II Cor. 3:3-5, Forasmuch as ye are manifestly declared to be the epistle of Christ ministered by us, written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God; not in tables of stone, but in fleshy tables of the heart. And such trust have we through Christ to God-ward: Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves; but our sufficiency of God. V. 6, Who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life.

The Bible teaches us that there is only one way to the heart of God. Not through our goodness but through

the goodness of His Son Jesus Christ, are we "accepted in the beloved"; also, our "life is hid with Christ in God." Even though you come before God with a sense of personal unworthiness, you can come boldly, for you approach God in the name of His Son. God views you through Christ and His perfect righteousness, which is imputed to you. Christ is the key to your acceptance by God. He is the key to your healing. It is not enough for us to stand up and tell the truth and teach the Word of God. We must also feel the anointing of God's Holy Spirit, for it is not just what we say that counts, but it is also the spirit in which we say it. It is the Holy Spirit upon us

that makes the Word of God we preach and teach powerful, and causes it to go down into the heart of the hearer and bring forth that mighty faith that God has placed there. When I say I "have faith in God," I mean that I believe God is, always was, and always will be good. Almost everyone believes in the badness of the devil, but what is desirable and needful is believing in the goodness of God. It is the initial step toward deliverance. First, we must have faith in God's goodness; then recovery can come. Your faith in God and His goodness will release His power in your life. Just as we are not saved by feeling but by faith, so we continue in our salvation through faith in God, joy and peace come as a result of the continual use of our faith in Jesus Christ.

The Texas Department of Public Health requires that all students enrolled in Texas schools have the following immunizations before entering school:

3 DPT shots, plus one booster shot given AFTER the child's 4th birthday.
3 Oral Polio immunizations, plus a booster AFTER the child's 4th birthday.
Measles immunization given AFTER the child's 1st birthday.
Mumps immunization AFTER the 1st birthday, and up to 12 years.
Rubella immunization given AFTER the child's 1st birthday, and up to 17 years of age.

A Physician's Verification of Measles/Mumps Illness must be on record with their school.

A Tetanus/Diphtheria along with the donation, before May 19.
