

Fortunately, we have had citizens in our town with enough community pride and a sufficient sense of civic responsibility to recognize these common obligations and to furnish leadership in meeting them with no expectation of reward other than what accrues to the town as a whole.

Surely this alone is a sufficient reason for us to give the United Fund our earnest support. It is a business proposition, purely and simply. Have you noticed that one of the prime characteristics of a vigorous and growing community is the insistence it places upon meeting these common and civic obligations?

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated that he was proud of the "trust and confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress - and to violate that trust in any respect would be unthinkable." He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made -And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be appreciated." Well-know throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School.
