## Panthers Powerful, Win Over Wildcats

The Rising Star Wildcats, along with a whole caravan of fans, traveled to Gorman last Friday for one of the most exciting games of the season.

The first quarter went Gorman's way when they broke loose and ran 59 yards for the touchdown. The point after touchdown was good and the Cats trailed 0-7.

Hollis and Flores teamed up for a sack and Rodriguez and Harmon stopped the next play for no gain. Following the Gorman punt the Cat took over on their own 10-yard line. Alcorn had an excellent run where he broke tackles and picked up 17 yards and the first down, but the Cats couldn't seem to consistently move the ball. Gorman scored again following an interception and the first quarter ended Gorman 14, Rising Star 0.

The second quarter started out well for the Cats as Alcorn had another long gain of 21 yards, but Gorman again stopped the Cats short of the end zone. Several times Gorman coughed up the ball, but the Cats were unable to come up with the bouncing pigskin. The half ended 14-0.

The third quarter, Coach Goodman's Wildcats came out fired up and ready to play. Alcorn almost broke loose for the end zone when he dashed 43 yards. The fans went wild! Everyone was on their feet and cheering, but again the Cats were forced to punt. Alcorn's punt was downed by Wilson and was good for 64 yards. Gorman went to the air and Jarod Horton came up with an interception. He showed why he was a running back in junior high as he went 47 yards for a TD. Alcorn's PAT was good and with 6:25 left in the quarter, the Cats were a touchdown

behind.

The swarming Cat defense caused the ball to be coughed up, but the pigskin seemed to bounce Gorman's way and the Panthers fell on it. The quarter ended Gorman 14, Rising Star 7.

The fourth quarter started out well for the Cats when Horton intercepted his second pass of the game to set up the next Wildcat score. Evans hit Bailey for 31 yards and the end zone. Alcorn's PAT was good and with 9:32 on the clock the ball game was tied 14-14.

The fans went wild. The excitement was unbelievable. Everyone knew we could do it. But Gorman got lucky on a long run from a scrimmage, good for 56 yards and six points. The Gorman kicker missed the PAT and the score was 20-14.

The Cats were unable to answer this TD with one of their own, then with 4:24 left in the game Gorman scored again, this one from 4 yards out. They ran the ball in and the final score was Gorman 28, Rising Star 14.

This week's game will be at Wildcat Stadium against the Baird Bears. In order for the Cats to make the play-offs they have to win the next two games. Baird is currently 3-0 while the Cats are 2-1. This should be a very tough game and the Cats need your support in the stands. See you Friday.

## Number Of Write-In Candidates In Nov. 6 Election

It was once considered unusual to have a Declared Write-In candidate for office - the sort of Write-In candidate who had paid his fees and gone through all required procedures to make his election legal.

This year, however, there are a number of declared Write-In candidates for the General Election Nov. 6. Although their names are not printed on the ballot, a list containing their names is posted at each polling booth for Absentee voting, and will be posted at each booth in the Precincts on Nov. 6.

At the right side of each ballot a box is available beside each office in case you wish to write in a name.

On the local level, Eastland County has one write-in candidate, Billy Bacon Jr. running for the office of County Commissioner, Pct. 4. Voters in the Cisco area (Voting Precinct 8) will find a box available for this candidate.

In the State races there are many write-in candidates, with 19 for the office of Governor alone. Here's the list, but it should be noted that the candidate of Governor alone. Price support loans are available for warehouse receipt and farm-stored domestic peanuts from harvest through January 31, 1990. The national support price for 1990 crop peanuts is \$631.47 per ton for average quality quota peanuts and \$149.75 per ton for average quality additional peanuts. We are maintaining a list for producers to indicate their need to transfer quota or receive quota under the fall transfer provisions. Fall transfers must be filed on or before December 31. A Word of Caution: Peanut marketing cards are issued to each farm producing peanuts for the purpose of recording the production of peanuts produced on that farm. Using the card to market peanuts on another farm, allowing another person to identify peanuts produced on another farm, or commingling peanuts from more than one farm constitutes false identification of peanuts. Violations will result in the assessment of severe monetary penalties and other possible civil or criminal liabilities. The 1990 wool and mohair producers who request incentive payment and produce annually planted crops are required to file an acreage report with ASCS to verify conservation compliance under the sodbuster provisions of the farm law. Producers are encouraged to bring in their original sales receipts for wool, mohair and unshorn lambs as soon as sales are completed. The office will be closed Monday, November 12, in observation of Veteran's Day.

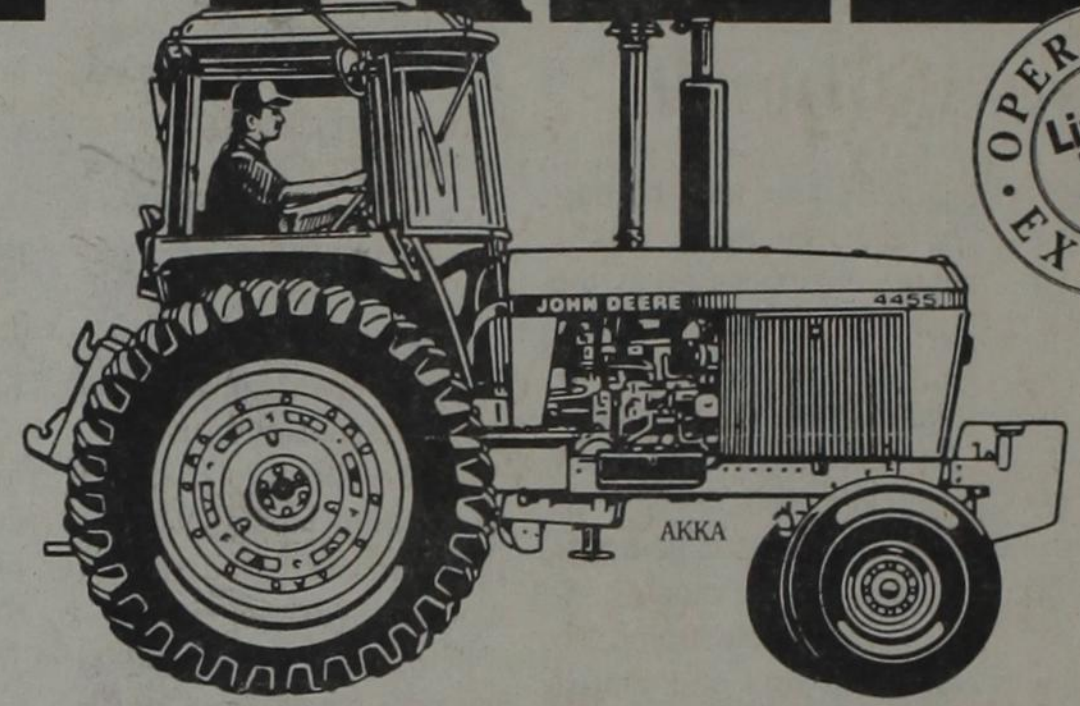
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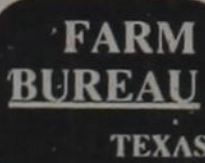

**Guilty Plea By Cisco Woman In Murder Trial**

**Country Peddler Day at San Saba**

Lisa Marie Rose, 22, of Cisco entered a guilty plea Monday to the murder of Richard "Country" Williamson of Ranger April 25.

A jury was seated on the case, but dismissed upon announcement that Rose would enter a guilty plea. Judge Jim Wright of the 91st District Court gave her a sentence of five years in prison.

On Sept. 21 John David Robinette, 34 of Cisco was sentenced to 75 years in prison by a 91st District Court jury which found him guilty of murder in the Williams case.

During testimony in Robinette's trial his brother, Martin, said Rose and Robinette came to where he worked and told him, they had killed Williamson. They returned to the murder scene south of Cisco and were arrested.

A pathologist testified in Robinette's trial that Williamson had been shot six times,

twice in the head and four times in the back. His head was wrapped in tape.

The murder weapon was found in Rose's purse, according to testimony by Eastland County Deputy Sheriff David Franklin.

Before Rose pleaded guilty Monday an Eastland Doctor examined her and advised her Attorney, Leslie Vance, that she understood the proceedings. During Robinette's trial Rose had been described as having the mentality of a "twelve year old."

Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell represented the state in Monday's proceedings.

## Dental Dialogue

### After Extraction Tips

Q. What should I do after an extraction?  
A. The main point to remember following an extraction is to allow time for the blood clot to form in the empty socket. This process must happen in order for the area to heal. There are certain precautions you can take to avoid disturbing the clot once it's formed. Don't do anything to create a suction in your mouth, such as smoking, rinsing, or drinking through a straw. Also, cut down on your activity for about 24 hours, and avoid hot liquids and alcoholic beverages. Stick with soft foods for the first day or so. Continue to brush and floss your teeth, but remember not to rinse your mouth vigorously. Most extraction sites heal quickly and with no complications. CERS 104

## Pharmacy Topics

New uses for old drugs: a widely used acne drug -- 13-cis retinoic acid -- seems to block the growth of new tumors in patients who have had smoking-related cancers of the mouth and throat. Research was initiated at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Boston.

Medicine used against high blood pressure -- amiloride - can slow the lung damage that threatens cystic fibrosis patients, according to a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine. New form of the diuretic drug, a spray inhalant, was used to treat adults in the test.

And another high blood pressure drug -- spironolactone --has turned out to be effective against acne. Tests at Boston University School of Medicine show that the drug inhibits the hormone activity that triggers the output of the sebaceous oil glands.

To treat mild bladder cancer, the Food and Drug Administration has approved the use of a live bacterium used in tuberculosis vaccines. Flooding the bladder with the germs seems to destroy the cancer cells.

## Season To Watch For Prussic Acid Poisoning

Many parts of Eastland County experienced a light frost a couple mornings last week. The threat of frost has

raised the concern about prussic acid poisoning to many livestock producers.

Prussic acid or hydrocyanic acid poisoning occurs when livestock ingest plants containing this potent toxin. The

acid develops when the plant is stressed in drought conditions or wilting following a frost. Another particularly dangerous time is when new sprouts begin to form on stressed or wilted plants.

Plants which have the potential for producing toxic levels of prussic acid include Johnson grass, sorghum, sorghum hybrids and sudan grass. Wild cherry species also have this potential.

Producers need to be taking precautions now because frost is when the potential for prussic acid poisoning is most dangerous. Do not graze susceptible plants for two weeks after a non-killing frost. Do not graze susceptible plants after a killing frost until the plant material is dry, usually in 10 to 14 days. Do not graze at night when frost is likely. Do not graze susceptible plants which are wilted or with young tillers.

After a frost susceptible plants cut for hay should be well cured. Wait at least two months before feeding.

There usually are no visible symptoms of prussic acid poisoning. Most of the time only dead animals are found. There is an antidote but it must be administered quickly to be effective.

Winter brings the threat of prussic acid poisoning for livestock but it can be managed for when precautions are taken.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion or national origin.

# Gramm Thanked For War On Drug Efforts

"It is time for all to finally take a stand against criminals and make a difference in our society," said Sheriff Dee Hogan in thanking Senator Phil Gramm for the attitude and the position he has taken in his proposals to reduce illegal drug supplies and demand. Law enforcement agencies and the tools and funds to fight the war on drugs, explained Hogan, and Senator Gramm has worked to supply them with commitment and dedication. Hogan also stated that he supports the Gramm-Gringrich National Drug and Crime Emergency Act.

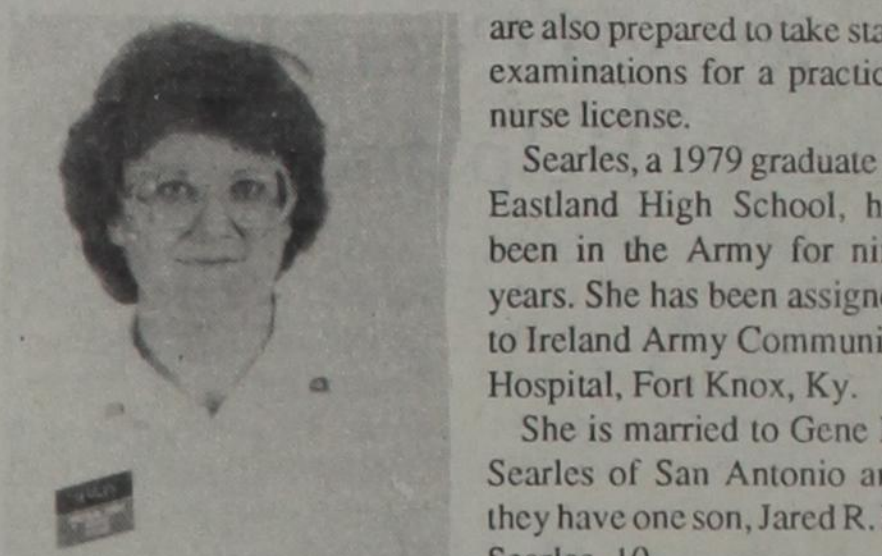
The Act, which Gramm authored, requires mandatory prison sentences for drug dealers and violent criminals, allows "good faith" evidence gathering, limits court interference with prison operations, and imposes tough penalties on "casual" illegal drug users.

Pushing new legislation to put violent criminals and drug pushers behind bars rather than leaving them on the streets or coddling them in air conditioned, carpeted detention centers, Gramm offered a comprehensive anti-crime bill in July. It provides for mandatory prison sentences without release for using firearms in the commission of violent crimes and drug trafficking felonies, prison terms for selling drugs to a minor, and the death penalty for murder committed with a firearm during the commission of one of the above. It has been approved by the Senate.

"Prison shouldn't be

viewed by convicted criminals as a temporary inconvenience or job hazard," said Gramm, "it should serve as a deterrent and keep the felon from beating the law officer home for dinner. We must restore citizens' confidence in the justice system's ability to protect the innocent and punish the guilty," he said.

Serving on the bi-partisan task force that determines the level of federal spending in the war on drugs, Gramm has fought for full funding of the effort. He has visited county officers in Texas to hear their recommendations for winning the war against drugs, and he has brought in the Customs Service's helicopter to assist local Texas lawmen in the fight.

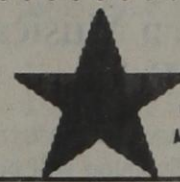

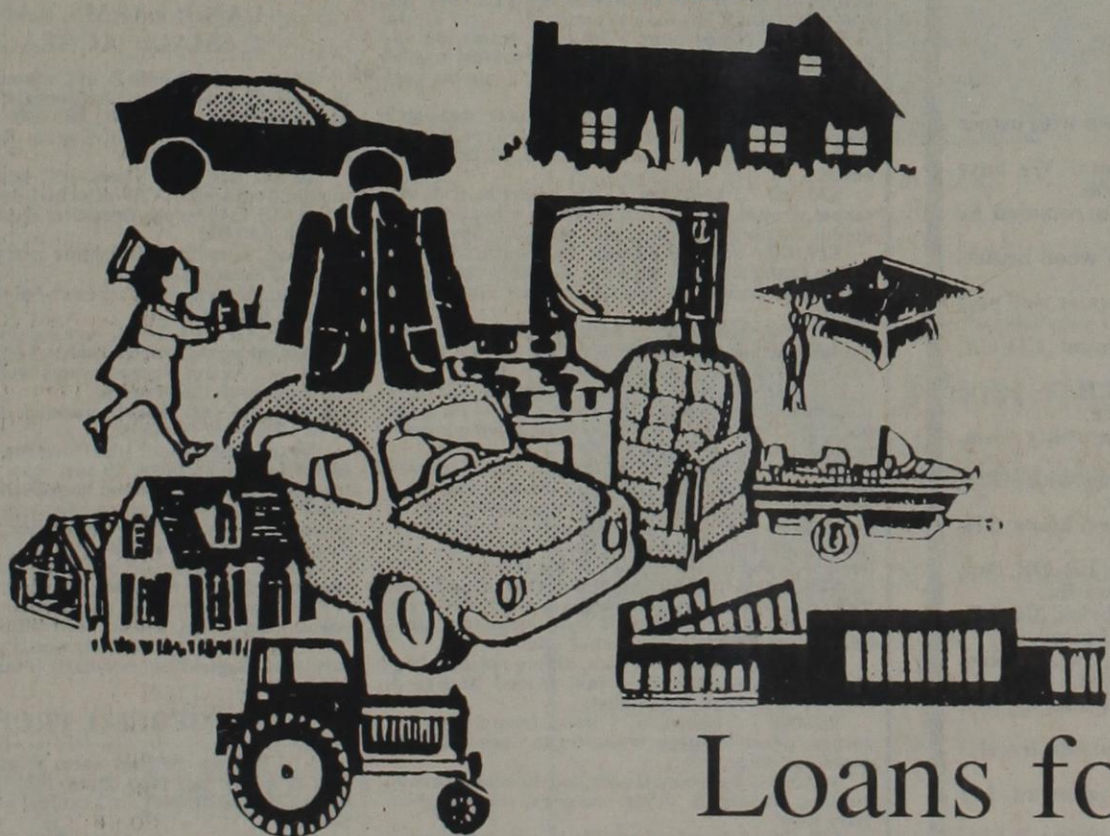
