is in regional command of Driver's License stations over an area of the state extending from Calla-

han County to El PPaso and Del Rio to Lamesa. As most drivers know ,there

have been significant changes in driver's license cards and the procedure of issuing the license. The new card carries a picture of the licensee in color and its term will expire on the birthday of the holder. Normal term if for four years at the old price of \$1.50 per year.

.During the change, over to the new license, however, only those whose license numbers end on even numbers, such as two, four six, etc., will be issued four lear licenses. Those with numbers that end with an odd digit will receive two-year cards. Afterward, all licenses will be renewed for four years. If you hold an old license, it is not necessary, Capt. Hart said, for you to wait for a notice of renewal before applying for a new one. You may go at once to any of the renewal stations where a new license will be issued-provided, of course, that you are entitled to one. At many of the stations a woman will be on duty at all regular hours to issue the license if no examination is required. If an exan.Juation is required it will be made by an officer at the stated times. in easy distance of Rising Star
