is what they were."

There were originally three
birds Mr. Weaver observed the
three for a couple of days and
on there was one. There is a
possibility, he said, that duck
hunters in the vicinity, may
be frightened away two of the
birds. The third remained for
the time, swimming into the
water of the lake, out of shot-
gun range whenever disturbed.
It never showed up. Mr. Weaver
said he could not compare
the picture of a
whooping crane found in a dic-
tionary, but it was apparently
a very tall bird with a long,
arched neck and a long bill.

It is certainly an odd situa-
tion weatherwise and otherwise,

Total rainfall for the year, ac-

five inches more than normal and
plenty with which to make a
crop if it had come at the proper
times. The heaviest annual rains

42. If my recollection serves me
right, in one of those years this
area received over 50 inches of
rain, enough to cover the
ground to a depth of four feet. That
year, there is rain enough for a
crop.

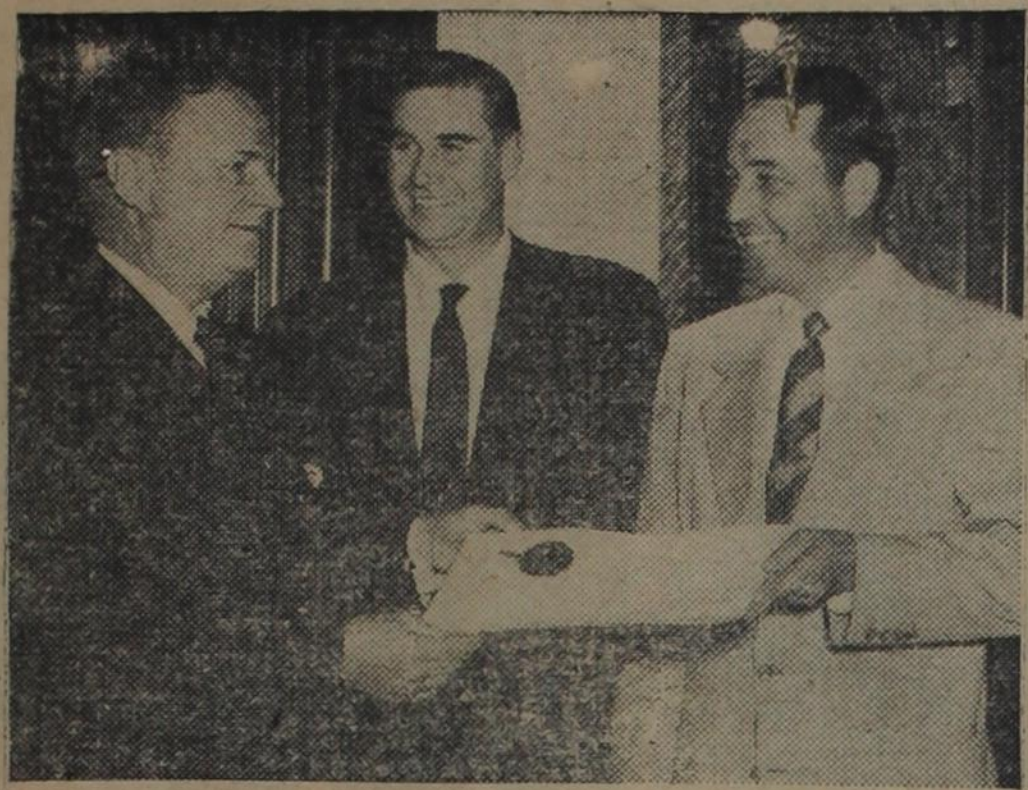
Seven Rising Star Students Attend H-SU

the teams that will carry the
blue and white into district com-
petition next winter.

The girls team, coached by Sam
Jones, have already started work-
ing out and have had two scrim-
mage sessions with the strong
Cisco Junior College squad, show-
ing up well against the collegians,
according to their coach.

Thursday evening, following
the bonfire and pep rally for the
Cross Plains-Rising Star football
game, the girls will meet the

officials, Mr. Jones said.

Cisco Firm to Drill Two Tests In Pioneer Area

CISCO — Low Drilling Com-
pany of Cisco has made locations
for two rotary oil tests near Pio-
neer in the southwest part of
Eastland County, according to in-
formation here.

The Low company has spotted
their No. 1 C. J. Buchanan as a
3,000 foot test three miles north-
east of Pioneer. Location was
given as 990 feet from the north
and west lines of Section 23,
Block 2, ETRR Survey.

The Low company's other test
is the No. 1 Shook Estate, a 3,000
foot wildcat six miles north of
Pioneer. Location was reported
as 330 feet from the south and
1,296 feet from the west lines of
Section 14, A Winfree Survey.

Another new project is the
James S. Smith, Wichita Falls,
No. 2 Hartman as a 1,900 foot
test four miles southeast of East-
land in Section 26, Block 2,
H&TC Survey.

Bad weather has prevented
completion work from being
started in two Caddo prospects
south of Nimrod in Eastland
County. They are the J. E. Con-
nally No. 1 A. A. Hansen in Sec-
tion 10, A. Winfree Survey, and
I. J. Newlin's No. 1 Caldwell in
Section 12 of the Winfree Survey.

Pipe was set some ten days ago
in both wells but completion
work has been delayed by rainy
weather.

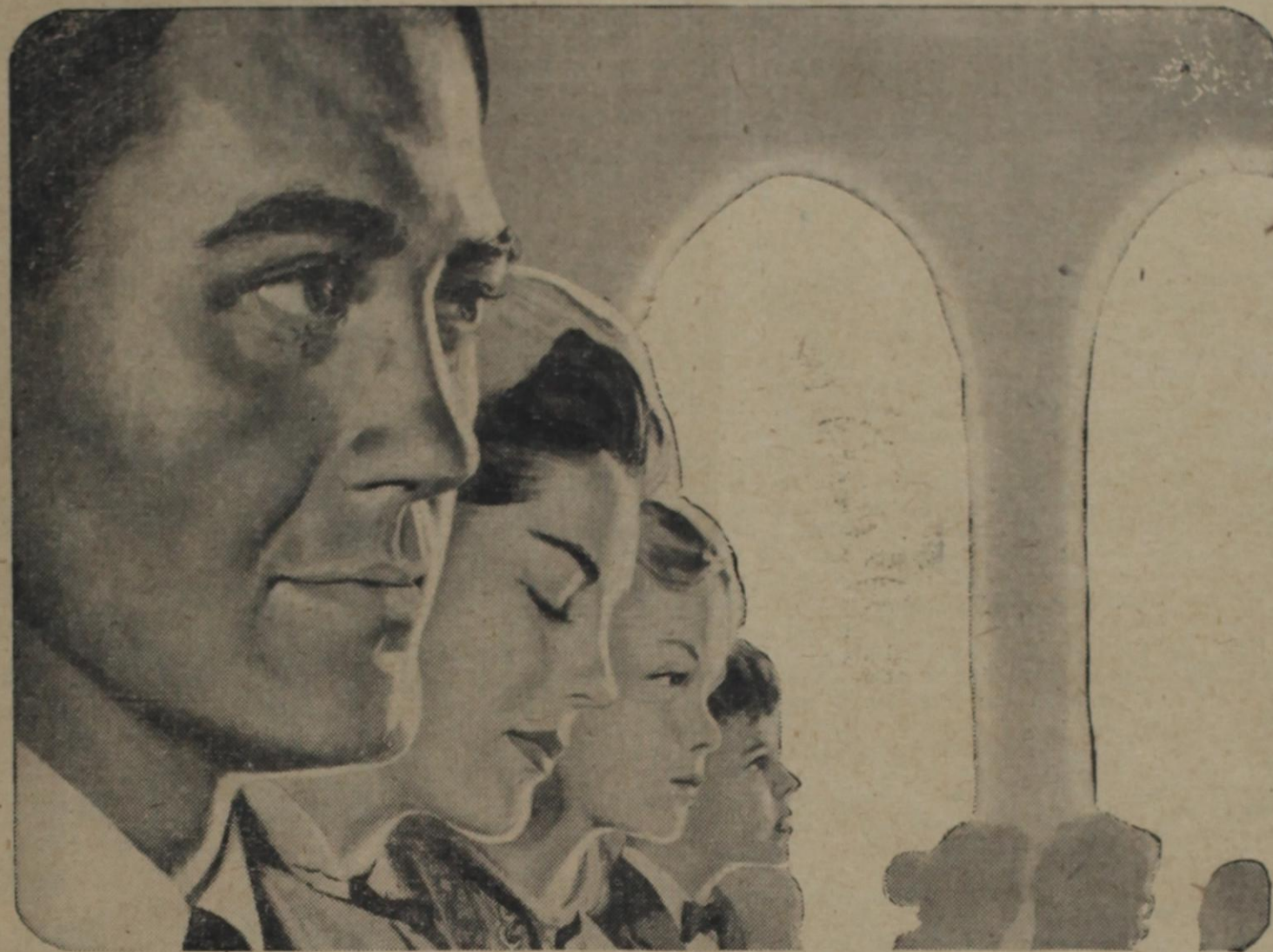

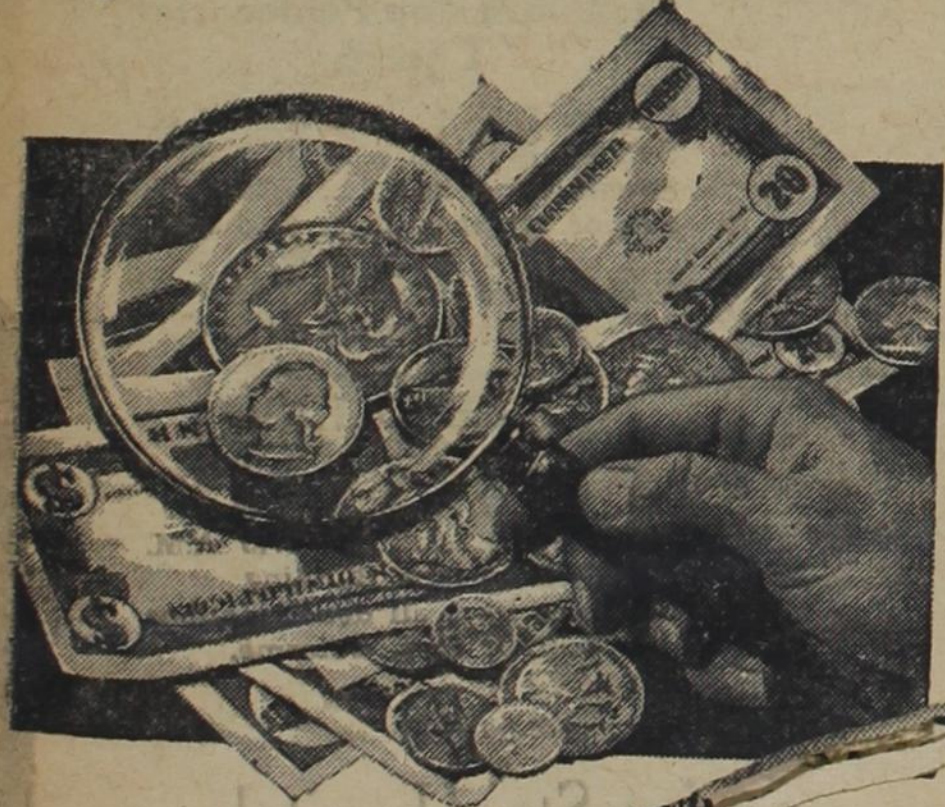

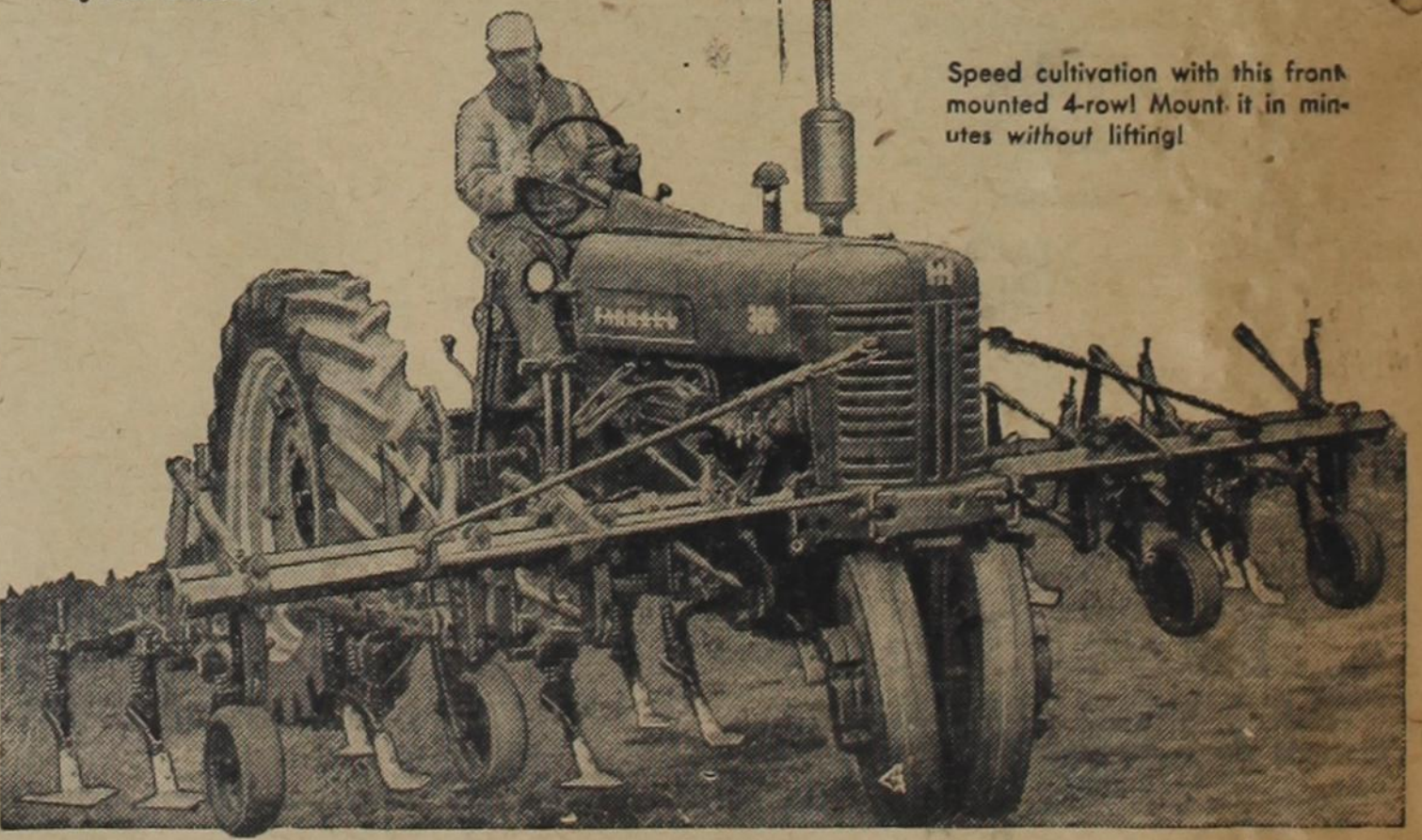
