

RAINFALL ZONES on this map of the Brazos River watershed show why the Brazos River Authority wants to build new dams in the upper and central portions of the basin as well as in the lower reaches. Rainfall diminishes fast from the Houston area going westward. But all areas of the Brazos Valley, even in the central areas, have a vast potential for municipal, industrial and farm growth - if they can save their limited supply of water that now runs wastefully to the Gulf. Likewise, dams in these areas will save water that can be released for users downstream. Many of these projects would also help control floods. The best reservoir sites are in areas of lesser rainfall. Storing the water can spread the time of use. The Brazos River Authority's engineers have weighed all possible dam sites, as well as local needs throughout the watershed, in planning the river's development.






