United States Department of Agriculture ASC office in Eastland recently reported the 1977 production crop record for the county.

There were 14698.4 acres of Florunner peanuts harvested, and 19, 387.4 acres of Spanish peanuts, for 34,086.2 acres total.

There were 222 farms harvesting Florunners while 423 farms harvested Spanish peanuts for a total of 592 peanut farms in Eastland County.

These farms produced a total of 37,227,247 pounds of peanuts-23,484,040 pounds Florunner peanuts and



WASHINGTON D.C. Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that he has cosponsored legislation known as "The Agricultural Trade Act of This legislation is designed to expand foreign markets for U.S. Agricultural commodities which he feels is vital to the continued growth of agricultural exports.

In view of the disastrous economic crisis which farmers all over the United States are now facing, Mr. Burleson feels this Nation must reduce agricultural surpluses by establishing an agressive foregin marketing program such as that contained in his bill.

As introduced, the Agricultural Trade Act of 1978 would provide for the establishment of from 6 to 25 U.S. agricultural trade missions; a new medium term commercial credit program for financing exports; the establishment of provisions.



If your family loves french fried potatoes or onions, add this great crunchy fried treat to their list of favorites.

#### CRISPY CHEESE RAVIOLI

3/4 cup unseasoned breadcrumbs

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder 2 teaspoons dried parsley leaves

1 packet G. Washington Golden Seasoning and Broth

1 teaspoon basil 2 (15 oz.) cans Chef Boy-ar-dee \* Cheese Ravioli in

Beef and Tomato Sauce 2 cups cooking oil

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce dash hot pepper sauce pickled cocktail onions stuffed olives

Combine breadcrumbs, garlic powder, parsley, G. Washington and basil. Empty cheese ravioli into medium-sized bowl. Take each ravioli and remove excess sauce with rubber spatula or spoon. Reserve sauce. Bread ravioli with flavored breadcrumbs. Place breaded ravioli on wax paper and top with another piece of wax paper. Pat gently; allow to stand for 15 minutes. Heat oil in deep skillet (380°F). Fry about six ravioli at a time, until golden brown. Remove and drain on absorbent paper. Place on warm platter or shallow dish. Meantime add Worcestershire sauce and hot pepper sauce to reserved beef and tomato sauce. Simmer for 5 minutes. Dip fried ravioli in hot sauce, or pour hot sauce over fried ravioli.

### Tax Savings Possible For Farm Drought Losses

COLLEGE STATION --Income tax savings may be available to Texas farmers and ranchers who suffered losses due to summer heat and drought

That information comes from Dr. Richard Trimble. economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Normally, the sale or trade of livestock, if held primarily for sale, produces ordinary farm income that should be reported in the year it is received. However, a rancher may be able to elect to defer reporting income from the sale of dertain livestock because of drought conditions which occurred during points out Trimble.

To qualify for the election, the rancher must use the cash method of accounting and h elivestock must be held primarily for sale. Another condition is the area or county must be held primarily must be designated as eligbible for assistance by the federal government due to the drought conditions.

"This special treatment is limited to income from livestock which is sold or exchanged in excess of the usual sales each year. The income can be deferred for only one year," expains the economist.

Trimble cites an example. Rancher Smith normally sells 50 head of feeder cattle each year. In 1977, because of the drought, he sold 70 head of feeders which averaged \$200 each. Smith may elect to defer reporting the income on 20 head of the feeder cattle sold (\$4,000) and report it on his 1978 income tax return. Smith must use the cash method of accounting, live in an eligible area, and depend on farming or ranching as his principal occupation.

Special provisions also apply to drought-forced

sales of breeding livestock notes the economist. When livestock held for draft, breeding or dairy purposes or exchanged are sold solely because of drought, their disposition is considered an involuntary conversion. Only livestock sold in excess of the number normally sold under usual business practices in the absence of drought will be considered involuntarily converted. The gain on livestock involuntarily converted into money will not be taxed in the year of the sale if the converted property is replaced within two years.

How are farmers affected? "Farmers may be able to elect to defer for one year the reporting of crop insurance payments from the tax year the crops were destroyed or damaged by drought," says Trimble. "A farmer can defer reporting such in come if he can establish that under noraml practrice, the crop destroyed would have been sold in the following tax year. This provision should help provide a normal income flow for the individual farmer who qualifies.'

There may be some drought related losses that are not deductible, points out Trimble. The loss of growing crops for a farmer using the cash method of accounting is not a deductible income tax loss. This is because the costs of the productive inputs such as seed, fertilizer and insecticide are deducted as farm expenses. The same rule applies to the loss of raides livestock where the cost of raising has been deducted as farm expense.

Publication No. "Farmer's Tax Guide," 1978 Edition, is a good source of information and may be obtained from any county Extension agent or the Internal Revenue Service, adds the economist.

### Sign Up For Medicare Medical Insurance Jan. 1 -- March 31

People who didn't sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare when they first became eligible or who have cancelled the protection one time can enroll January 1 through March 31 according to Glyn Hammons, District Manager of the Abilene Social Security

Medicare medical insurance is offered to people who reach 65 and are eligible for social security benefits, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for at least 24 consecutive months, and to many people with permanent kidney failure. Nine out of 10 people eligible are enrolled in the program.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. It's the voluntary part of Medicare, funded

by individual premiums and Federal general revenues. The basic premium is \$7.70

a month through June 1978 and will be \$8.20 a month starting in July. People who did not sign up when they first became eligible pay a higher premium. And people who sign up and cancel later can re-enroll only once.

Medical insurance supplements the hospital insurance part of Medicare.

Medicare hospital insurance is extended without premium charge to people 65 or over who are

eligible for social security benefits, to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for at least 24 consecutive months, and to many people with permanent kidney failure.

Medicare hospital insurance is funded primarily by social security contributions from employees, employers, and employed people.

People 65 or over who aren't eligible for social security benefits can apply at any social security office and get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium. The basic premium is \$54 a month through June 1978 and will be \$63 a month starting in July. People who buy Medicare hospital insurance must also sign up for Medicare medical insurance and pay the monthly premium. They can sign up January 1 - -

March 31. People who have worked long enough under social security can get Medicare hsopital and medical insurance for themselves and their family if they have permanent kidney failure and need a kidney transplant or dialysis.

Over 25 million people have Medicare protection.

WHAT CONGRESS FEARS IS NOT THAT SOCIAL SECURITY will run out of What concerns many is that when the last IOU's are gone from the Social Security closet, there will no longer be a way to hide the real costs of the program. This is the reason for the big increase in the taxable base and rate voted by the Congress in the last Session. It is supposed to make the "fund" sound in the early '80s at a time when the IOU's run out. Already more than half our people are paying more in Social Security taxes than in income taxes and there's more to


