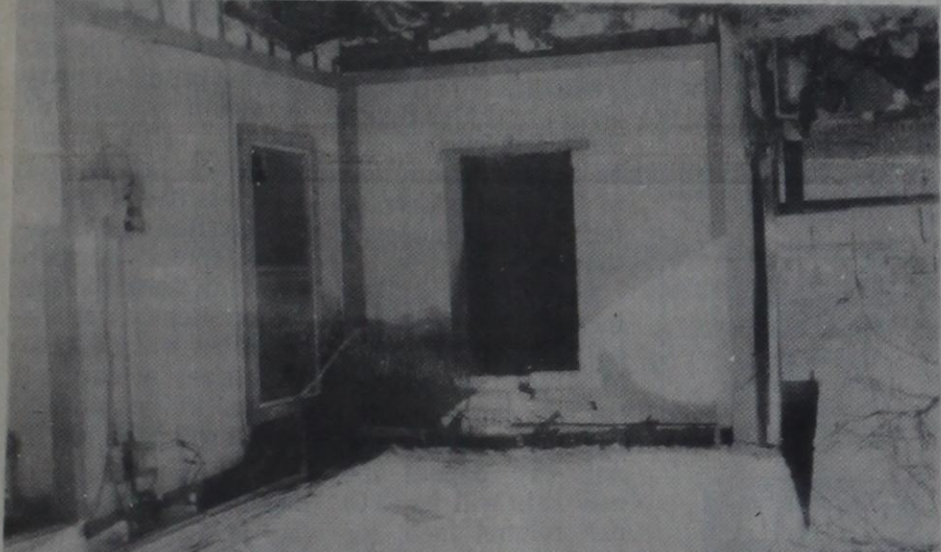

Fire Results in Extensive Damage to McGinn Home

Fire broke out in the home of Ricky McGinn after he had left for work Tuesday morning, December 21. The fire in the house, located in the 100 block of West Pioneer Street, was discovered by Ozzie Burns who could see the flames through a window.

Noticing a water hose in the yard, Burns hooked it to the outside water faucet but found it too short to reach the window. He managed

to spray water into the house and thought he had the fire contained, but then it broke out in another area which he could not reach with the water. Burns then roused neighboring residents who alerted the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department.

The fire department received the call at 7:50 a.m. and worked for an hour and a half to extinguish the flames.

Bill Webb, Cisco Fire Marshal, investigated the origin of the fire and found electrical wiring on a bedroom wall which showed definite signs of having shorted and burned in two.

The house and contents sustained extensive damage. The house is owned by Vyron Funderburk, Jr., whose local agent is his sister, Rita Wilson. McGinn is employed as a carpenter by Jesse Bilbrey.

further, they found the mattress, box springs, bed spread and curtains afire. The burning bedding was carried outside where it burned completely, Eva said.

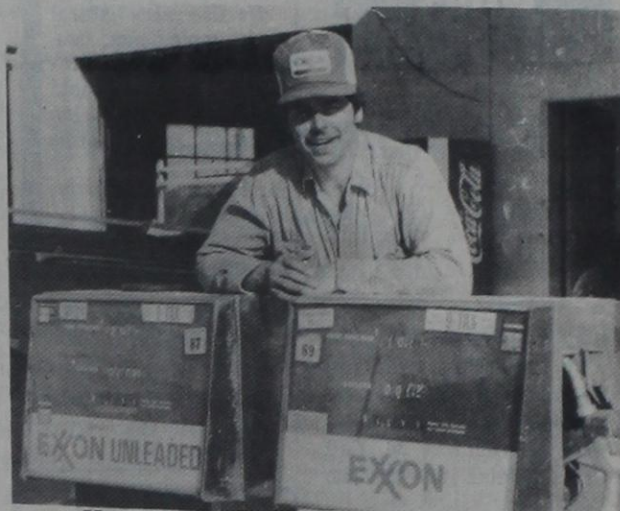
The May Fire Dept., led by Charlie Taylor, arrived and wet down the smoldering areas of the carpet.

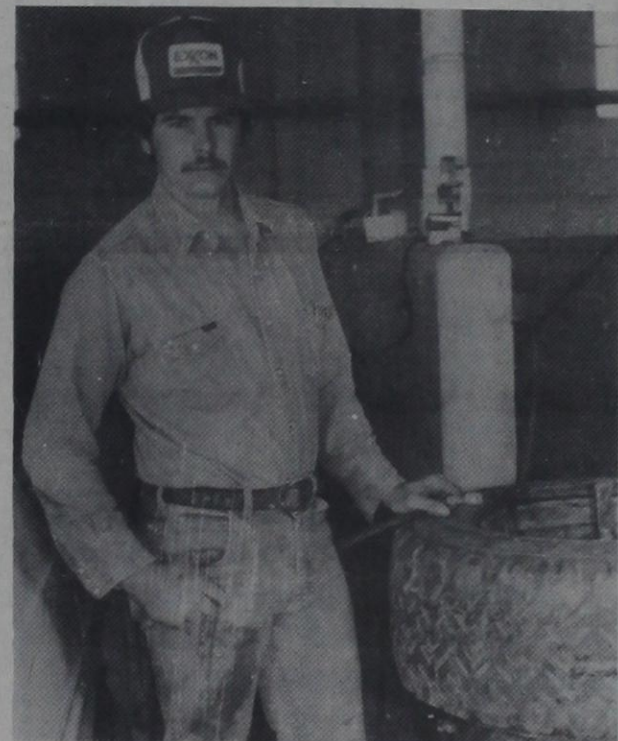

received by Mr. Kamon from his sales, less provision for income taxes, were loaned immediately to the Company as received. It was his declared intention to give, rather than loan, the proceeds from all sales of his personal stock to the Company, but had he done so, he believed this would have incurred additional gift taxes of approximately \$240,000 on a total gift of \$715,000. Although it was felt that the monies from his legal sales of his own personal stock, when he had already of his own free will loaned it to GTRO, had nothing to do with the accounting dispute, Mr. Kamon thought it in the best interest of the Company to allow the SEC order to cancel his loans to the Company, thereby incurring no gift taxes, and this was a major factor in being able to settle out of court with the SEC.

Rate Increase Announced

Effective November 1, Advertising display rates are being raised \$6, other Texas counties...\$8.50, out-of-state...\$12, and foreign...NONE.

Classified advertising will be \$3.00 for the first 25 words and \$.05 for each word over the 25. Subscription rates expire each January.

Publisher H.V. O'Brien has announced that advertising rates of the Eastland County Newspapers will be increased on November 1st of this year. Accounting Dispute Was Settled By Cisco Oil Firms

Recently, articles concerning three Cisco oil companies and their officers and accounting firms appeared in the Abilene Reporter News. Company officials were not contacted by the Abilene paper for verification of facts before publishing its articles, and it is the contention of the three companies, their officers, their legal counsel and their accounting firms that the Abilene Reporter News articles contained statements which were misleading to the public, primarily through the omission of several material facts.

oil companies, Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil, Inc. (GTRO), International Royalty & Oil, Inc. (IROC), and Black Giant Oil Company (BGOC), and their outside accounting firms, and involved civil litigation only. The dispute arose over transactions whereby each of the three companies purchased restricted stock of the other two companies. The SEC did not claim that the transactions were illegal, but differed with the accounting treatment used by four independent CPA accounting firms retained by the companies during the past 2 1/2 years. Nevertheless, the SEC questioned the prices involved and the accounting principles used by the accounting firms. To resolve the dispute, and to avoid expensive court proceedings estimated to be hundreds of thousands of dollars, the three oil companies consented to a restatement of the transactions in accordance with SEC demands. To accomplish this settlement, it was agreed that the SEC should file a suit but that the three oil companies and other individuals and firms named in the suit would neither admit nor deny allegations made in the suit. The suit was filed and settled simultaneously.

The three oil companies are operated out of an office and printing complex consisting of five buildings, one of which is partially the residence of Robert Kamon, president of GTRO. The SEC did not contest the legality of the sales by Mr. Kamon of his personal GTRO stock in 1981 and 1982. The funds

draws no salary from the Company, states he has always tried to make every move possible to benefit Golden Triangle, and through selling his personal stock and loaning the funds to the Company during 1981 and 1982, he has enabled Golden Triangle to make some attractive oil property purchases which it could not have made otherwise.

Under Mr. Kamon's leadership, Golden Triangle has flourished since he assumed control in 1979. The Company has acquired royalty and working interests under 80 producing wells in the United States, and holds 3,626,186 net royalty acres (presently non-producing) of overriding royalties under 86,711,840 gross surface acres in Australia. Golden Triangle expects to report increased assets and income in 1982 as a result of the SEC ruling.

Pat Howard Receives Fellowship

Pat Howard is the recipient of one of four national postdoctorate policy fellowships awarded by the Institute for Educational Leadership in Washington, D.C. Pat will be spending the next year studying educational policymaking and the legislative process at the federal level. She will be working with the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) in Washington. The Council is composed of the chief school officials in the 50 states and the six extra-state jurisdictions who are responsible for overall educational management. Pat will serve as legislative assistant and Council Representative for the International Relations Committee. In addition, she will observe and participate in policy-making forums, management and administration seminars throughout her fellowship year.

Pat is the daughter of Mrs. Lillian Howard and the late James C. Howard of Rising Star, Texas. She received a Bachelor's degree from Howard Payne University, a Master's

degree in Educational Administration from Tarleton State University, and she has just recently completed her Ph.D. at Texas A&M University in Educational Administration.

Before entering the doctoral program at Texas A&M, Pat was the Executive Director of the Near East-South Asia Council of Overseas Schools, the U.S. State Department-sponsored organization for American-sponsored overseas schools in the Near East-Asia region of the world. With offices in Tehran, Iran and Athens, Greece, Pat was the organization executive for 35 American schools, with 20,000 students and approximately 2,000 teachers.

Previous to her

overseas experience, Pat taught English at Abilene Christian University, served as editorial director for an academic publishing firm in Michigan, and completed postgraduate work in English at the California State University and the University of Maryland.

In addition to numerous articles and two books on American and English literature, Pat has recently co-authored a book due for spring 1983 publication on labor relations and collective bargaining. Other publications include the creation and editing of an international education journal, an international newsletter and an overseas orientation monograph.

Plan Before Burning Ranges

Prescribed burning—using fire as a range and pasture renovation practice—can be an effective range management tool if planned and conducted properly, says a range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Establish objectives for each burn

and develop a "fire plan." Consider various preburn treatments. Finalize plans six months to a year before the burn. Notify the proper authorities, construct fire lanes and check weather conditions before a burn. Postburn grazing depends on the rancher's objective.

Recipes Worth Collecting

STRAWBERRY DIVINITY

Taken from 1980 WTU Season Sampler
3 cups sugar
¾ cup light corn syrup
¾ cup water
2 egg whites
1 (3 oz.) pkg. strawberry, cherry, or lime gelatin
½ cup flaked coconut (optional)
1 cup pecans, chopped

Combine sugar, corn syrup and water in a saucepan and heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, to hard ball stage (252 degrees F). Beat egg whites until foamy; add gelatin, beating until mixture forms peaks. Pour hot

syrup slowly into beaten egg whites, beating constantly. Beat until candy begins to hold its shape. Fold in nuts (coconut). Candy may be put in 9-inch square pan and cut after cooling or dropped by spoonfuls on waxed paper. Yield: 2¼ pounds.

Hint—Very pretty if nuts are omitted and you place a red cherry (well drained) on green pieces and green cherry on pink pieces.

TLC Corporation Stakes County Wildcats

Location has been staked by TLC Development Corp. of Ft. Worth for two 1,800-foot Eastland County wildcats. The explorers will be known as the No. 2 and No. 3 Joe Arnold. They are in a 20-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 127, Blk. 3, two miles south of Scranton. They are aimed at either oil or gas production.

Hazlewood-Patterson Co. of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 1-A Hill, a projected 1,200-foot wildcat for oil or gas, four miles southeast of Romney. The venture will be in a 207-acre lease in Eastland County's

Samuel Forney Survey, A-102.

A 4,000-foot wildcat for oil or gas is planned by Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star at a drill-site eight miles northeast of Cisco, Eastland County. The location is in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Blk. 4. Well's designation is the No. 4 Nash.

A wildcat for oil is scheduled for spudding nine miles south of Cisco by Kinoil Co. of Amarillo. The well will be known as the No. 1 Bentley, with projected total depth of

1,700 feet. It will be situated in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-1593.

H.G. Sledge of Midland has filed for permit to drill a 4,000-foot wildcat six miles northwest of Eastland in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 21, Blk. 4. The explorer will be known as the No. 2 Jan-San 21. The operator has 170-acres under lease.

The No. 4 Danny Hutton B and the No. 5 Hutton A are slated to be drilled in the Scranton Field by Western Production Co., operator from Ft. Worth. With projected total depths of 1,800 feet each, they will be spudded in a 10-acre and 20-acre lease of the H&TC Survey, Sec. 127, Blk. 3, one mile south of Scranton, in Eastland County.

Pumping at the rate of 41 barrels of oil per day, the No. 12 V.P. Simpson has been completed in the Hawk-Eye Field by Ft. Worth-based Mercury Exploration Co.

Located one mile northwest of Romney, the well is in a 243-acre lease block of Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 58, Blk. 3.

It was drilled to a total depth of 1,192 feet, after entering the pay zone at 1,124 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval of 1,124 to 1,136 feet into the hole.

Operating out of Fort Worth, Seely Oil Co. has completed the No. 1 Pearl Robertson in the Wilewa Field, five miles northeast of Breckenridge.

The well showed capacity to yield five barrels of oil and 165,000 CF casinghead gas per day on open choke.

Location is in a 160-acre unit in the TE&L Survey, the well was drilled to 4,700-ft. total depth. It will produce from perforations in the Duffer Formation, 4,036 to 4,050 feet into the wellbore.

Field by Bettis Boyd and Stovall of Graham. The well is located in a 176-acre lease in the J. Stephens Survey, about four miles west of Mineral Wells.

The operators bottomed the well at 3,127 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval 3,016 to 3,030 feet into the wellbore. The absolute open flow rating is 450,000 CFD.

Quest Petroleum Inc. of Abilene has finalized the No. 1 Roddes Ranch in Palo Pinto County's J.V.T. Field, three miles east of the town of Palo Pinto. Tested on a 5/16 choke, the well indicated ability to yield up to 783,000 CF gas daily. It was rated at 2,100,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

Drillsite is in a 166-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Quest took the hole to 3,100-ft. bottom. It will produce from perforations in the Strawn Formation, 2,417 to 2,498 feet into the hole.

Pitcock Inc. of Graham has staked drillsite for three wells in the Palo Pinto Regular Field, five miles northwest of Graford. Designated as the Nos. 2 through 4 Helen Johnson "B," the wells are in a 160-acre unit, G.H. Kincaid Survey. Projected total depths for all wells are 1,999 feet.

Locations have been staked for five 1,600-ft. wildcats four miles west of Graford. The operator is M.R. Rife Jr., independent from Fort Worth. Designated as the Nos. 13 through 17 Florence Green, the five explorers are in a 320-acre lease in the TE&L Survey, Palo Pinto County.

RAW Energy Corp. of Weatherford has filed for permit to drill a Parker County wildcat for oil or gas two miles southwest of the No. 1 Wiley "B." It is in a 1,033-acre lease block in the

T&PRR Survey. Projected total depth is 4,800 feet.

Weatherford-based Western Hills Oil and Gas has posted initial potential figures for a new producer in Palo Pinto County's Southeast Peaster Field.

Location is in a 691-acre lease in the MEP&P Survey, four miles southwest of the Toto townsite.

Tested on a .375-in. choke, the well flowed at the rate of 176,000 CF gas per day. It was assigned an absolute open flow rating of 185,000 CFD. It bottomed at 5,505 feet. The production interval will be perforations in the Marble Falls Formation, 4,352 to 4,366 feet into the hole.

A 5,000-ft Parker County wildcat is scheduled for spudding three miles west-southwest of the Brook townsite, Parker County. The explorer well will be designated as the No. 4 O.L. Jones Unit III, with Vann Energy Inc. of Fort Worth as the operator. The well will be spudded in a 350-acre lease in the G.J. Dubose Survey.

The Six-N Co. of Santo has completed a new gas well in the Southwest Dennis Field six miles north of Lipan. Location is in a 160-acre unit in the Joseph Martin Survey, Parker County.

The well flowed at the rate of 194,000 CF gas per day on a .75-in. choke. It was rated at 215,000 CFD on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 4,364 feet, the well will produce from a perforated interval 4,304 to 4,308 feet into the hole.

Location has been staked by Buck Wheat Resources Inc. of Eastland for three 1,500-foot developmental probes in Eastland County's Hawk-Eye Field, 10 miles south of Cisco. The wells are designated as the No. 7, 8 and 9 t.P. Simpson. Drillsites will be in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-1310.

Oilmen Want Caution In Gas Legislation

A Lubbock independent oilman has wired the Texas Congressional Delegation that two-thirds of the increased cost of natural gas to residential consumers is due to costs other than the price of the gas. He urged their support to delay natural gas pricing legislation effecting producers during the "lame duck" session.

"Some congressional leaders want to freeze natural gas prices and interfere with producer sales contracts," he said Rex Fuller, Lubbock, Chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee for the 5400-member Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO). "But wellhead price freezes will have no effect on 90% of the factors which have caused consumer price increases," Fuller continued.

"The most recent Department of Energy data show that for every one dollar increase in natural gas prices, only 32% represented the additional cost of natural gas. The other 68 cents was increased cost of transporta-

tion by the pipelines and utilities," Fuller point out. "The overall problem is too complex for the current 'lame duck' session to address without leading to more difficulty.

The text of Fuller's wire, sent individually to all Texas Senators and Congressmen, said:

"We believe that efforts to initiate emergency legislation concerning natural gas regulation, such as producer price freezes and abrogation of take or pay contractual provisions, are arbitrary stop-gap measures that would aggravate rather than resolve the natural gas problem for the consumer. The overall problem is extremely complex and demands full analysis to reach a sensible solution. For example, virtually two-thirds of the arising cost to consumer is due to factors other than producer wellhead pricing, such as transportation and distribution. Further, hasty and inadequately considered adjustments to contractual rights involving the producer and his purchaser would lead to serious erosion in exploration activity. This would cause another round of supply shortages that would be damaging to consumer interests."

"We urge your support in delaying to the 1983 Congressional Session consideration of the natural gas issue."

Fuller said that a thorough hearing on natural gas deregulation should be held in Congress early next year. He pointed out that while domestic producers currently receive an average of \$2.35 per 1000 cubic feet at the wellhead, the proposed freeze would have no effect on Canadian natural gas being sold for \$4.94, or Algerian LNG at \$7.16 per cubic feet.

"Such high-priced gas is a large component of the price midwestern and eastern consumers pay for natural gas," Fuller said. "We believe any legislation should carefully address all factors relating to Federally-regulated gas prices. These continue to rise, while producers have a temporary surplus that they can't sell at reasonable prices."

Commentary

I Timothy 3:16, And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory. (Tim. 4:1-16) Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter (or the end) times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils; Speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their conscience seared with a hot iron. Forbidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from meats, which God has created to be received with thanksgiving of them which believe and know the truth. I believe that our present worldwide educational and religious systems play a major part in Christians departing from the truth. The evolutionary theory when carried to its extreme form that denies the creative works of God, enlarges itself in atheism and

materialism and wraps mankind in a sort of philosophy where he is his own god. He believes he is the depository of all truth and needs no God. This is where we are today in my view. Many churches have turned themselves into social workshops, and have embraced liberalism, so that science, materialism and atheism are replacing God in peoples thoughts.

And the sad fact is that thousands and thousands of these people were once Christians. They once believed in Christ. We're beginning to see this but the trend will become greatly increased as we near the coming of Christ and the Anti-christ.

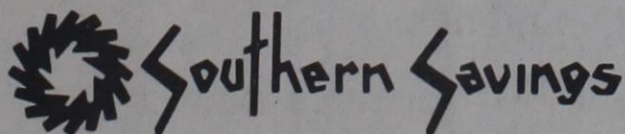

Save Energy and Water in Home Laundry

High energy and water prices can be cut considerably by some simple conservation practices in home laundry.

The water heater should be set no higher than 140 degrees Fahrenheit, according to Becky Saunders, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Normally soiled clothes will wash nicely in warm-rather than hot-water. A cold rinse is just as effective as a warm one, and can save energy.

Conserve water by setting the water level to match the load size. Wash time can be shortened—and energy saved—by using soak cycles.

When buying new appliances, consider how much hot water is used per cycle, Saunders advises. Read the operating manual that comes with the machine carefully and learn all the energy and water saving instructions.

Water and energy savings can be achieved by combining small loads. "Do not overload the machine, however, because this can result in wrinkling, lint or cleaning problems, and can cause

other damage to your clothing," cautions Saunders.

Assure proper cleaning in shorter cycles by pre-treating or soaking heavily soiled clothes. Use the correct amount of laundry detergent for the load size.

Mend andy tears or holes in clothing before laundering garments, because washing often worsens these problems, reminds Saunders. Pre-treat stains and spots. The heat of the dryer could make them permanent.

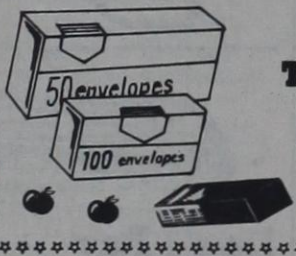
