Good Show Found In Joyce Agnew 3

Cement plug will probably be drilled in the Joyce Brothers No. 3 Agnew southeast of Rising Star Wednesday or Thursday of this week, after a good show in the Marble Falls. Pipe was set at 2990 after drill stem test resulted in a good show of oil and gas.

The well is located 400 feet west of the No. 1 Agnew of the same operators which is a producer from the same horizon.

FRY TEST DRILLED SOUTHWEST OF HERE

Norman M. Evans, Dallas independent operator, was drilling ahead this week in his Annie L. Harris No. 1, located 4 1/2 miles southwest of Rising Star. The well is a 1350-foot test seeking production from the Fry sand. The operator cored Tuesday. He expects to bottom about 1400 feet.

The well is about half a mile east of the old Humble pool and 650 feet northwest of the Busby wells drilled last year. Andy Teague is the drilling contractor.

Two very important elections are coming up next month — early in the month — an election to choose two members of the City Council for new, two-year terms and one to name two trustees to the School Board. The school vote will take place on Saturday, April 5. The chances are that the vote will be very light, since neither election will have a contest — two names having been filed as candidates in each instance.

The fact that there has been no general rush to serve on either board does not detract from the importance of the voting. One reason for the general trend away from local responsibility and control to state and federal proprietorship of our basic rights, has been the negligence of the voters in these areas of local government.

We lose our freedoms when and where we become most complacent and careless of these and it is in the school district, the town and the county that the fundamental freedoms guaranteed in our American Constitution exist and are maintained.

from personal responsibility there we let creep in those abuses and failures which cause appeals to institutionalized authority, with a consequent surrender of all that any true and effective meaning in democracy. It takes some guts to be a good citizen — and any individual who sells his political rights for the dollar or somebody's favor is just as guilty of traitorship as any turncoat. He is, by the sin of omission, throwing away rights which none of his children or children's children can regain.

While on the subject of local elections I should like to doff a hat to the men of the community who have been willing to serve on those boards. They are entitled to our gratitude and respect. Too often they get too little of this and too much of abuse.

Crownover Goes To Higginbotham General Office

His duties will include contacts with the dry good departments of all the stores, the planning and purchasing of stocks and trips to eastern markets and other market centers from which Higginbotham secures its merchandise.

He will remain with the Rising Star store for an indefinite period during which he will assist Mr. Maynard in taking over his new duties. Prior to joining the Higginbotham organization, Mr. Crownover was in the cleaning business here. During World War II he served with the U. S. armed forces, returning to resume his duties with the store here when discharged. Both he and Mrs. Crownover have been active members of the First Baptist Church. Mr. Crownover serving as clerk of the church for the past ten years and Mrs. Crownover teaching in the Sunday school and working with the W.M.U.

They will move to Comanche when Mr. Crownover assumes his duties there.

Jesse Perry Is Buried Here in Service Monday

Jesse Oran Perry, 63-year-old retired gasoline operator and a veteran of World War I, died in McCloskey Hospital at Temple at 4 a.m. Friday, March 18, after illness of a year.

Burial was in Rising Star cemetery after services at the First Baptist Church at 4 p.m. Monday with the Rev. Ed Jackson, former pastor now of Shallowater, officiating. Higginbotham Funeral Home was in charge of burial arrangements.

Masonic services were conducted at graveside by the Rising Star Masonic Lodge of which he was a past master. He had been a Mason since September 1923. He was also a member of the First Baptist Church here and of the Rising Star American Legion post.

During World War I he served in the U. S. Navy and following the war served another enlistment in the navy which he completed in 1923.

Mr. Perry was born in Sulphur Springs, Texas, on November 10, 1897, and had lived in Rising Star for the past 14 years. He retired from his occupation as a gasoline plant operator in 1946.

Survivors include his wife, Marguerite E. Perry, who he married at Carlstadt, New Jersey, on August 26, 1923; two sons, Arthur E. Perry of Owensmill, Maryland, and Walter I. Perry of Rising Star, and one sister, Mrs. Anna Young of Richmond, Texas.

Judy has agreed to double for the movie's star, who will be chosen next week, and the girl actress selected will live at the McGinnis Bros. ranch, which Judy's father manages, at Sweeny, Tex., for a while to learn about ranching. Art Plaster Shop Here Promises to Develop Into Nice Small Industry

What she hopes will eventually become a sizeable industry employing several people in Rising Star is the Art Plaster Ceramic Shop established by Mrs. Don Callaway next door to the Rosa Van Beauty Shop on South Main. The shop has been in operation since last September. It was building quite a volume of sales until a serious illness put Mrs. Callaway in a hospital. After several weeks of confinement and three operations, she is now back at her work taking up where she left off and getting into the swing of things once more. But for the help of Mrs. Ozzie Burns and other friends who took charge of the shop in her absence, she would have been forced to close it.

Even yet, Mrs. Callaway cannot do any of the work of pouring the molds and this work is done by Mrs. Burns and other who are helping her. The product is a plaster cast in a great variety of artistic forms — wall plaques, figurines, decorative artifacts of all kinds, small animals, horses — which may be painted in any color or colors.

She has a large stock of unfinished casts — as well as finished articles — in her store room and she is constantly turning to the stock. The range of designs is almost unlimited from plates and plaques in shapes and sizes, to bas-reliefs, animals, birds, and flowers. Combinations of these designs may be made as the customer desires.

She also has a large stock of casts which she has decorated. Some of the methods of decorating are rather primitive. Shoe polish, for instance, can be used with attractive effect on some articles. Mrs. Callaway first became interested in the art about a year ago. She was working that time in a sportswear manufacturing plant at Gorman. She took up the study process, learning

Record Number Of Entries in Two-Day Event

The annual County Livestock show at Eastland March 25-26, with 534 animals already entered, promises to be one of the largest ever held in its long history, according to show officials.

Approximately \$1,500 in cash prizes will be distributed to the FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls with prize winning animals during the two-day affair.

Each of the junior exhibitors are limited to two animals in each fat animal class except the FFA and 4-H clubs. The fat animal division of fat pigs, fat lambs and fat steers is limited to junior exhibitors.

The Eastland Auction Company will give three \$10 cash awards to the boy or girl who does the best job of fitting, grooming, showing and keeping the animal stalls and the aisles neat and clean during the show. One award will be for swine, one for cattle, and one award for sheep. D. S. Buchanan and Lloyd Coan are co-owners of the Eastland Auction Company.

Entry fees of 50 cents for sheep, goats and hogs, and \$1 for cattle will be charged. This is a new ruling. Fees are to be used to defray expenses of the show and to help in construction of new facilities at the show grounds.

Brothers to Judge. Jim Tom and Guy Warden, formerly of Eastland, will act as brother team to judge all beef cattle entries at the show.

Both men are graduates of Eastland High School and Texas Tech, where each majored in Animal Husbandry. Both served on livestock judging teams from the big college on the high plains. Both men are in the cattle business. Jim Tom works out of Abilene as a buyer for a nationwide packing concern. Guy is also in the same profession buying for a packing plant. He lives at Sweetwater.

The men are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Warden formerly of Eastland but now of Fort Worth.

The beef steers, all 19 of them entered by junior exhibitors will be placed on a packer basis at the show by the Warden brothers. The cows, heifers and bulls in the breeding classes will be judged on the conventional basis of one, two, three, and etc. It is not yet known the number of animals in the breeding classes.

Jim Tom was one of the beef cattle judges for the 1959 show. It will be the first time for Guy.

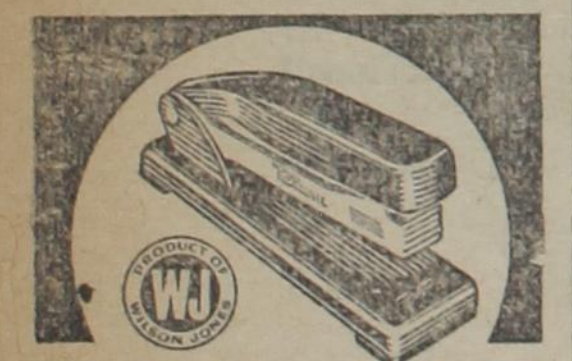

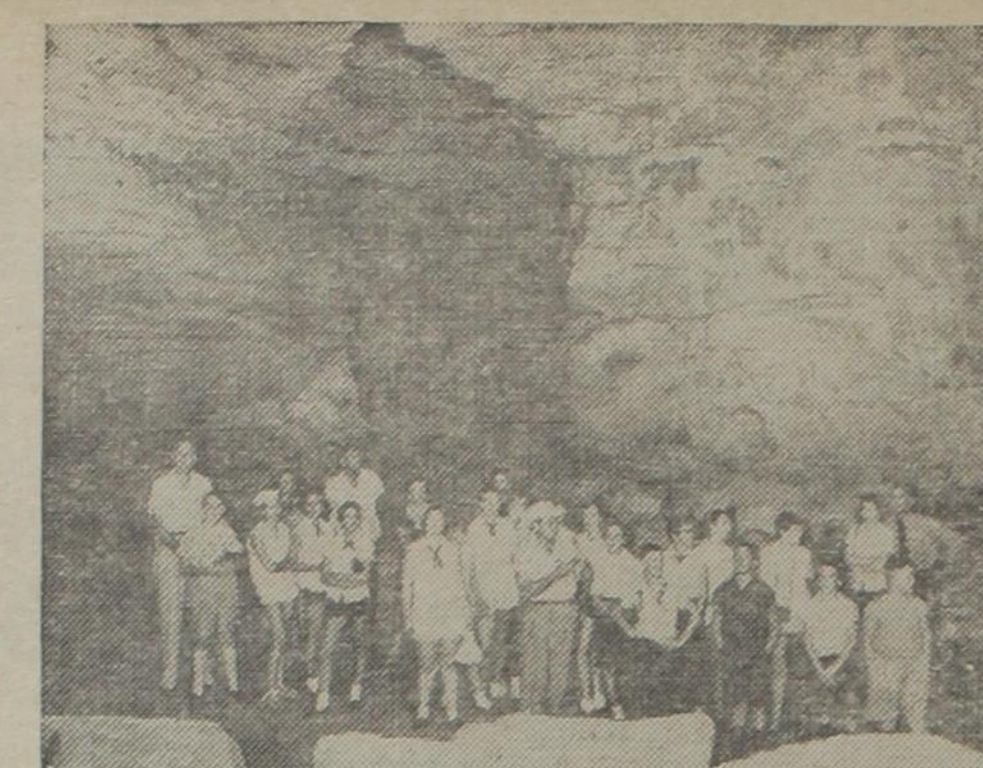

casts and set up a small shop at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Callaway near Sipe Springs where she and her husband live. She took the articles she made to Gorman and found a ready market for them among the other employes of the plant.

Last September she came to Rising Star and set up the small plant here.

The designs are made with a high grade of plaster which is poured into rubber molds in recessed blocks of other plaster. The molds are made by Mrs. Callaway by spraying a succession of layers of a liquid rubber composition over a model purchased from the supply houses. It required three weeks to produce a mold since it is necessary to spray several lay-

ers of the rubber composition over the original, allowing a day or so drying time between each coat. When the film is of sufficient thickness, the original figure is broken out of it, the mold placed in a frame and surrounded with plaster, which firms it in position to receive the wet plaster for the product cast. An unlimited number of casts may be made from the mold which will stretch and pull away from the hardened figure and return to its original shape. New molds may be made from the new casts if desired.

The biggest demand is for wall plates and horse figures, fighting cocks, rectangular wall plaques and other items.

The Rising Star shop supplies some art stores wholesale in addition to its own retail selling.

Advance Census Report Forms Are Being Sent Out

Advance Report Forms for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the Post Office this week to all households in this area. District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder announced today.

The Advance Report Form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit. The district supervisor urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The Advance Report Form contains seven questions about every person in the household and six questions about the household's dwelling. The household information asked for is name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

At every fourth household, the census taker will seek the answers to additional questions covering population and housing asked of a 25 percent sample characteristics which are being of the nation's population. The sample population questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be used for regulation, investigation, or taxation.

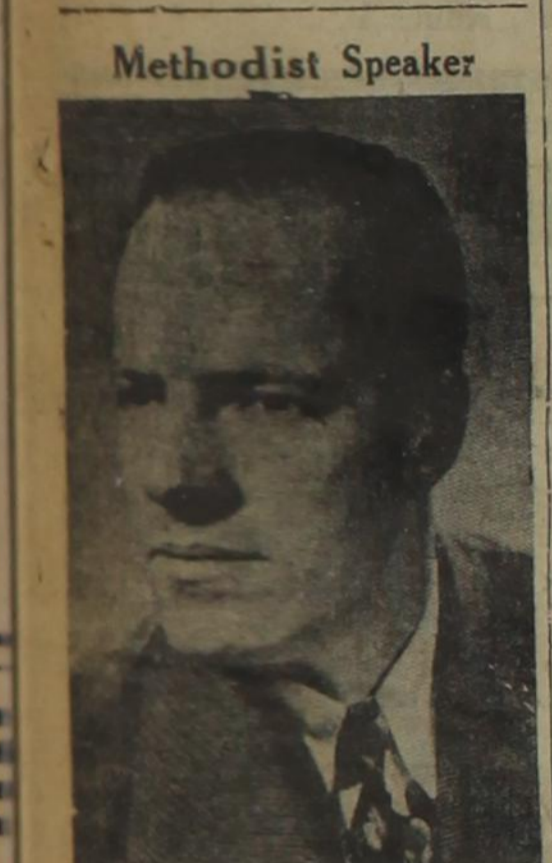

Advance Census Report Forms Are Being Sent Out

Advance Report Forms for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the Post Office this week to all households in this area. District Supervisor Max V. Moss-holder announced today.

The Advance Report Form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit. The district supervisor urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The Advance Report Form contains seven questions about every person in the household and six questions about the household's dwelling. The household information asked for is name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

At every fourth household, the census taker will seek the answers to additional questions covering population and housing asked of a 25 percent sample characteristics which are being of the nation's population. The sample population questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be used for regulation, investigation, or taxation.

A box of good used clothing and gifts valued at \$120 was sent to the State Hospital at Wichita Falls on Dec. 16, 1959. The Eastland County Council of which Rising Star Saturday Club was a member, disbanded and the residue of funds was given to the Nurses Scholarship Fund on Nov. 1, 1959. \$5.00 was sent to State Home at Austin, Tex.
