AS PRACTICAL AS A SACK OF POTATOES.

Throughout the country, chambers of commerce, civic organizations, banks and other groups are actively engaged in seeking to bring more industry to their communities. They want the spending and the employment that come with expanded industrial activity.

This is a perfectly natural and desirable state of affairs. However, in rural sections of the nation, there is another and equally important possibility

which is generally overlooked.

That is to work for the improvement, in a scientific and orederly manner, of farm production. If, for instance, any region's farm output and farm income could be raised by 20 or 25 per cent the beneficial effects would be felt by everyone. And this would be of lasting service to the country as a whole, which must face the problem of feeding a swiftly growing population from a fixed land area.

Greatly increased farm production is no impossible ideal — it is as practical as a sack of potatoes. It can be accomplished by maximum use of machinery in farming, coupled with proven land conservation techniques and irrigation. It has been said, with full accuracy, that the tractor revolutionized farming. That revolution is nowhere near completepresent-day farm equipment makes it possible to mechanize the work of the land as thoroughly as the

work of the modern factory. The future strength of this country will depend every bit as much on progress in farming as on progress in industry. The two go together like the fin-

gers of a hand.

THE RIGHT WAY.

A self-help program pays off.

The forthcoming National Vegetable Week is a Knight. case in point. The idea of the Week was developed as a means of helping avoid waste and loss to growers, to acquaint consumers with the dietary importance of vegetables, to stimulate retail outlets, and to encourage improved research, marketing and packaging methods.

The importance of the Week is indicated by the fact that this year's observance was opened July 30th with a nationwide TV broadcast, on which President Eisenhower was to speak. Other speakers will include top government officials, agricultural authorities, and representatives of a national food

chain association.

Basically, of course, the purpose of the Week is to sell more vegetables. And it is going about it in the right way — as contrasted with the wrong way, which is to ask the government to step in and take commodities off producers' hands when supply is heavy. Cooperation between the producer of commodities and the nation's retailers, for instance, is a sound and effective means of solving marketing problems. The nation can use more and more of it.

P M A Election Vital to Texas Farmers-Ranchers

COLLEGE STATION, August 5.- "To PMA county and community committeemen to be elected in August by Texas farmers participating in PMA programs, will fall the important duty of determining farm acreage allotments on any crops for which allotments are in effect in 1954", State PMA Chairman Claude K. McCan said today.

Secretary Benson has already set in motion the preliminary work necessary in preparation for possible acreage allotments and marketing quota programs on 1954 crops of wheat and cotton if such controls should be required for these crops.

Urging all farmers concerned in any PMA programs to get out and vote. Chairman McCan said, "Establishment and supervision of farm acreage allotments when they are in effect is not the only duty of PMA committeemen. Price support loan programs and purchase agreements are locally under their direction. Storage facility loans available to farmers needing additional storage space for grains and seeds on their farm must be approved by the county committee. These loans are intended to supplement reguular means of credit to increase grain storage capacity.

Local administration of Crop Insurance, with the exception of loss adjustment, is another program under supervision of county committeemen. They are also responsible in cooperation with other Department of Agriculture agencies for supervising Agricultural Conservation Program practices carried out in their community.

Any farmer participating in any PMA program - owner, tenant, sharecropper -is eligible to vote. County office will announce time and place of voting.

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




