EASTLAND.—A budget calling for expenditures of \$412,841.98 during 1958 has been approved for Eastland County by the Commissioners' Court. The new budget provides for \$57,337.88 more expenditures than that for 1957.

Balances.

Balances in county funds in_ clude \$15,301.18 in the jury fund, \$192,429.22 in the road and bridge fund, \$16,303.14 in the road and bridge sinking fund, and \$29,589 .-08 in the permanent improvement fund. The general fund will have a balance of only \$7,013.42 when the new year begins.

The county still owes \$45,000 on the courthouse, which will be paid for in 1961. Other debts include \$40,000 in 1922 road

Income during 1958 will include \$121,836.44 from ad valorem taxes, \$110,000 from auto registration fees, \$7,000 from fines, \$9,607 from lateral road surpluses, \$9,870 from the gasoline tax, \$1,400 from the county farm, and about Rising Star, and by \$52,150 from office fees, \$1,000 representatives of the various from poll taxes, \$6,000 from court trials, and other miscellaneous

Expenditures are expected include \$8,943 for juries, \$183 for road and bridge work, bonds, \$13,867 for court and bridge bonds.
