Pre-Trial Hearing For Lundstrom

A pre-trial hearing will be held for Loyal Lundstrom, 59-year old Ciscoan, in 91st District Court in Eastland at 1 p.m. Friday, April 22, in connection with murder charges filed against him in the March 3rd shotgun shooting of his wife, Doris. District Judge Jim R.

Wright of the 91st court will

preside at the hearing.

District Attorney Emory Walton reported that the defense has indicated that a motion of discovery, which in effect asks to see all evidence accumulated by the state in the case, will be filed. This is standard pro-

cedure, he added. Defense Counsel Bill Hart, who has said that a change of venue will be sought, told this newspaper that "this is

not the time to ask for a venue change." The motion to move the trial elsewhere will come at a later date, it was reported.

Lundstrom has remained at liberty under a \$100,000 bond. He surrendered to Cisco police some 10 days after the slaying at the family living quarters in Cisco

Austin Doctor Will Examine Thos. LeFlore

An Austin psychiatrist will examine Thomas LeFlore, who faces charges of murder in the 1981 death of Debra Garcia of Cisco, District Attorney Emory Walton reported Tuesday. The examination will take place April 29 in Austin.

LeFlore is a brother of Charles Allen LeFlore, convicted in the slaying, and defense attorneys entered a plea that he was not mentally competent. A Brownwood psychiatrist examined LeFlore for the defense.



Filing Deadline Is May 2

The Eastland County Appraisal District wishes to remind property owners that Monday, May 2, 1983, is the deadline for filing property exemption applications and business personal property ren-

ditions. State law requires that all business personal property be rendered each year. Renditions were sent or delivered to county business earlier this year. If you have not yet returned your business rendition; you should do so before the May 2nd deadline.

If you did not receive a rendition or have lost it; you should check with the appraisal district office.

The deadline for filing open space land exemption applicaitons residential and homestead applications is also May 2nd.

The open space or agricultural use exemptions allows the property owner to pay on an Ag-use value rather than the higher market value. If your land was granted an exemption for 1982 and the use of the land is still the same as previously reported, a new application does not need to be made.

Only those whose land may qualify for the first time need to app-

The residential homestead application needs to be filed by those homeowners who were not signed up in 1982 or who have since changed their place of residence.

Those homeowners who have recently turned 65 years of age should check to see if they are not eligible for an additional exemption for those over-65 granted by many of the taxing jurisdictions.

May Girls Win at **Wildcat Relays**




The May sprint relay team won first place with a time of 51.66.

IRS Deadline Reminder

April 30 is the dceadline for employers who must report on Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the first quarter of 1983. If the quarterly tax due (less any deposit made during the quarter) is \$500 or more, the unpaid tax must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until May 10 to file Form 941, Employer Quarterly Federal Tax Return.

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Tax Form or Information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government. IRS Publication 15, Cir. E-Employer's Guide, is also available through this number.






